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## Unlawful to Shoot Fireworks Near the Court House

A city ordinance prohibiting the shooting of fireworks in the downtown section of Crowell was passed by the City Council and put into force on November 18, 1947. In order that the people may be informed of the law and the penalties attached, it is being published, and reads as follows:

"An ordinance prohibiting the shooting of fireworks in certain areas within the corporate limits of the City of Crowell, in Foard County, Texas, providing a penalty for violation thereof, and declaring an emergency.

"Sec. No. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to shoot, ignite and explode fireworks in or upon or around any area within two blocks of said city square, and in, upon, around or near any public building or public grounds within the said city limits, City of Crowell, Texas.

"Sec. No. 2. Any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$24.00 for such offense.

"Sec. No. 3. The fact that the City of Crowell, Texas, is now flooded with fireworks of every kind and description and further that such fireworks have been carelessly exploded without regard to public safety and property, thereby causing possibility of personal injuries and enhancing fire hazards, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that rules requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect, and be in force from and after its passage and publication, this the 18th day of November, A. D. 1947.

**"Unconquered" Due at Rialto Dec. 16-17**

In the world in which film people move, and to those who are on their toes, the name of Cecil Blount DeMille is a legend, the story of a man who contributed enormously to the founding of Hollywood. While others were making just movies, DeMille was applying his shrewd sense of showmanship to making epics like "King of Kings," "The Ten Commandments," and "Joan the Woman."

There is a kinship between the film he has just finished for Paramount, "Unconquered," and DeMille himself. "Unconquered" is a story of the pioneers who moved across the Alleghenies in the hard, pre-Revolutionary days. DeMille's story is that of a man who pioneered the movie industry.

It was DeMille who made the first five-reel picture filmed in America, "The Squaw Man." Pictures in the country before that had been strictly one, two and three-reel affairs.

Since historic places were concerned in the story, minute research preceded the construction of scale models of such spots as Ft. Pitt (with interior structures; tavern, prison, ballroom); London's famous court, Old Bailey; the famous Peakstown fair, and a two-masted slave ship of the era.

"Unconquered" tells a two-fisted story of pioneers and white slaves in the early Allegheny days of 1763 when Pittsburgh was a fort at the mouth of the Ohio, and settlers made slow and costly progress westward amid wilderness and savage Red men. To achieve the flavor of the era, outdoor location troupes spent eight weeks in forest areas near Pittsburgh, filming background scenery and action episodes.

The romantic tale told in "Unconquered" is of equal importance to the historic period it re-creates. Cooper is seen as a dashing Virginia militiaman in love with bond slave Paulette Goddard, who was sentenced to fourteen years of slavery in America.

### WTCC Industrial Reports to Form Working Program

Abilene—With two reports by its railroad already completed, and a third well in the making, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has moved to co-ordinate these industrial reports into a working program. At a meeting of the WTCC officers' committee, under the new administration of John D. Mitchell, Odessa banker, as president, a central co-ordinating committee has been set up.

J. E. Cunningham of Amarillo and J. B. Thomas, Fort Worth, both well known industrialists of West Texas, will be co-chairmen of the Central Co-ordinating Committee. Others on the committee will be Frank Kelley, Colorado City, L. C. Porter, Dallas and J. H. Greene, Big Springs, for the West Texas-Texas & Pacific Committee. E. L. Buelow, San Angelo and E. O. Wedgeworth, Pampa for the W. T.-Santa Fe Committee. R. C. Stanford, Wichita Falls; C. C. Westfall, Stamford; Wright Armstrong, Fort Worth, and O. B. Odell, Childress for the W. T.-Burlington.

Other of the WTCC railroad committees will work with this central committee when their reports are provided, according to the organization plans.

The Santa Fe industrial report covers the cotton and wool textile industries in West Texas, and the cotton report already has been issued in a bulletin from Texas Technological College. The wool report will be off the press in a few weeks.

The Burlington report, covering the sorghum grains potentialities in West Texas, has been issued in booklet form.

Only preliminary reports from the T&P committee have been made, but an economic analysis of the entire area served by that line in West Texas is now being made, and it also will be studied by the central committee.

It is the purpose of this central committee, according to Mitchell, to co-ordinate these reports through the local Chambers of Commerce in West Texas, so they may be studied with a view of increasing industrialization of the area.

Copies of these reports have been provided all local Chambers through the WTCC directors.

"We know every town in West Texas can't get a cotton mill, or a plant utilizing sorghum grains," Mitchell said. "These reports, however, can be used as a basis of study, and conferences will show those towns that do have possibilities and they will be explored in every way possible."

