## Paducah Dragons Win District 1A-9 Championship with 27-7 Win Over Crowell Wildcats Last Friday Night

Paducah Dragons remained undefeated football team last week when they won the District 1A-9 championship with a 27-7 victory over the Crowell Wildcats on Friday night. The Dragons scored again just before the half when Sandefur, Paducah's quarterback, threw a thirty-yard pass to Billy Burns, a play good for 57 yards and another touchdown. Sandefur kicked the extra point to make the halftime score 13-0. Biddy scored Paducah's third touchdown on a beautiful 26-yard run early in the third quarter. Sandefur converted again to make the count 20-0. The Wildcats started rolling immediately following this score to mark up their only counter of the contest. Crowell started on its own 39-yard line. Wayne Borchardt picked up 15 yards. Paducah was penalized for 15. Pittillo made 10. Graves 4. Denton 3. Pittillo 2, and a pass from Gordon Graves, quarterback, to DuWayne Elliott, left end, for nine yards was good for Crowell's only touchdown of the game. Elliott kicked the extra point to make the score 20-7. Hershel Thaxton, left halfback for Paducah, scored from the one-yard line in the fourth quarter. Short gains through the line carried the ball from Paducah's 32-yard line. Biddy ran the extra point over after Crowell had been penalized to the one for an off-side. This made the final count 27-7. This was the first time Paducah had won from Crowell in a football game since 1947. The Crowell players never did indicate that they had given up until the final whistle. The Paducah coaches did not take any chances with reserves until the last two minutes of the contest.

## Conservation News of District

Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District, Lower Pease River District Board; W. C. Howland, Grady Halbert, O. T. Holmes, O. H. Brandon, H. L. ... Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 11, supervisors of this district in the court house at Crowell to conduct regular business of the district. Those attending were O. T. Holmes, Grady Halbert, O. H. Brandon, W. C. Howland and Roy Ayers, supervisors; Stockard, Hardeman County; Hensley D. Clayton and E. Harris of the Soil Conservation Service. Soil and water conservation projects completed this week include 9051 feet of terraces, 2320 feet of diversion terraces, and one acre on the Lloyd Swendell located two miles northeast of Quannah. The waterway will be used to direct water from the erosion terrace to pasture land protected with a good cover grass. Earl Brown, another cooperater of the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District, has a good bed of alfalfa in a waterway was constructed a few weeks ago. The alfalfa was planted in a flat bottom waterway to divert the soil from eroding during rains of high rainfall. Five soil conservation plans were approved by the board on 30 acres. Those becoming operators of the district were: Bert Speers, T. J. Adams, J. T. Howard, T. C. Barbee, and J. T. ... These five new district operators help to make up a total of 1354 soil conservation projects where soil and water conservation is being applied.

**LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY**



The cattle business ran into trouble again this week. For better than two years just about everything seems to have hit the cow business that could have hurt. In the wake of the year's biggest run of cattle to market just a couple of weeks ago, it was felt that certainly the excessive runs were now behind. But look at what happened.

Twelve major markets reported over 160,000 cattle and over 32,000 calves last Monday, the second biggest run of the year.

Following the frost that nipped a lot of Johnson grass and other pasture a week earlier, Fort Worth had its largest run of the year on Monday.

The reports from all markets were the same. Weak to 50 cents lower, some spots 50 cents to \$1 lower.

Cattle and calf prices were saved a worse break by the fact that demand for stocker and feeders was broad on the better kinds. Some 997-pound feeder steers at Fort Worth cashed at \$17. Numerous sales of high grade yearlings and calves were reported in the \$15 to \$17.50 bracket to stocker and feeder outlets.

There was a steady demand for replacement cows. Heifers and heifer calves have a hard time finding a home, except in a packing house.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$17 to \$23, in this bracket were a load of 975-lb. steers from Joyce Coffee, Love County, Okla., at \$23; and a load of 975-lb. steers from Lillie Sullivan, Carter County, Okla., at \$23 and 88 fed heifers from V. O. Hildreth of Parker County at \$21.50. Common and medium steers and yearlings sold from \$10 to \$16, and in this field were a load of 856-lb. steers from Geo. W. Higgins, Baylor County, at \$15; a load of common steers at \$12; and a load of 627 lbs. from Dudley Taylor of Harrison County; a load of steers at 744 lbs. from Boggs Cattle Co. of King County at \$13; Dannie Portwood Fancher of Baylor County had a load of 600 pounders at \$16. B. Allen, Uvalde County, had a load of 879-lb. steers at \$13.50. J. L. Dugan, Taylor County, had three loads of 997-lb. feeder steers at \$17. Ralph Witty, Tarrant County, had about four loads of 672-lb. steer yearlings at \$20. Some shelly kinds of steers and yearlings sold from \$7 to \$9.

