The chairman of the Committee on Government Operation has this week announced the assignment of Representative Frank Ikard, 13th Texas District, to the Military Operations Subcommittee.

The Military Operations Subcommittee is charged with the re-sponsibility of studying and making our military (other than combat) activities at all levels more economical and efficient. The work of this subcommittee,

will include determining whether in the Armed Services there is a waste of manpower or of dollars. If so, where, and specifically, how better results may be brought about by change in methods, procedure, and legislation.

The prinicpal function of this subcommittee will be of an investigative nature, with particular reference to the expenditures of defense appropriations in an ef-fort to eliminate wasteful, extrav-grant and iniudician sectors.
