## C. H. S. Wildcats Win Season's Opener from Seymour 26-14 Last Friday Night; Play Paducah Here Tomorrow Night

The Crowell High School Wildcat football team established themselves as favorites to cop the 1A-9 district championship when they defeated their old AA rivals, the Seymour Panthers, at Seymour last Friday night by the score of 26 to 14 before a sell-out crowd. Several hundred Crowell fans followed the Wildcats to Seymour for the game.

The blocking and tackling of the Wildcat linemen contributed to the victory more than anything else. However, the running of Raymond Halencak, Ginger Johnson, James Denton and Wayne Borchardt looked good at times. Denton, who was crippled in the Floydada scrimmage and unable to play but a very little at Seymour, turned in the longest run of the game for 52 yards and set Crowell's third touchdown up. The Wildcats were trailing 14 to 13 early in the fourth quarter when this run was made. It placed the ball on Seymour's seven yard line. He ran the touchdown over three

## Two Foard County Men Join American Hereford Association

John P. Cogdell and Otis Gafford, both of Crowell have been named to membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

One hundred seventy-three Hereford breeders were placed on the Association's official roster during August to boost the total membership to an all-time high of 21,290. Members represent every state in the nation. In addition to the membership roster, the Association maintains active accounts for approximately 80,000 Hereford breeders.

The Hereford Association last year recorded a new world record of 506,061 purebred calves, an increase of 79,090 over the record established during the previous fiscal year. Hereford calves registered last year were two and a half times the total registrations of other major beef breeds combined.

Mr. Ward passed away Saturday morning at his home. He had been in ill health since January of this year.

