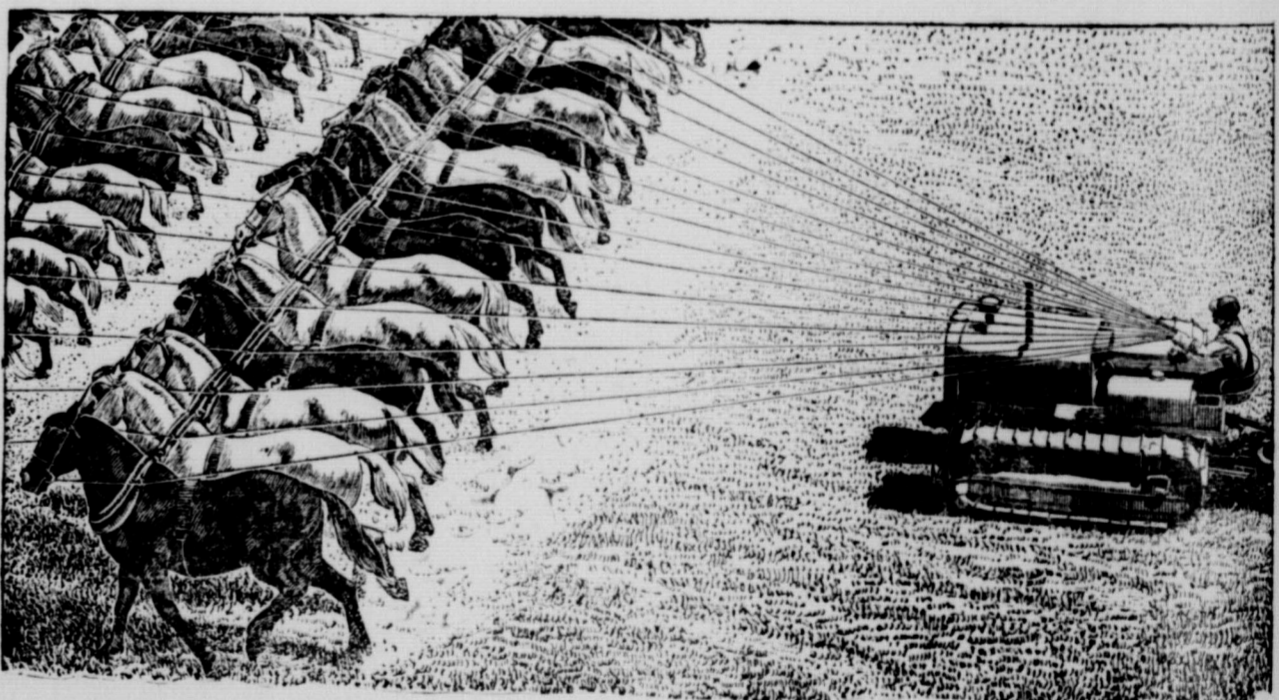
AMERICAN LEGION BENEFIT ROPING CONTEST

AGRICULTURE in County

PASTURE IMPROVEMENT
(Joe E. Burkett, County Agent)

Virgil Johnson of Foard City has done considerable work with different pasture grasses. He began this work in April, 1945. With some of the grasses Mr. Johnson has been very successful in establishing good permanent pasture. While others have proven rather disappointing.

Mr. Johnson says for seeding land to permanent pasture he has had more success with Buffalo and Blue grama grasses. He seeded 12 acres to these two varieties in April, 1945, and now has approximately 50 per cent of the area covered with good grass.

Next he considers side oat grama as a pasture grass to seed in this section. Side oat grama doesn't give as good coverage as other grasses, but it will grow on poor eroded soil where other grasses will not.

Mr. Johnson also seeded 1 1/2 acres of weeping love and 2 1/2 acres of sand love grass, and states that both were disappointing in that he got very little of it to come up and live. He is going to seed 400 pounds of blue grama and 400 pounds of Buffalo grass together in the near future.

FOARD COUNTY FARMER'S CONSERVATIVE MINDED

According to A. W. Barker, chairman of Foard County Committee, the farmers of this county are showing a deep interest in soil conservation by applying 75,700 pounds of super phosphate to winter legumes and pastures.

The farmers have seeded 20,400 pounds of Austrian Winter peas and 400 pounds of hairy vetch under the 1947 agricultural program. The amount of seed listed above will seed approximately 1,000 to 1,200 acres. The purpose of the winter legumes is to furnish winter grazing and to be turned under in the spring to maintain and increase soil fertility.

Farmers, who have voiced their opinion on the legume program in general, are in favor of it. Others are very enthusiastic over the grazing possibilities and at the same time maintaining the soil fertility.