### More Emphasis on String Instrument Instruction

Austin, Texas, Nov. 22—Everybody wants to be in a band, and Texas public school orchestras are suffering as a result, says a University of Texas music educator.

Dr. Archie Jones says the problem is not that of Texas schools alone, and the University of Texas and other universities in the nation are moving to help by strengthening their emphasis on string instrument instruction.

### Every School Should Have Health Program

Austin, Texas—Every school has tremendous opportunities to promote the health of its pupils and its community, and for this reason, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that every school should have a definite health program including safe drinking water, good school lunches, proper lighting, seating and ventilating facilities as well as scrupulously clean premises.

"From early childhood to manhood and womanhood, most youngsters are enrolled in school and

are under the supervision of school staffs for a substantial part of the day, approximately half the days of the year," Dr. Cox said. "The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individual and community health which they are taught, and the information and understanding that they acquire are factors which operate to develop attitudes and behavior conducive to happy, healthy and successful living."

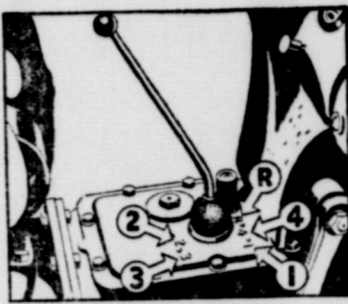
To supplement the efforts of teachers, school boards, parent and civic groups interested in promoting school health, the State Health Department's Division of School Health Services carries on a full time program designed to promote and develop a sound basic health program for the school child. This plan consists of attempting the control of communicable diseases in cooperation with local health departments; the minimizing of hearing, vision, dental and other similar problems, providing minimum health essentials in classroom environment such as lighting, seating, and so on; an adequate physical activity program, stressing education in personal hygiene and local health hazards, nutrition supervision and instruction, and integrating the school health program with the local community health program.

Texans Asked to Help Hungry and Sick Children

Miss Iris Gabriel, founder and director of the "American Silent Guest Plan" which is now in progress in Texas to benefit hungry children, has informed Governor Beauford H. Jester she will visit Austin on December 14.

Miss Gabriel will bring a medal to present to Governor Jester, sent by the mayor of Vienna in recognition of this State's help in the Silent Guest program last year. The medal will be the Vietnamese children's way of saying "thank you" for the food they received.

A similar campaign was launched again this year, on Thanksgiving Day. The Silent Guest drive, which will last until Christmas, has a goal of \$1,000,000 to be given to the non-profit United Nations Appeal for Children to help 230,000,000 undernourished and sick children throughout the world.

The plan asks that Texans set an extra plate at their tables during the holiday season, from now until Christmas, to entertain a Silent Guest—a hungry child who needs our help.

Then, the price of that meal, for as long a period as the individual Texan can afford, may be sent by check or money order to the Silent Guest Committee, in care of the Governor's Office, Austin.

The UNICEF will distribute 75 per cent of the collections abroad, while 25 per cent will be kept in America to help our own needy children. Distribution will be entirely on the basis of need, with no discrimination against any group of hungry children. The relief organization is supported, financially, by the United Nations, so all collections will be used to buy food.

VETERANS' QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. While living in Canada, I converted my National Service Life Insurance to a permanent plan. Now I learn that because of Canadian currency controls, I cannot send enough money out of the country to cover my premiums. What can I do about this?

A. There have been a number of similar cases. You should contact the currency control office of the country in which you now reside, and if you cannot make a satisfactory arrangement, you should go to the nearest U. S. consulate and explain your problem.

Q. I am a World War II veteran and would like to know if my wife is entitled to VA hospitalization?

A. If she is an ex-service woman she will be entitled to hospitalization in her own right, but being the wife of a veteran will not of itself make her eligible for VA hospitalization.

Q. After my discharge from World War II, I surrendered my \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance converted policy for the cash value. I have re-enlisted and want insurance again. Am I eligible?

A. Yes. Application for a new NSLI policy may be made while you are in active service.

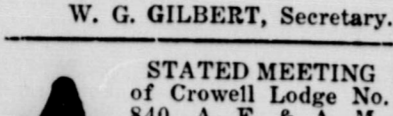

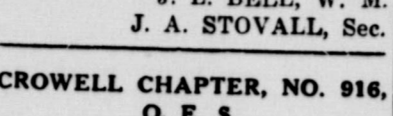

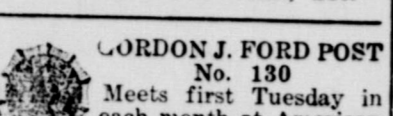
