Changes Made in Beef Carcass Grades

Changes in the Federal grade standards for steer, heifer, and ow carcasses have been approved and became effective on December 29, says the Production and Mar-keting Administration of the U. 5. Department of Agriculture. The hanges are in line with a USDA proposal made on May 12, 1950.

Under the new standards, the present Prime and Choice grades of beef will be combined under a single grade, to be known as Prime. The present Choice grade will be known as Good, and a new State-Wide Tax Setup Austin — Community officials and civic-minded citizens can in-terpret local property tax condi-tions as compared to state-wide Good grade will consist of beef from the higher quality cattle now graded Commercial.





Influences Pig Crop Most Texas swine producers re-alize the value of feeding well-balanced rations to gilts during the pregnancy and lactation per-iods, but many fail to provide the correct rations for their gilts before the breeding season. The ration fed to gilts before they are bred greatly influences the pig crop. It affects the num-ber of pigs farrowed, the size of the pigs at birth, and their rate of growth during the first few weeks of their life. Probably the most practical and satisfactory ration for gilts is corn or some other grain, along with plenty of protein supplement and free access to a legume pasture, says Joe Burkett, County Agent. If a legume pasture is not avail-able, Burkett recommends pro-riding locume her in reach for

the gilts. Burkett suggests substituting ground oats for some of the corn or maize, when this is practical. He also emphasizes the value of providing adequate minerals in the gilts' rations.