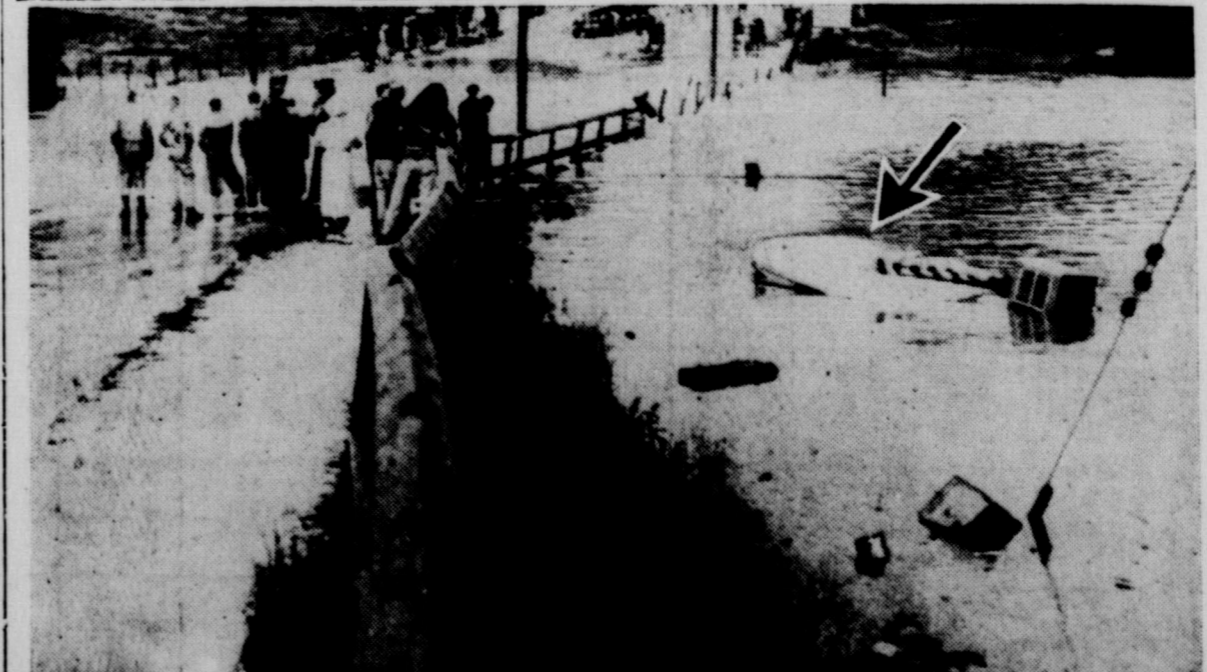
## 88 YEARS OLD

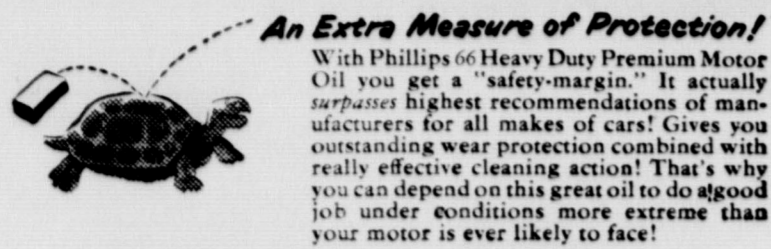

A happy home is the object of the family relationship and child development studies. The annual play school for pre-school children gives the girls first hand experience in dealing with children.

Home nursing, first aid, and safety are taught in the health unit. The Home Ec students work in cooperation with the Red Cross. Each student earns a Red Cross card.

The cooking unit consists of more than just preparing food. Studies in nutrition teach the student how to serve a well rounded, appetizing meal. They learn the vitamin and mineral requirements

for each meal.

Mrs. Doyle Kenner, instructor in home economics, explained that home ec is also a good course for the future career girls. "Any career that the girl goes into can be guided and advised in home economics." All the units that are studied in home ec are helpful to the career as well as the young wife.

The extra curricular activities of the Future Homemakers of America stress the social aspect of the girls' lives.

