COTTON PRICES

Austin, Texas, Nov. 13—Cotton prices have strengthened substantially in recent weeks, Dr. A. B. Cox of the University of Texas, reported.

The cotton marketing professor cited four factors contributing to the trend: a 500,000 bale reduction in estimates of world production, U. S. cotton growers' holding of their 1951 crops, a government prediction that the scarcity of cotton will extend into the 1952-crop season, and the inflation threat.

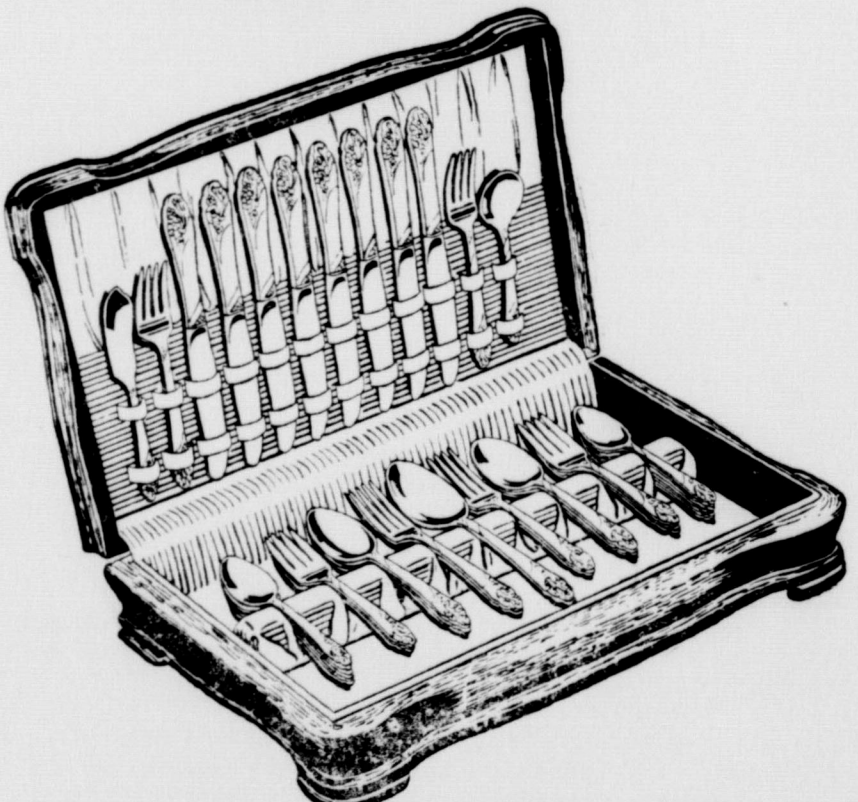
