#### Cotton Export Quota Should Be Raised, Says Senator Johnson

Washington, Oct. 28 (Spl. The cotton export quota should be raised by several hundred thousand bales, Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas told the Department of Agriculture this week.

Senator Johnson acted after the Munitions Board advised him that 700,000 bales should be enough to take care of military needs during fiscal 1951.

The Department of Agriculture had set up 1,500,000 bales for military use, an estimate which Senator Johnson called "guess-