Fat cows cleared at \$9 to \$11.50, and a load of heiferettes topped at \$13 and averaged 887 pounds from G. R. Davis, Taylor County. Cannors and cutters drew \$6 to \$9, with some shelly, low yielding cannors below \$6. Bulls cashed at \$7 to \$12.

Good and choice slaughter calves bulked at \$12.50 to \$16, and common and medium sorts sold from \$9 to \$12, with culls from \$7 to \$9.

Good and choice stocker and feeder calves and yearlings drew \$13 to \$17.50. In this bracket were a short load from Wayne Adams, Comanche County, at \$18 lbs. at \$17.50; a load weighing 356 lbs. came from Arthur Teich of Johnson County, a half load at 407 lbs. drew \$15 and 64 head at 408 lbs. drew \$13.50 for D. H. Dawson of Franklin County; Mrs. C. A. Hall, Leon County, had some \$14 calves; J. L. Cooper, Freestone County, had some \$15 calves; Elvin Ott, Erath County,

had some 471-lb. calves at \$17.50 and odd head at \$16. Mrs. Fayette Tankersley, Irion County, marketed some 582-lb. yearlings at \$17. H. C. Thompson, Eastland County, had a load of 425-lb. calves at \$17.25. Morris A. Glimp, Burnet County, had a load of 684-lb. yearlings at \$17.50.

Hogs were steady to 50c higher, topping at \$20.75 to \$21.25. Sows were steady to 50 cents higher at \$19.50 down.

Most sheep and lambs were fully steady, some tippy feeders sold 50 cents higher. Feeder lambs drew \$14 to \$17.50, the latter a new high for the past few months. Woolled fat lambs drew \$16 to \$19, and shorn fat lambs from \$17.50 down. Lower grade lambs drew \$8 to \$14. Old ewes drew \$6 to \$6.50, with stocker ewes \$7 to \$10. Old wethers sold from \$7 to \$10. Slaughter yearlings sold from \$10 to \$15.

An unusual feature of the trade was some top sheep and lambs that came from Louisiana. Many people believe that East Texas and Louisiana are not a desirable ground for sheep raising, but in recent years a number of breeders are getting fine results.

One of these is A. H. Kelley, Benton, Louisiana, who on Monday at Fort Worth topped the market in several classes. His woolled lambs at 88 pounds topped at \$19. Some aged wethers drew \$10. Yearlings sold at \$14. Kelley's sheep and lambs usually top their division when they come to Fort Worth.

**Land Owners Ration Game This Year**

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission reported a "growing tendency" among land owners to protect wildlife species hard hit by the drought.

"One of the natural benefits from the traditional land ownership-management cooperation," he said, "is the authority retained by ranchers and others to control harvest of game from their areas."

"This fall there is an increasing trend toward limiting the take of species that are below normal for one reason or another. From the reports from our field men and from the land owners direct, the endeavor may reach maximum effect this fall."

"Indications are that one major objective of many ranchers and farmers will be protecting quail which have suffered from the drought and from that recurring slump which wildlife biologists term 'the cycle.'"

"Thus it is heartening to anticipate that the precious seed stock of the quail population will be preserved. Our biologists agree that the consideration for the quail at this time can easily set up a rapid recovery from the present quail depletion."

The Executive Secretary pointed out that the General Law on quail, as on deer and other species, is controlled exclusively by the Legislature. He added that, while the harvest under such laws cannot exceed the legal limitations, there is no restriction on curbing the harvest.

## Wild Ducks Invade Fish Hatcheries

The annual hassle to convince migrating wild ducks that state fish hatcheries are exclusively for fish is now under way, according to Marion Toole, Chief Aquatic Biologist for the Game and Fish Commission.

He said practically all of the thirteen state hatcheries have been invaded again this fall.

Some of the traveling waterfowl become a problem, especially the diving ducks which penetrate the bottom and sides of the ponds. These insistent ducks sometimes feed on vegetation along the walls and puncture the sides, causing seepage.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist said the ducks don't bother the fish, but that some of the touring shore birds nab black bass and other species.

He said a good word for the geese. They may drop in for a short stop at an isolated tank but usually get up and get going without making a nuisance of themselves.

## Hunting Costs Seven Texas Lives in 1953

Hunting accidents in 1953 already have cost seven Texas lives, according to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

He cited the fatalities, all occurring since July 1, in a plea for greater safety when hunters opened the 1953 waterfowl season last Friday, Nov. 6.

Luella squirrel hunter found dead from wound caused when he either stumbled or pulled his gun through a fence toward himself.

Pampa big game hunter killed in Colorado by another hunter.

Fort Stockton predator hunter killed by own gun.

Orange man killed when his gun fired while being dragged through brush.

Ranger woman killed by ten-year-old boy while squirrel hunting.

Sandia rabbit hunter killed by own gun while hunting rabbits.

Corrigan man killed by own gun while climbing fence.
