## County Members of the Santa Rosa Telephone Co-Op. Vote to Support Plans for a Rural Telephone System

A county-wide meeting of members of the Santa Rosa Telephone Co-Op. was held in the district room in Crowell Wednesday, August 15, with sixty members present, who voted to go ahead with plans for a rural telephone system in Foard County. It is

planned to reach everyone in the county who wants a telephone before the project is completed.

Here Wednesday to explain the way the system will work and the cost were: Carl Freeling, president of the Co-Op, which includes Foard, Hardeman, Wilbarger and Wichita Counties; Warren Pruitt, counsel; and Don Heizing, engineer, all of Vernon.

The cost for multiple service set out in the loan approved is \$5.25 per month plus tax. There will be 161 miles of lines in Foard County to serve a potential membership of 325 at a cost of \$115,404.63. One hundred and ninety-four persons have made applications to date.

The system will be the latest dial type with unattended automatic switchboards located at Crowell and Thalia.

## New Motor Vehicle Law Will Go into Effect on Sept. 7

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Law will go into effect Sept. 7 and will be enforced just as fast as all arrangements can be made. It is the intention of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Department of Public Safety to have this law in full force not later than Dec. 1 of this year.

Applications for inspection stations are now being taken by the Motor Vehicle Division and permits will be issued as fast as possible. Each authorized testing station will be required by the State to post a \$1,000.00 bond to guarantee they will perform their duties in inspecting the motor vehicles according to law.

Each vehicle owner will be required to have this inspection made before the vehicle can be registered. This certificate will be in the form of a windshield sticker, displayed where it can be seen by officers, and it will bear information about the vehicle, the owner, etc.

The law covers brakes, lights, windshield wipers, steering gears and horns. The specification as to the efficiency of each of these will be very rigid. They must be in perfect condition before they will pass inspection. Many lights, although they are burning, but not bright enough, will have to be replaced, and brakes will have to perform perfectly before a certificate can be issued. The owner will pay the inspection station a fee of \$1.00 for the inspection only, twenty-five cents of which must be paid back to the State. This charge is for the inspection only and does not cover any adjustments on the car in the event it does not meet the rigid specifications. However, the owner may have his vehicle repaired any place he desires, or do it himself.

Jim Bomar, veteran barber of Crowell and Vernon, and brother of E. P. and Fred Bomar of Crowell, passed away in Vernon early Wednesday morning following a long illness. He had made his home in Vernon for more than thirty years.

Born in Nashville, Tenn., on May 7, 1879, Mr. Bomar came to Texas in 1880 and lived in Crowell and Foard County before moving to Vernon in 1913. He worked as a cowboy on ranches in this section before entering the barber business. He is a veteran of World War I.

Funeral services will be held at 3:30 p. m. today (Thursday) in the Central Christian Church in Vernon with Rev. Kenneth Teagarden officiating.

Serving as pall bearers will be M. V. Lyles, Hunter Hobson, Jerry Freese, Lee Probst and P. L. Ribble, all of Vernon, and N. J. Roberts of Crowell.

Interment will be in the East View Memorial Park in Vernon under the direction of the Underwood Funeral Home.

## Practical Nursing Course Being Offered by Vernon Schools

The Foard County Hospital has just been notified that a course in Vocational (Practical) Nursing will be offered by the Vernon Public Schools in cooperation with the Vernon hospitals. The course will cover twelve months, and will include both classroom and practical courses. It will be open to women between the ages of 18 and 45 years who are in good mental and physical health, and have completed two years of high school work successfully.

Cost of the course will be nominal, and will enable the women completing the course to take the state examinations for a license to practice as a Vocational Nurse. A certificate will also be given each person who successfully completes the course.

The preparation for the state examinations will be very important in the future because of the state law that was enacted last spring that covers the field of practical nursing. In brief, this law states that after one year it will be necessary to stand examination before being licensed to do vocational or practical nursing, and after six years it will be unlawful to nurse for hire without such a license, or a license covering the field of nursing the individual is engaged in.

## Gordon Erwin is Attending Red Cross Aquatic School

William Gordon Erwin of Crowell is among the 74 students enrolled in the national American Red Cross Aquatics School now in progress at Texas State College for Women.

The school has been located at TSCW for the second successive year because of the excellent equipment available, including canoes, rowboats, sailboats, outdoor and indoor swimming pools, and college facilities at Lake Dallas.

Leaders and instructors are being trained in first aid, water safety and accident prevention. Included in the course are supervision of aquatics programs, senior life saving and boating, advanced swimming, accident prevention, leadership training, and standard, advanced, and instructors' courses in first aid.

