

Dates Set for 1949 Chicken-of-Tomorrow Contest Campaign

The 1949 Texas Chicken-of-Tomorrow contest will be held May 30 to June 3 at Gonzales. In making the announcement today, State Chairman F. Z. Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist at Texas A & M College, reported that birds competing in the contest must be hatched the week of March 16, in order to meet contest specifications.
"Goal of the new three-year

program," Beanblossom said, "is a 1951 model chicken patterned along the lines of progress made in the initial Chicken-of-Tomorrow breeding contest. The new bird, to grow faster, with still more meat, is being scientifically re-designed to bring increased consumer satisfaction, in the same fashion that science has converted cattle, hogs and other food ani-mals," he said.

I have just finished examining a main lobby of the House Office Building. This is probably the largest such map in the world. It required the work of 20 engineers and a period of 8 months to build. It depicts 50,000 square miles of land extending from Hoover Dam to the Mexican border and west from the Colorado River to the Pacific Ocean. The map contains 250 separate pieces and is built neering maps which took 16 surverying parties more than 4 years to prepare. The Hoover Dam is 727 feet tall and creates Lake Mead, the largest reservoir in the United States. The cost of Hoover Dam and its tremendous power plant exceeds \$500,000,000.00. All

of this cost will be repaid by the users of the water and electricity, largely people of Los Angeles and outhern California. Latest count shows 293,136 children are eating lunches daily in 2,314 schools. About 72 per cent are served Type A lunch with

Since last July, USDA's Pro-duction and Marketing Administration in cooperation with 79 county school superintendents throughout the state have distributed to these ools about 336 carlots of farm products, most of which were bought from farmers under USDA price support programs. Major foods are dried eggs, dried and canned fruits and Irish potatoes. In addition, PMA also has purchased other foods which children need for a balanced meal. Included are cheese, dried milk, canned

"The school lunch program continues to be an ever increasing outlet for a lot of farm products which are not being absorbed through regular trade channels," Thurmond emphasized.

He added that this is one of the reasons for the joint sponsor-ship of the national school lunch program by USDA and the State Department of Education. It is essentially a community project with the state government matching funds put up by the federal government and looking after foods received from USDA.

This partnership makes it possible to shift plentiful foods into areas where these foods are less plentiful. For instance, Texas school children benefit from raisins, prunes and peaches grown in other parts of the country, he explained.

1953 Will Find a Shortage of Teachers

Austin, Texas, Feb. 14 Schoolhouses in 1953 may be bulging with students but lacking in teachers, a survey of elementary teaching positions in Texas by a niversity of Texas graduate stuent indicates.

Hollis A. Moore, Jr., who is assistant to Dean L. D. Haskew of the College of Education, found there will be a shortage of more than 20,000 teachers by 1953. He drew his figures from the Bureau of Vital Statistics and elementary enrollment data in the

State Department of Education.
His survey showed Texas schools
will require 29,844 new elementary teachers in the five-year period, 1949-50 through 1953-54, to
replace experienced teachers who
leave the classroom, and to proleave the classroom, and to pro-vide additional teachers for each 30 pupils due to increased enroll ment. Less than 2,000 elementary teaching certificates of all kinds were issued in 1947-48 and if this production rate continues, the shortage is inevitable, he empha-
