



Austin .- The first Thanksgivng Day in this country was pro-laimed for the purpose of excressing thanks not only for the countiful harvest which the colonsts had reaped but for the sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure, that first rigorous year in America. On the eccasion of this Thanksgiving Day he State Health Officer, Dr. Geo W. Cox, is appealing to every citizen of Texas to give serious thought to the preservation of his own health and that of his com-

"We have much to be thankful for in that our national health level has remained high despite he nervous tension, the sacrifices, the deprivations of a postwar period," Dr. Cox stated.
"Our people have maintained a remarkable high health level and ven under existing conditions, Texas has shown a continued de-cline in maternal and infant

"The people of Texas have rea-son to be thankful for the steadly increasing interest and co-operation being shown in matters pertaining to general sanitation and the control of communicable diseases." Dr. Cox asserted. "Responsibility for advancement of the public health program lies not with the State Health Department primarily but with the people who support and encourage the local community efforts exerted and who apply in their own individual lives the health rules with which they have become acquainted through public health education." Dr. Cox pointed out that one direct result of public health efforts in this nation has been the lengthening of the normal life

span by more than 15 years.


