In the days following the untimely passing of Governor Beau-ford Jester, there have been many inquiries as to who now becomes the lieutenant governor. The answer is that since Lieutenant Governor Allan Shivers has moved up to the governor's chair that the lieutenant governor's office is actually vacant. However, the state constitution provides that in such a case the president pro tempore (temporary president) of the senate shall perform the duties of the lieutenant governor. Therefore, Senator G. C. Morris of Green-ville, who was elected president pro tempore of the senate on the last day of the session, will now become the acting lieutenant gov-ernor, and if Governor Shivers leaves the state Senator Morris will become acting governor dur-ing his absence. When a special session of the legislature is called, probably in January of 1950, the senate will elect another of its members as president pro tem-pore. Therefore, Senator Morris's term will only be temporary.

Since the unfortunate death of Governor Jester occurred only five days after the legislature had adjourned, there were dozens of bills his desk awaiting his approval or veto. The constitution provides that the governor shall have twendays, exclusive of Sundays, in hich to act upon bills reaching his desk during the last ten days of a session; therefore, Governor Shivers will now find it his duty approve or veto a large number bills which passed through the senate while he was still its presiding officer. He had indicated that he will be very sparing in using the veto privilege. Governor Shivers is thoroughly familiar with the operation of the state government as he has had fifteen years experience in the legislature. He

Ten proposed amendments to the state constitution will be submit-ted to a vote of the people at a statewide election to be held on November 8 this year. The original date was September 24. It was changed to the November date in order to allow sufficient time for the publication of all of these proposed changes in our state conyour careful thought. When an amendment to the constitution is approach by the people's vote, it cannot be changed except by another vote of the people on the same subject. ### Austin Highlights Guar May Be the **Answer for Soil Building Practice**

Guar, a tall-growing summer legume, isn't exactly a new crop in Texas. Records show that it was first planted in the state some 35 years ago, but it is only now coming into its own. It is becoming more popular each year and especially in the southern part of the state, according to Joe Bur-kett, County Agent. E. B. Reynolds, who has charge





It's pretty hard to say that one thing is more important than another when it comes to properly taking care of the pullets that will be the egg producers this fall, says W. J. Moore, associate extension poultry husbandman of Texas A. & M. College, but plenty of tender green feed on the sum-mer range is one of them.

Good range furnishes the growing pullets with a supply of vita-mins, minerals and other growth factors that just can't be supplied fully from any other source, con-tinues Moore. Pullets should not be pushed too fast It can cause be pushed too fast. It can cause trouble later on. #### CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE defining the various kinds of garbage, regulating the kinds and size of receptacles in which to place same, the manner of its preparation and where it must be placed to be collected by the City Garbage Department; providing regulations for collecting same and prohibiting the placing of garbage or any article or material in the streets and alleys of the City of Crowell, Texas; providing for service charges, pro-hibiting the meddling, scattering contents, pilfering or junking, with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles; prohibiting junk-ing or carrying off the premises of the dump ground any article or junk, prohibiting the collection of garbage, trash or rubbish by others than City forces within the city limits; and prescribing a pen-alty and declaring an emergency.

#### Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas:




