

Collections from July through September stepped up 14 per cent above a like period in 1947-48, as all types of revenue increased from 2 per cent in withholding taxes to 18 per cent in income

First District (South Texas) reported a 31 per cent rise from September 1947 collections. Withholding taxes advanced 40 per cent; employment, 39 per cent

and income, 24 per cent. In Second District (North Tex as) collections gained 4 per cent from September 1947, despite a 39 per cent dip in employment collections. Withholding and income taxes stepped up 15 and 5 per cent, respectively

Building permits for 49 Texas cities totaled \$32,809,485, or 1 per cent under September 1947 After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of building permits climbed 31 per cent to stand at 683 per cent of the prewar base (1935-39) per-

Building permits more than doubled August levels in Texas City, Marshall, Jacksonville, Brownsville, Lubbock, and El

Paso.
Counter to the upward trend, sharp declines from August occurred in Lockhart, 87 per cent; Denton, 74 per cent; Edinburg, 66 per cent; Nacogdoches, 64 per cent; Port Arthur, 61 per cent; and New Braunfels, 54 per cent.
Cities doubling building permits from September 1947 were Snyfrom September 1947 were Sny der, Lockhart, Childress, Lubbock, and Tyler. On the other hand, substantial decreases were turned in by Midland, 75 per cent; Palestine, 71 per cent; Brownwood, 65 per cent; Bryan, 62 per cent







ROAD TO PEACE by F. Coxe, Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.
