Unlawful to Shoot **Fireworks Near the Court House**

A city ordinance prohibiting the shooting of fireworks in the downtown section of Crowell was passed by the City Council and put into force on November 18, 1947. In order that the people may be informed of the law and the penalties attached, it is being published, and reads as follows: "An ordinance prohibiting the

shooting of fireworks in certain areas within the corporate limits of the City of Crowell, in Foard County, Texas, providing a penalty for violation thereof, and de-

claring an emergency. "Sec. No. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for any person or per-sons to shoot, ignite and explode fireworks in or upon or around any area within two blocks of aid city square, and in, upon, around or near any public build-ing or public grounds within the said city limits, City of Crowell, Texas.

"Sec. No. 2. Any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$24.00

for such offense. "Sec. No. 3. Miss Iris Gabriel, founder and director of the "American Silent Guest Plan," which is now in progress in Texas to benefit hungry children, has informed Gov-ernor Beauford H. Jester she will visit Austin on December 14. Miss Gabriel will bring a medpresent to Governor Jester, al to sent by the mayor of Vienna in recognition of this State's help in the Silent Guest program last year. The medal will be the Vi-ennese children's way of saying "thank you" for the food they received.

A similar campaign was launched again this year, on Thanksgiv-ing Day. The Silent Guest drive, ing Day. The Shent Guest drive, which will last until Christmas, has a goal of \$1,000,000 to be given to the non-profit United Nations Appeal for Children to help 230,000,000 undernourished and sick children throughout the world world.

The plan asks that Texans set an extra plate at their tables dur-ing the holiday season, from now until Christmas, to entertain a Silent Guest—a hungry child who needs our help. Then, the price of that meal,

for as long a period as the indi-vidual Texan can afford, may be sent by check or money order to the Silent Guest Committee, in care of the Governor's Office,

Austin. The UNICEF will distribute 75 per cent of the collections abroad, while 25 per cent will be kept in America to help our own needy in America to help our own needy children. Distribution will be en-tirely on the basis of need, with no discrimination against any group of hungry children. The relief organization is supported, financially, by the United Nations, so all collections will be used to buy food buy food.




