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



Cutworms have recently been fields of wheat while other fields in Foard County have few or no worms to be found in them. The worms are apparently very spotted. From the way these infestations are showing up, it is quite possible that this pest will con-

tinue to spread.

Many of these worms are so small they are very hard to see; therefore, if you have noticed your stand of wheat disappearing, look closely for these worms. Cutworms usually stay in the soil during the day time and come out to feed at night. Sometimes on afternoon conducted by Bro. L.