## Crowell Public Schools Will Open Fall Term on Monday, September 3; Faculty Meeting to Be Held Saturday, Sept. 1

The Crowell Public Schools will open on Monday, September 3, according to Superintendent Grady Graves. The High School pupils will register during the week preceding the beginning of school as has been customary for the past several years. The Crowell High School officials will be at Truscott on Monday, August 27, to register the high school students of that community. Thalia high school pupils will register at the Thalia school house on Tuesday morning, August 28, and the Crowell high school pupils can register here on Wednesday, Thursday or Friday mornings.

There will be a faculty meeting for all of Crowell's teachers on Saturday morning, September 1, at nine o'clock.

There will be a deviation in the program for the first day of school this year from that of the past for the grades above the fourth. The primary department will conduct classes for only a half of the day, while the intermediate and high school departments will have classes until three o'clock so this can count on average daily attendance. The primary department does not give final exams at mid-term and will make up its attendance at that time. A recreation program will be conducted for those primary children who have to wait for the buses on the first day.

The school cafeteria will operate on the first day this year. It has not been opening until the second day in the past. Mrs. Clint Simmons will be the manager of the cafeteria again this year. Other women who will help operate the cafeteria are Mrs. Inos Taylor, Mrs. George Fox, Mrs. Carl Cox and Mrs. Allen Taylor. Miss Mildred Tampion will replace Mrs. J. C. Tampion as secretary for the cafeteria and superintendent's office.

## Heavy Rain Falls Over County on Tuesday Night

A good rain covered all parts of the county Tuesday night and measured 1.02 inches by the Government gauge at the Crowell State Bank. The rain broke a dry spell here which extended over a period of several weeks, accompanied by extremely hot weather. The cotton crop experienced a severe set-back and the feed crop also suffered damage.

In the south and east portions of the county the precipitation was heavier than recorded at Crowell and in the north and west parts it was lighter. Most of the Thalia community received a good rain Monday night. In the Foard City community, Grady Halbert reported 3 inches and in the Good Creek community Sty Barker reported 2 inches.

The rain continued to fall most of the forenoon Wednesday and the skies remained cloudy with indications of more rain.

With an abundance of moisture the crops and grass will be revived and conditions will be most favorable for the sowing of fall wheat early and the prospects will be good for winter pasture for livestock. The rain also broke one of the longest and more severe heat waves here in many years.

Another rain of from 1 to 2 inches fell in Crowell Wednesday night.

## First Bale 1951 Cotton Ginned Here Friday, August 17

The first bale of 1951 Foard County cotton was ginned at the Farmers Co-Op. Gin in Crowell, last Friday, August 17. It was announced by H. C. Duncan, manager of the gin. The bale weighed 610 pounds and sold for 32½ cents per pound. Seed from the bale sold for \$70.00 per ton.

You can plainly see that if your grain drill is loaded with an assortment of seed grain, pieces of straw, grain hulls and weed seeds, your standing crop will show up with many bare or thin spots, where you have sown trash instead of good seeds. Thorough machine cleaning takes out almost all of this foreign matter.

bunt on the seed. In fact, to the unaided eye, the seed may appear free of stinking smut and with certain weather conditions the resulting field may be 50 percent bunted. So wheat growers should not take this chance when they can be absolutely sure of not having bunt for only 1¢ to 5¢ per acre. This insurance may be had by treating the seed with a good disinfectant just as it leaves the cleaner or 24 hours or more before planting. Your County Agent can direct you to a cleaning and treating machine, or tell you how to do it yourself.

