MYERS AWARDED LONE STAR FARMER'S KEY

The tiny gold pin you may have seen Mr. Myers wearing on his tie is something of which he is very proud. This pin, a Lone Star Farmer's Key, was awarded to Mr. Myers at the State FFA convention in June, 1948, at Houston. Of all the vocational agriculture teachers in the state our own Marvin Myers was one of the few presented with this honorary emblem. Mr. Myers received the key for the outstanding work his FFA boys have done in the past year.

The poultry judging team from the Crowell FFA won first place at a contest in Stephenville last year, the livestock team won second and dairy team third place,

each in its own division. This gave Crowell enough points to win the sweepstakes award. This makes these three teams eligible to enter the state contest at Texas A & M. There the poultry team again took first, the livestock team placed second, and the dairy team was fifteenth. The poultry team is eligible for the national contest to be held at Waterloo, Iowa. The livestock team will enter the state contest at the Dallas Fair this month. Of the three highest FFA teams, one will be chosen to represent the Lone Star State in the National Junior Livestock contest to be held at the Chicago International Livestock Exposition sometime in November. If Crowell wins the livestock judging contest at Dallas, this will mean two teams from Crowell representing Texas in the national convention.

The poultry team consists of James Bice, H. L. Ayers, Donald Reynolds and Glenn Jones. On the livestock team are Charles Wilson, Gordon Wood Bell, Charles Hudgens, Kenneth Polk. 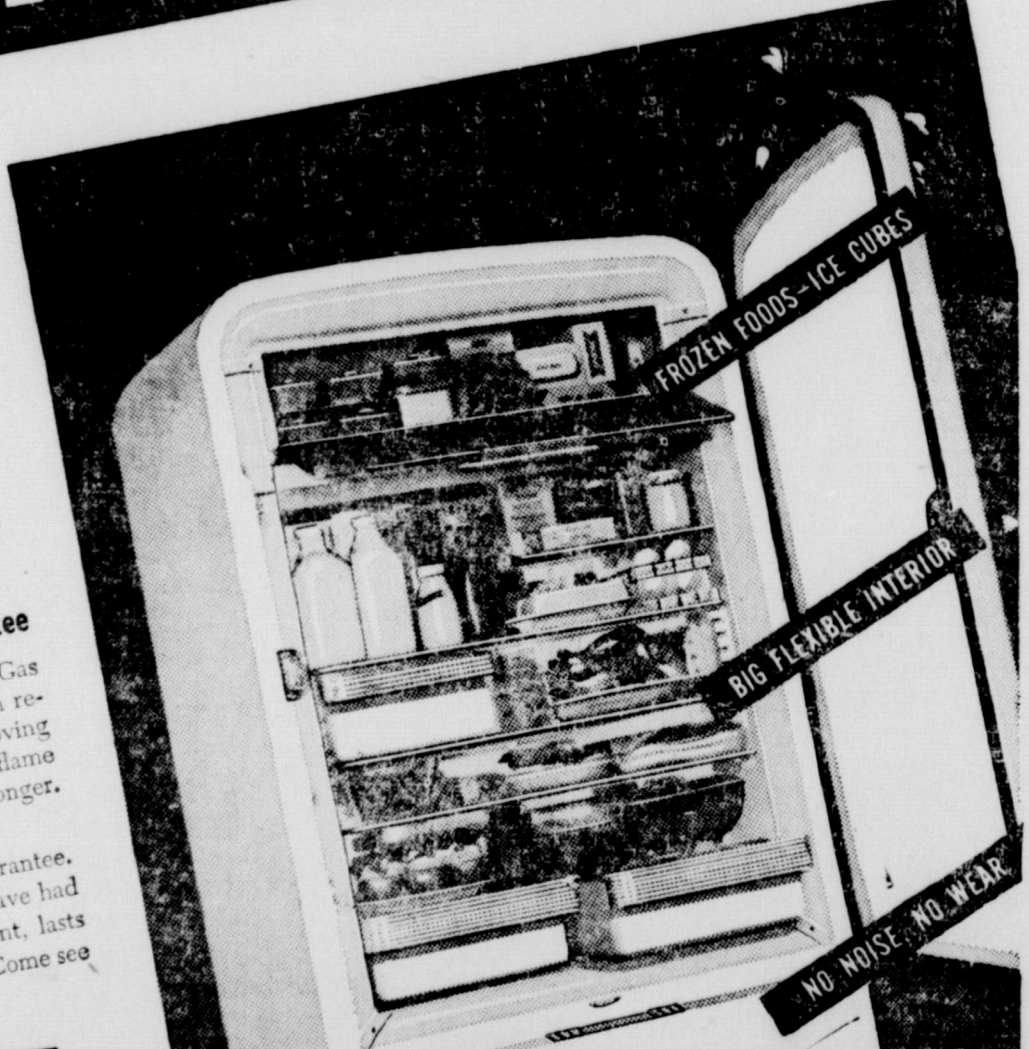

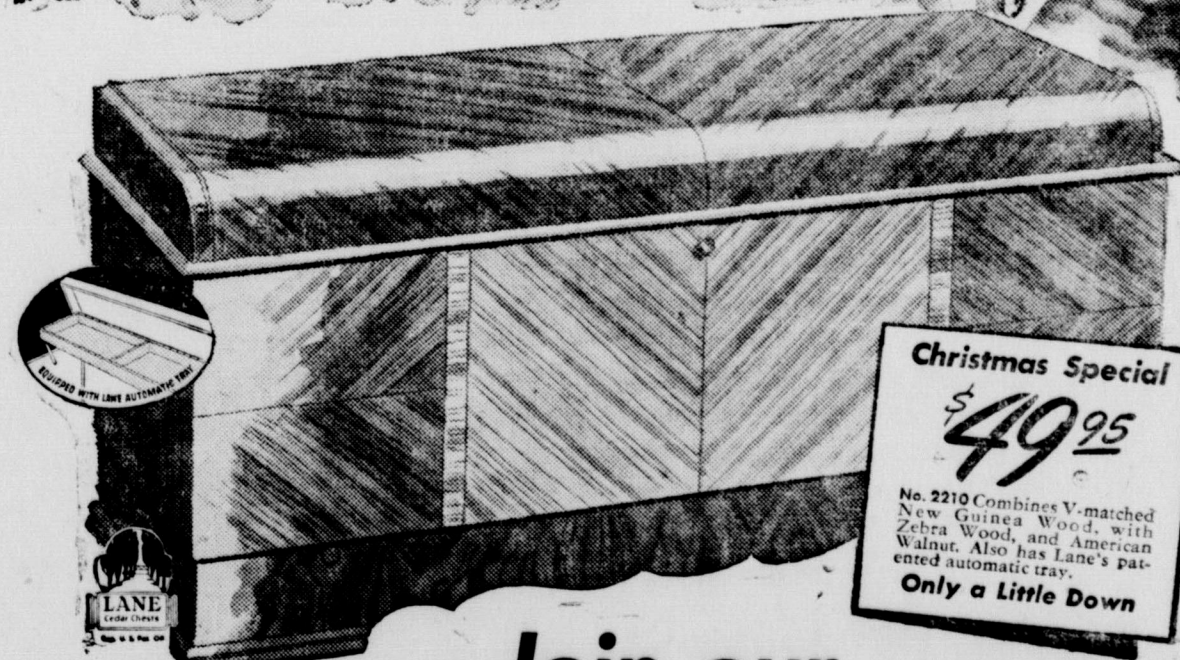