In conclusion all indications are that in the future winter legumes will play a big part in building up the soils in this part of the state.

Give Thanks for the Good Health Record of Texas

Austin.—The first Thanksgiving Day in this country was proclaimed for the purpose of expressing thanks not only for the bountiful harvest which the colonists had reaped but for the sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure, that first rigorous year in America. On the occasion of this Thanksgiving Day the State Health Officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, is appealing to every citizen of Texas to give serious thought to the preservation of his own health and that of his community.

"We have much to be thankful for in that our national health level has remained high despite the nervous tension, the sacrifices, the deprivations of a post-war period," Dr. Cox stated. "Our people have maintained a remarkable high health level and even under existing conditions, Texas has shown a continued decline in maternal and infant deaths."

"The people of Texas have reason to be thankful for the steadily increasing interest and co-operation being shown in matters pertaining to general sanitation and the control of communicable diseases," Dr. Cox asserted. "Responsibility for advancement of the public health program lies not with the State Health Department primarily but with the people who support and encourage the local community efforts exerted and who apply in their own individual lives the health rules with which they have become acquainted through public health education."

Dr. Cox pointed out that one direct result of public health efforts in this nation has been the lengthening of the normal life span by more than 15 years.

"Certainly this is something to be thankful for and it should lead incentive for further efforts to promote and maintain community as well as statewide public health programs."

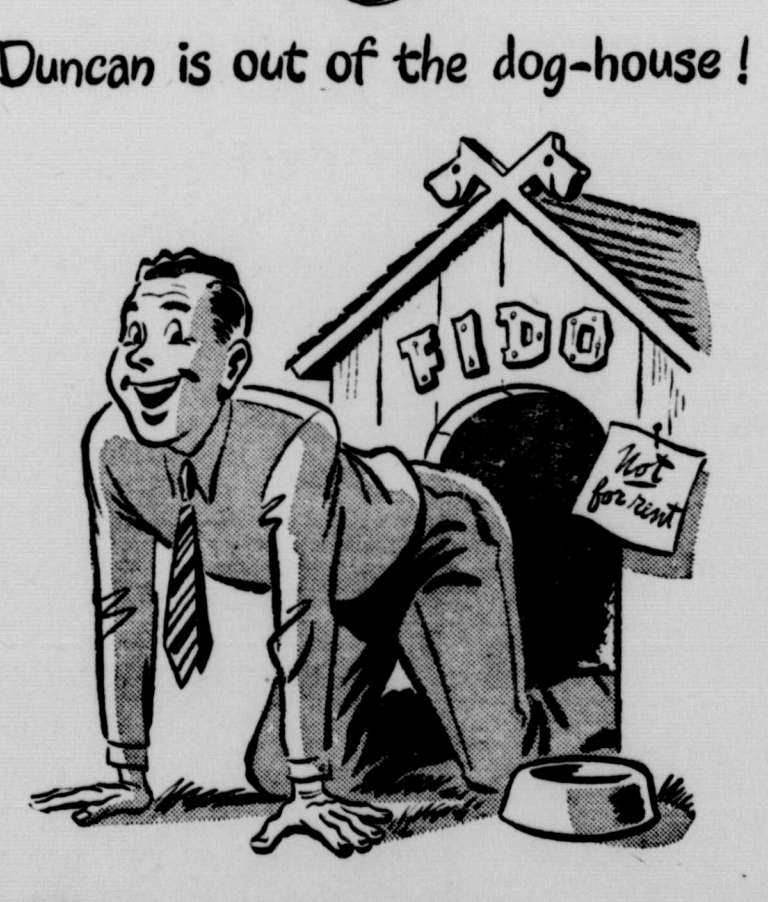

For the Plymouth Colony in 1621 the day of Thanksgiving was for giving thanks to God for helping them through a horrible winter. About one-half of their company died in the winter, and yet they were still thankful.

The custom of Thanksgiving gradually spread to the other colonies, and finally the governor of each issued a proclamation annually proclaiming a day of thanks.

During the Revolutionary War, the people observed eight special Thanksgiving days after the great victories. In 1787 President Washington issued the first Thanksgiving day proclamation. In the same year the Protestant Episcopal Church in America announced the first Thursday in November as a regular annual day for giving thanks to God, unless another day be appointed by the civil authorities.

There was no uniformity in the date of Thanksgiving. Some states had an annual Thanksgiving day, others did not. One woman, Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, the editor of "Godey's Lady Book," took an intense interest in the subject and for twenty years sent out pleas through the columns and editorials of her journal for a nation-wide Thanksgiving day. She wrote letters to each of the presidents and finally, in 1863, President Lincoln appointed the last Thursday of November as Thanksgiving Day. Since 1863 the same day has been observed as Thanksgiving day.
