## Foard High School's One-Act Play, "Senior Freedom," Takes First Place in District Meet Here Last Week End

Foard High School's one-act production of "Senior Freedom" won first place honors in District 1A-11 one-act play contest held here last Thursday and Friday. "Judge Lynch," written by Chillicothe, was second place, and "An Empty Stage" was third place winner of the contest. The play was presented by the two-day tournament. The members of the winning production include Billy Johnson, Marcia Kincaid, Oleta Lankford, Mary Ermine Cooper and Goble. Other members of production personnel are stage manager, V. A. Smith; sound effect, Don Kidd; and prop and make-up are Leta Lyons, Francene Coffey, Betty Bartley, Wanda Jones and Jackie Rasberry.

Dr. Jennie Louise Hindman, head of the Speech Department at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, was judge for the tournament. Dr. Hindman commended highly the plays, direction, and acting ability that were evident in the plays presented. Heading the all-district cast, which includes three boys and three girls, were Crowell's Billy Johnson, and Marcia Kincaid. Jerry Andrews of Olney and Granville Bragg of Chillicothe were judged as second and third place actors, respectively. Second and third place actresses were Betty Sue Davis and Pat Hill, both of Chillicothe.

Schools presenting plays in the tournament were Olney, Holliday, Archer City, Seymour, Iowa Park, Burk Burnett, Electra, Chillicothe and Crowell. By virtue of capturing top honors in this tournament, the local play cast will represent this district in the area meet in Wichita Falls Senior High School on April 17.

## Rotary Club of Crowell Will Celebrate Its 25th Anniversary April 8th with Banquet; Jeff Williams to Be Speaker

The Rotary Club of Crowell, which was organized in April, 1928, will celebrate its 25th anniversary on Wednesday night, April 8th, with a banquet and program at the Crowell School cafeteria.

The featured speaker on the program will be Jeff H. Williams of Chickasha, Okla., lawyer, humorist, philosopher. Mr. Williams is a past District Governor and past director of Rotary International and has served as chairman or member of most of the major committees of Rotary International.

Mr. Williams has spoken in every state in the nation and in several overseas countries, and, over the past ten years, has traveled more than half a million miles by airplane, to say nothing of travel by train, bus and private car, speaking to audiences all over America. He is generally recognized as "Oklahoma's Ambassador of Good Will," a speaker and raconteur of international fame, and has been designated an official "Arkansas Traveler" by legislative enactment of the Arkansas Legislature.

Jeff Williams is a confirmed optimist. He has implicit faith in the future and thinks that in the long run everything is going to be all right with us down here. His philosophy — "Our privileges are many, our opportunities are vast, our responsibilities are great. For unto whom much is given—much is required."

**GRADE REPORTS RECEIVED**  
Grade reports for some of last year's graduates from Crowell High School have been received by Mr. Black, principal. Most of these have been excellent, which makes us very proud. Among these reports was that of Camille Todd of Stephens College of Columbia, Mo. She received an A in five subjects, B in two, and C in one. Thanks, Camille, for this excellent report. This is another indication that Crowell High's standards can rank with the best.

**BIOLOGY**  
Mr. Welch's biology class which is made up of sophomores, juniors, and seniors has done some very interesting experiments since September. They have operated on practically everything from flowers to cats and have just recently done some budding and grafting experiments on Mr. Black's orchard. They hope to get satisfactory results. The most interesting experiment, however, is still underway, and that is the setting of about 80 eggs in an incubator furnished by Chun Gafford. The eggs were put in the incubator on March 12, and are expected to hatch on April 2, 21 days after they were set. Each day two members of the class turn the eggs, a procedure which is very necessary and every four days an egg is broken and the changes are observed. On the 4th day of incubation the embryo of the chick had already formed and a small amount of blood had formed in the vicinity of the heart. This embryo was placed on a slide on the micro projector and the changes were noted in great detail. The tiny heart could be seen beating and the skeleton was beginning to take shape. On the 8th day the embryo had increased 20 times and the general body confirmation could easily be seen. The head, wings and feet

were distinctly formed, although at this early stage the embryo was only about the size of a navy bean. On the twelfth day another egg was opened, and at this stage of development the dawn began to appear, the toenails were plainly visible, and the embryo was more than three times as large as the eighth day specimen. This experiment will continue and two more eggs will be broken and studied before the hatching date. The class will also observe the hatching procedure.

**SENIOR FREEDOM AWARDED TROPHY**  
"Senior Freedom," Crowell's 1-act contest play, took top honors at the district meet held here last Thursday and Friday. The contest began at 7 o'clock Thursday evening, continuing at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon, and after the final three presentations Friday night Crowell walked away with honors and a beautiful trophy. The judge was Dr. Jeannie Louise Hindman of Midwestern University.

Capturing second and third places were Chillicothe's "Judge Lynch" and Electra's "Fantasy on an Empty Stage." Other entries were Seymour, Archer City, Olney, Holliday, Iowa Park, and Burkburnett. Large crowds attended each performance, and the auditorium was filled to capacity to witness the presentation of awards and the selection of the all-star cast Friday night. The top three male actors were Billy Johnson of Crowell, Jerry Andrews of Olney and Granville Bragg of Chillicothe.

The all-star girls were Marcia Kincaid of Crowell, Betty Sue Davis of Chillicothe and Pat Hill of Chillicothe. Dr. Hindman offered to explain to the casts and their directors the reasons for her choice as well as constructive criticisms. "When I must choose a winning play, I look for a well cast play whose actors can draw the magic circle for me." She explained that by this she meant a play that lives and can capture her belief as well as sympathy and emotions in the existing situation.

The members of the CHS one-act play cast wish to take this means of expressing their sincere thanks to everyone who helped in any way in making the tournament a success. Thanks a lot, folks!