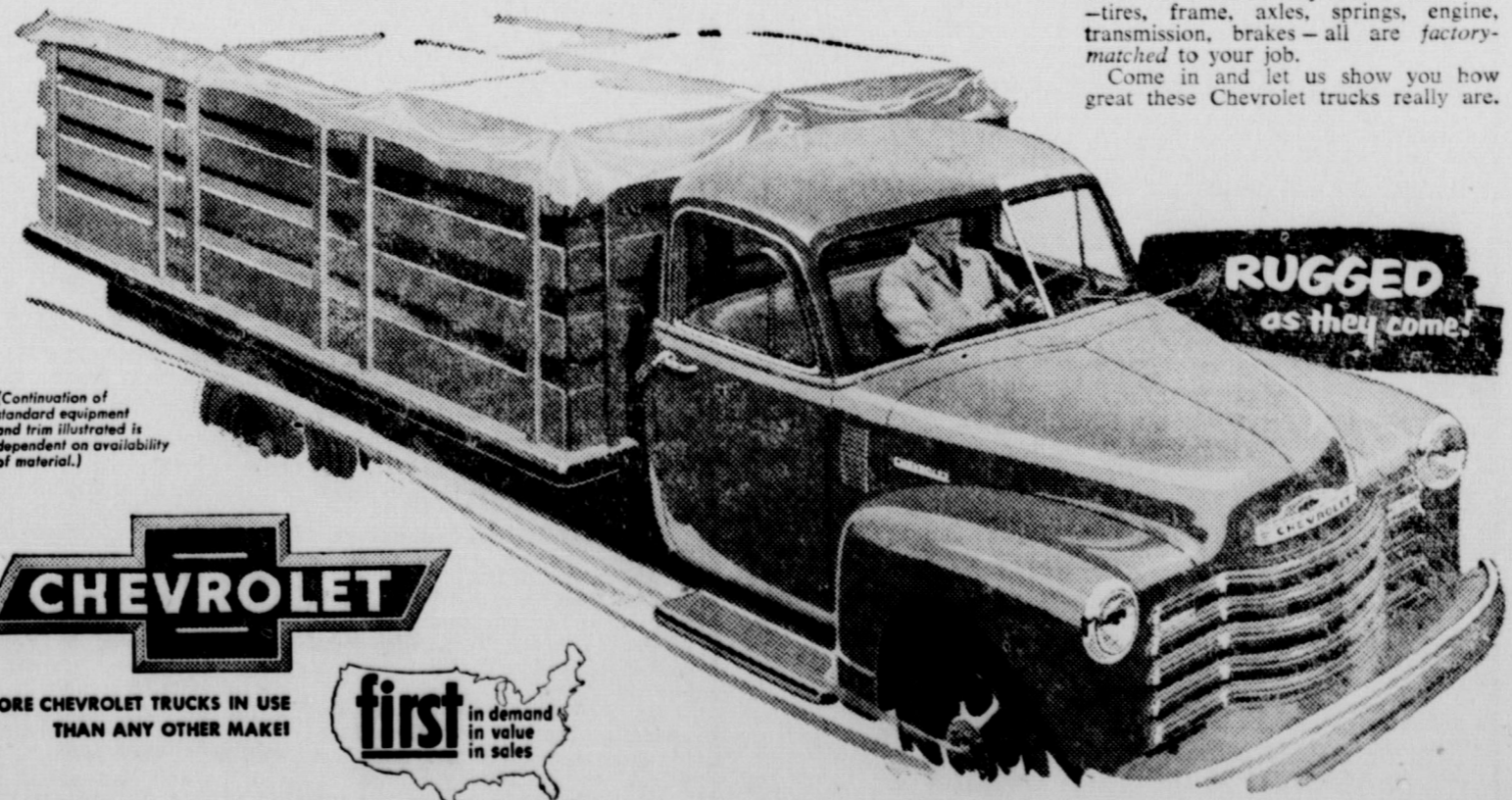

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**LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY**



Considerably smaller supplies of livestock arrived at Fort Worth and at the nation's 12 major public markets as the Mid-September market week opened Monday. Highly uneven prices were in evidence, with the trend steady to stronger on most cattle and calves with some sales 50 cents higher. Cows sold fully 50 cents, spots \$1 higher. Other classes of cattle and calves, including stockers, were getting a bit better action than was evident in the dull close of a week earlier. Hogs opened the week with a 25-cent advance and topped at \$19.75. Sows were steady at \$15 to \$17.

Sheep and lambs were generally steady, the kinds considered. High quality and highly finished kinds were very scarce, or absent.

In seeking reasons for the recent drop of prices, the trade believes:

Persistent refusal of normal demand for stockers and feeders to develop has been a tremendous factor in the slumping cattle and calf trade. However, packers again pointed to sharp reduction of wholesale prices of most kinds of calf meat and reiterated their inability to work out from under the inventories even at reduced prices. Cow beef, grasser steers and boned out beef were moving sluggishly in the meat channels because of large supplies.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$24 to \$30. Plain and medium kinds sold at \$15 to \$24, with cull yearlings \$12 to \$15. Fat cows sold from \$14.50 to \$19.50, with canners and cutters at \$10 to \$14.50. Bulls sold from \$13 to \$20.

Good and choice fat calves cleared at \$21 to \$28.25, with common and medium sorts from \$15 to \$20, and culls at \$12 to \$14. Stocker calves ranged from \$18 to \$27.50, and stocker yearlings bulked at \$15 to \$26. Stocker heifers sold at \$24 down, stocker cows drew \$14 to \$20.

Fat lambs sold from \$20 to \$25, stocker and feeder lambs drew \$10 to \$19, and culls sold from \$8 to \$10. Fat yearling wethers sold from \$15 to \$19, and stocker yearling wethers sold from \$10 to \$14. Yearling ewes sold from \$17 down. Slaughter ewes sold for \$6 to \$7 and old wethers drew \$10 down. Two- and three-year-old wethers sold from \$12.50 down. Old bucks sold for \$6 to \$6.50.

Hog top Monday was \$19.75 and packing sows ended the week at \$15 to \$17.

Here is our recipe for the week for "Super" Meat Balls:

One and one-half lbs. ground beef; three-fourths cup catsup (quarter cup in meat balls, half cup in sauce) one teaspoon salt, two teaspoons mustard, two teaspoons mustard, two teaspoons Worcestershire sauce, half teaspoon salt, quarter cup flour, third cup meat drippings, 12 small onions, 12 small potatoes, two cups carrots, 2 cups milk or broth, one recipe for biscuit.

Add quarter cup catsup and one teaspoon salt to ground meat. Form into balls, roll in flour and brown in fat. Make sauce of meat drippings, flour and milk or broth. Add seasonings or mustard, horseradish, Worcestershire sauce and half teaspoon salt.

Pre-cook the onions, potatoes and carrots. Arrange the vegetables and meat balls in a casserole. Pour sauce over them. Place biscuits on top. Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Serve from casserole.