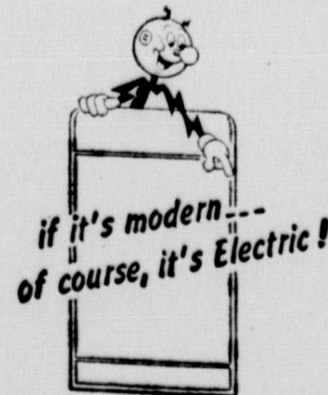

**House Joint Resolution No. 2**

Proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. 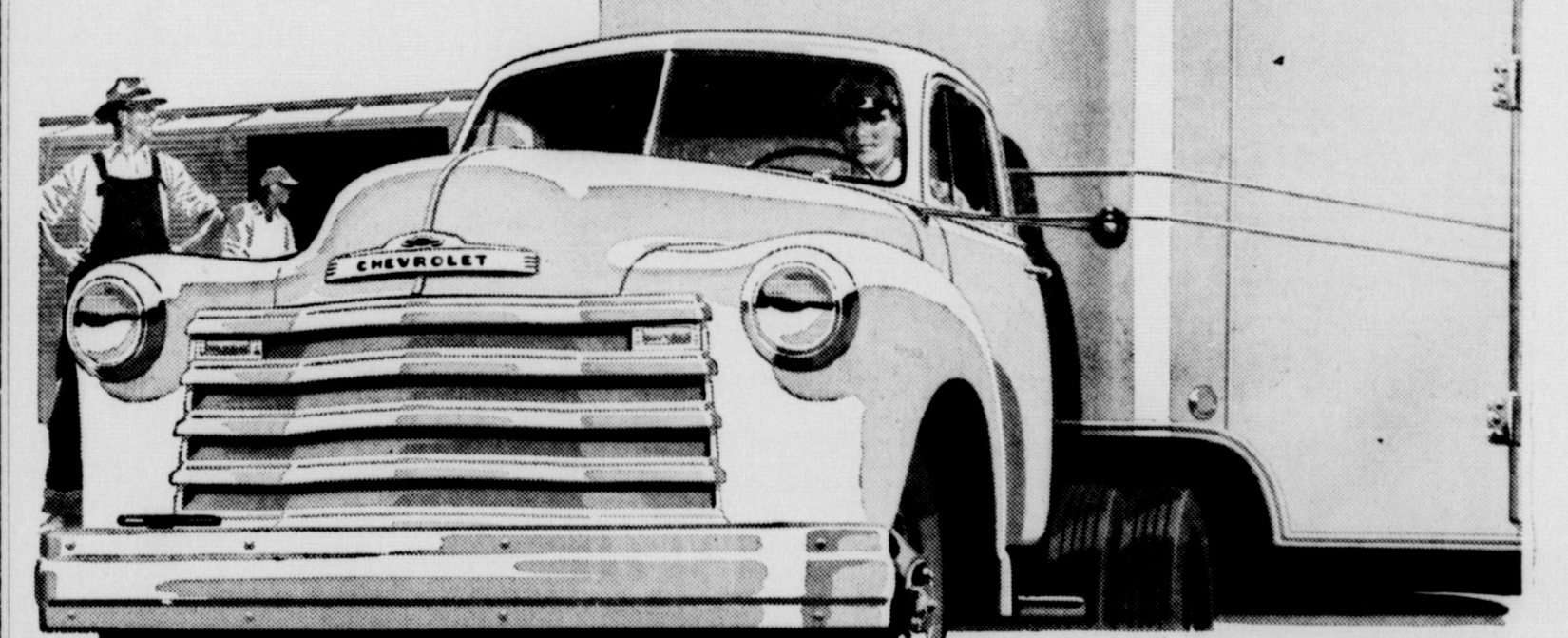

Crape Myrtle and Vitex Need Care to Prolong Blooming

The bright blooms of crape myrtle and vitex can add color to fading landscapes this fall. Mrs. Mary D. Brown, Acting County Home Demonstration Agent, says the two plants will bloom into fall if you take care of them.

For one thing, the fading blossoms need to be cut from the plants. If seed form, the plant food is not used in new blooms.

Fertilizer will help sustain the blooming period. The agent says if you did not fertilize the crape myrtle last winter, you need to do it now. What kind of fertilizer? How much to each plant? The agent recommends 2 or 3 cups of 5-10-5 or 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer around the base of a large crape myrtle, and plenty of water immediately to soak the fertilizer into the ground at least 10 inches. Do not use any fertilizer unless plenty of water is available.

A mulch of well-decayed vegetable matter around the shrubs will hold moisture during dry weather. Check the shrubs for mildew, and dust with cotton dusting sulphur if necessary.

Use the same procedure for prolonging blooms on other summer flowering shrubs. Cut off the faded flowers, fertilize and water frequently, for continued blooms on crape myrtle or vitex plants.

Once it gets into the body, it penetrates the blood stream and produces acute blood poisoning. Vaccination is the only dependable way of protecting livestock against this disease.

