and simple Model T. Henry Ford predicted early in the century that the automobile would give the country good roads making it easier for the farmer

to bring his crops to market. His prediction came true soon-er than anybody expected. By 1927, the roads were so good that the heavy duty, high riding Model T became outmoded. Ford then brought out his famous Model A, with a standard gear shift transmission.

In 1938, after the Model A had been discarded in favor of the Ford V-8, the company en-tered the medium-priced field

tered the medium-priced held with the Mercury. Henry Ford died on April 7, 1947, at the age of 83. He was active to his last day. A simple and hard working man, he was one of the few Americans who became famous and successful without leaving his home town. He died at his estate in Dearborn, only a mile from the farm houses where he was born. His tremenwhere he was born. His tremen-dous manufacturing plant at the Rouge, the biggest in the world, was in his home town too. Following V-J Day, the com-pany had many problems. During the depression of the 1930's Ford had lost its position at the head

the depression of the 1930's Ford had lost its position at the head of the industry. The company's operating procedure, with control centered in a few hands, was as outmoded as the Model T. Plant facilities were inadequate and working conditions needed improvement.

The young Henry Ford tackled the job of building an automobile company all over again. He brought new blood into executive positions and completely reorgan-ized every branch under a decen-tralization policy.




To be eligible to take the test, applicant (1) must be a draft gistrant who intends to request tudent deferment, (2) must be atisfactorily pursuing full-time college work leading to a degree, nd (3) must not previously have aken the test.

Criteria for student deferment at present are either (1) score of or better on the test, or (2) lass standing among male members in upper half of the fresh-man, upper two-thirds of the ophomore, or upper three-fourths of the junior classes.

Seniors accepted for admission to a graduate school satisfy the criteria if they are among the upper half of the male members f their senior class, or if they nake a score of 75 or better. These criteria are guides for ocal boards. The draft boards are
