Home Demonstration Notes MARY DEEB BROWN

Next month your cereal leader will give you a demonstration on buying cereals wisely and my demonstration will be on making rugs. Then early next year you will have another meeting on rug making.

The autumn foliage will soon be at its very loveliest and most of us enjoy using them in our homes as decoration.

To prevent the leaves from curling and drying up, set ends of stems in a solution of two parts glycerine and one part water. As this liquid is absorbed by the stems, add plain water when necessary.

After about three weeks the branches should be pretty well saturated and require no additional water unless, of course, they are in a very warm temperature. This is supposed to be equally effective with magnolia and other leaves used at Christmas.

"Don't forget October 27 is Achievement Day for all the Home Demonstration Clubwomen of Foard County," says Mrs. Brown. Each club will be displaying things they have made during the year and each club woman will have an entry in the bake show.

"Come and see what we've been doing in club work," invites Mrs. Brown.