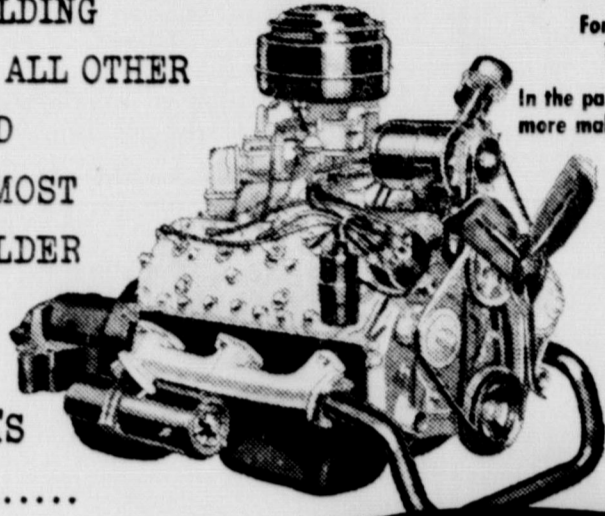

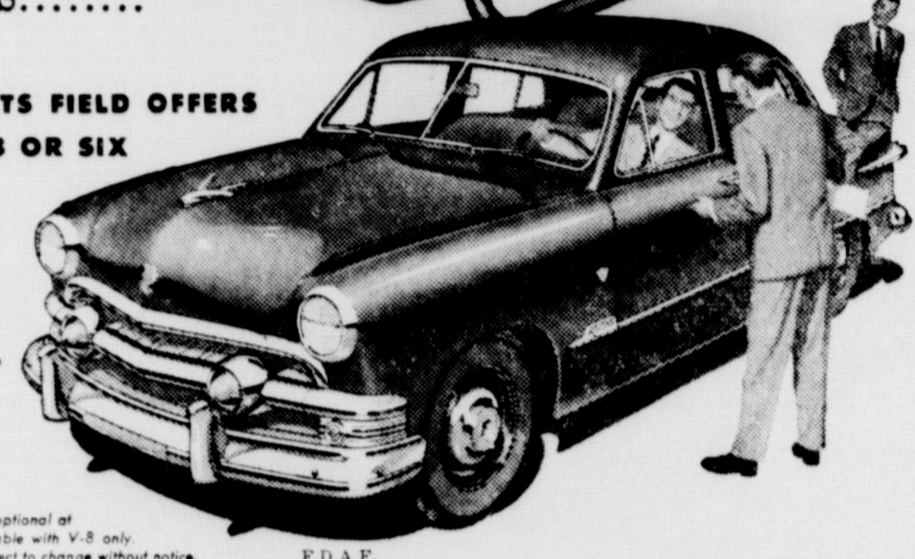

**House Joint Resolution No. 6**  
Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.  
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of sale have been expended for normal living expenses, and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000) per year.

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas. 3-4tc

## Home Demonstration Notes

MARY DEEB BROWN

This week I've been making visits to your club demonstrators, and have found that most of them are doing work that we will all be interested in hearing about. As soon as I finish these visits I will tell you about some of them.

Many of you are making pickles now and have asked numerous questions about them. Many of you already have the new pickle and relish bulletins from my office. However, for those of you who don't have this bulletin yet, here are some important points to watch when making pickles.

Soft, slippery pickles will result from: pickles exposed above the brine; brine too weak; pickles stored in too warm a place; pickles cooked too long. Soft pickles cannot be made firm again.

Darkened pickles are caused by: using hard water; using ground spices; food coming in contact with iron in water or utensils.

Hollow pickles may be the result of: faulty development of cucumber, hollow ones usually float. Cucumbers stand too long after gathering before brining—should not stand more than 24 hours. Hollow cucumbers may be used in sliced or chopped pickles.

Shriveled pickles are caused by placing in too strong salt or sugar solution or too strong vinegar. Put in weaker solution first, increasing strength later if desired.

Formation of scum in pickles should be removed frequently to prevent bottom pickles being affected.

## NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES

THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF FOARD.

TO the Resident Qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Foard County, Texas:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 8th day of September, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 23rd day of July, 1951, which is as follows:

On this 23rd day of July, 1951, the Commissioners Court of Foard County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Crowell, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

Leslie Thomas, County Judge; Bill Bell, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; Bax Middlebrook, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; C. N. Barker, Commissioner Precinct No. 3; Tom Bursey, Commissioner Precinct No. 4; being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:

Commissioner Bell introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Bursey. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners Bell, Middlebrook, Barker, Bursey.

NOES: Commissioners None.

The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80c) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Foard County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes auth-

orized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided:

Therefore, Be It Ordered by the Commissioners Court of Foard County, Texas:

That a special election be held in said County on the 8th day of September, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Foard County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding twenty-five Cents (25c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding thirty-five Cents (35c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding fifteen Cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"For Re-Allocation of County Taxes."

"Against Re-Allocation of Taxes."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Precinct No. 1, County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse in the town of Crowell, Texas; Luther Tamplen, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 2, County Judge's Office in the Courthouse in the town of Crowell, Texas; L. A. Andrews, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 3, County Welfare Office in the Courthouse in the town of Crowell, Texas; R. C. Johnson, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 4, County Attorney's Office in the Courthouse in the town of Crowell, Texas; S. W. Gentry, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 5, Schoolhouse in the town of Margaret, Texas; W. F. Bradford, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 6, office of the Farmers' Gin at Thalia, Texas; C. L. Adkins, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 7, Schoolhouse in the town of Thalia, Texas; Raymond Grimm, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 8, Schoolhouse in the town of Foard City, Texas; Floyd Borchardt, presiding officer.

Precinct No. 11, office of the Lockett Gin in the town of Rayland, Texas; Tom Lawson, presiding officer.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words, "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Foard County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.
