Unemployment in New York state at the end of 1948 was 30 per cent higher than a year ago, according to Edward Corse, state industrial commissioner. At the present time the total number drawing jobless insurance and Veteran's readjustment benefits is 455,000, an increase of 65 per cent in the last three months. Corse does not think the increase in unemployment indicates a recession. He attributes it to a tapering off from recovery employment levels.

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

Washington, D. C., Mar. 4, 1949—One of the controversial bills to come before the House in a few days, is the so-called Rankin bill. This bill proposes to give pensions of \$90.00 per month to all veterans of both World Wars when they reach the age of 65, regardless of need or length of service.

Southern Senators continued their filibuster this week against a change in the Senate rules to end filibusters. Under the rules of the House of Representatives,

filibusters are not possible. All measures are considered in the House under an agreement as to time of debate. However, under Senate rules, no limit can be placed on the time that a Senator can talk except through so-called cloture. Cloture can only be invoked by a two-thirds vote of the Senate. Hence, filibusters take place only in the Senate. The Administration is now seeking to have the Senate rules changed so that a simple majority vote can cut off all debate. This change in rules in the Senate is aimed at Southern Senators and is intended to cut off their right to filibuster against the so-called Civil Rights bills. The so-called Civil Rights bills are: (1) the anti-lynching bill, (2) the anti-poll tax bill, (3) the so-called FEPC (Fair Employment Practices Commission),

The various measures proposing to outlaw segregation. Most Southern Representatives and Senators, like myself, are very much opposed to all of these proposals. In this instance, we feel that the filibuster keeps a majority from running over a minority. We, therefore, are hoping that the Senate filibuster will be successful.

The Hoover Commission was set up by the last Congress to recommend measures of efficiency and economy in the Executive Branch of the Government. Such Commission filed its 9th report this week. Its report points out that the Veterans Administration has 15,432 employees handling its 7 million policies of insurance in the total amount of 40 billion dollars, whereas private insurance firms use only one-fifth this many employees to handle the same volume of insurance.

Subcommittee No. 1 of the House Judiciary Committee, of which I am a member, has begun hearings on a new Displaced Persons bill sponsored by Mr. Emanuel Celler of New York. Mr. Celler's bill proposes to raise the number of DPs to be admitted to this country from 200,000 to 400,000. The present bill provides that no one coming into our DP camps after December 22, 1945, can be classified as a DP. Mr. Celler's bill proposes to change this date to July 1, 1947. Mr. Celler's bill would make eligible for DP registration more than 100,000 coming into our camps from behind

the iron curtain over 18 months after the war was over. Mr. Celler complains that the present legislation discriminates against persons of Jewish faith. While 25 per cent of the DPs were of Jewish faith, DPs admitted since the war and prior to the DP Act of 1948, were 66 and two-thirds per cent of Jewish faith. Of those admitted under the present act so far, nearly 50 per cent have been persons of Jewish faith. Thus, it is hard to see how any discrimination has been practiced against the Jews. In the allied military zones of Europe are more than 14 million Displaced Persons of German blood. These are people from Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, Rumania, and countries under Russian domination who have been forcibly expelled from their ancestral homes because of their German blood.

The constitution of the IRO (International Refugee Organization) forbids anyone to be classified as a DP who is of German ethnic origin. Thus, the proposed bill gives no consideration to any of these people. Again, I have numerous wires this week from Greek organizations in this country asking us to permit the entry of 50,000 Greek refugees. This week, a State Department spokesman told me that more than 800,000 Arabs had been displaced by the Jewish forces of Israeli and that more than 250 of these displaced persons were dying daily from starvation and disease.

Among the many books and pamphlets coming to my office this week, is Blum's Almanac. It was sent by Congressman Thurmond Chatham of N. Carolina, who says of it: "In my home district of North Carolina, we live and die by Blum's Almanac. We plan our trips according to the weather forecast, we do our tooth pulling when the sign is in the full, expect our babies on the full of the moon, and plant our turnips on the dark nights of August. We also use it for weaning calves, docking sheep, and killing hogs. The splendid anecdotes, jokes and stories have been used by generations of teachers, preachers and politicians. This is the 121st year of publication by the same family group."

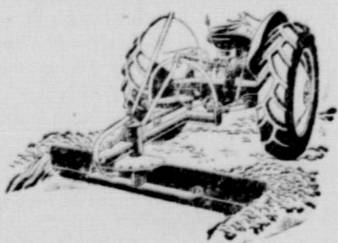
