Ten New Inspectors Added to Liquor Control Board

The addition of ten new inspectors by the Texas Liquor Control Board will be of tremendous help in bringing about closer observance of the state's liquor laws, Coke R. Stevenson Jr., the board's administrator, said this week.

A training school for 10 applicants for the position of inspector began Nov. 2, Stevenson announced.

The men were taught rules of evidence, the law as it applies to search warrants, and details of the liquor control act as it applies to both wet and dry territory.

At the end of their training period, and upon passing an examination, the men will be commissioned inspectors.

The names of the trainees were not given because most of them will go into service as undercover men.

Five additional inspectors were authorized by the last session of the Legislature, Stevenson said, and five more are needed to replace men who are no longer with the department.

With the ten new men, the board will have 111 inspectors scattered over the state.

Grand juries of Houston, San Antonio, and many other cities have asked for more L-men to help enforce the liquor laws, Stevenson declared.

He said the enlarged force will be better able to supervise liquor and beer establishments and to watch for movement of beverages

G. M. C. Develops New Type Muffler

After two years of intensive engineering research the GMC Truck and Coach Division has developed an exhaust system for its GMC trucks that renders exhaust noises inoffensive to the human ear, it was announced recently by P. J. Monaghan, vice president of General Motors and general manager of the Division.

Monaghan made the important announcement in Los Angeles during sessions of the American Trucking Association convention which has already had under discussion the subject of truck exhaust noises as one of the truckers' serious public relations problems.

GMC truck models with the newly-designed mufflers and exhaust pipes will be in production next month, the GMC executive said. A special name, "Silent Power," was originated for the system to indicate not only that GMC has eliminated objectionable exhaust noises but has not had to decrease its engine power to achieve it.

Although "Silent Power" system costs more to manufacture, it will be standard equipment at no extra cost to the user.

"When we started work on this two years ago in response to demands by truck operators, we had no formulas or a base line from which to begin," Monaghan explained.

"Our engineers by trial and error method, and in cooperation with muffler manufacturers, finally worked out a system that will absorb those noises so offensive to the ear."

The mufflers are a reverse-flow type, larger than previous units and made more rigid by the use of heavier gauges of metal. New exhaust manifolding and larger exhaust pipes are incorporated in the system. A different system had to be developed for each of GMC's gasoline and diesel engines because of the different volumes of noise to be stifled. "It is our hope that other manufacturers will copy our system so that all operators in the trucking industry eventually will benefit from this development," Monaghan said. "Accordingly, neither GMC nor the muffler manufacturers will attempt to suppress details of the system for competitive reasons."

Fish Commission.
The daily shooting period was extended until sunset and baiting was forbidden altogether.

Here are the major rules for shooting ducks and geese:

Season — From noon last Friday, Nov. 6, through January 4.

Hours—From one half hour before sunup to sunset.

Bag limit (ducks) — Five per day or ten in possession.

Bag limit (geese) — Five per day or five in possession, including in such limit not more than either two Canada geese (or its subspecies, Hutchins or lesser Canada) or two white-fronted geese, or one of each.

Weapons — Use of rifles to kill waterfowl is forbidden; guns must not be larger than ten gauge; all repeaters or automatics must be plugged to a limit of 3 shell capacity.

Boats—Ducks or geese may be taken from outboard motor boat provided motor is removed from boat and placed inside the boat or boat is secured to a shooting blind.

Federal duck stamp costing \$2.00 is required.

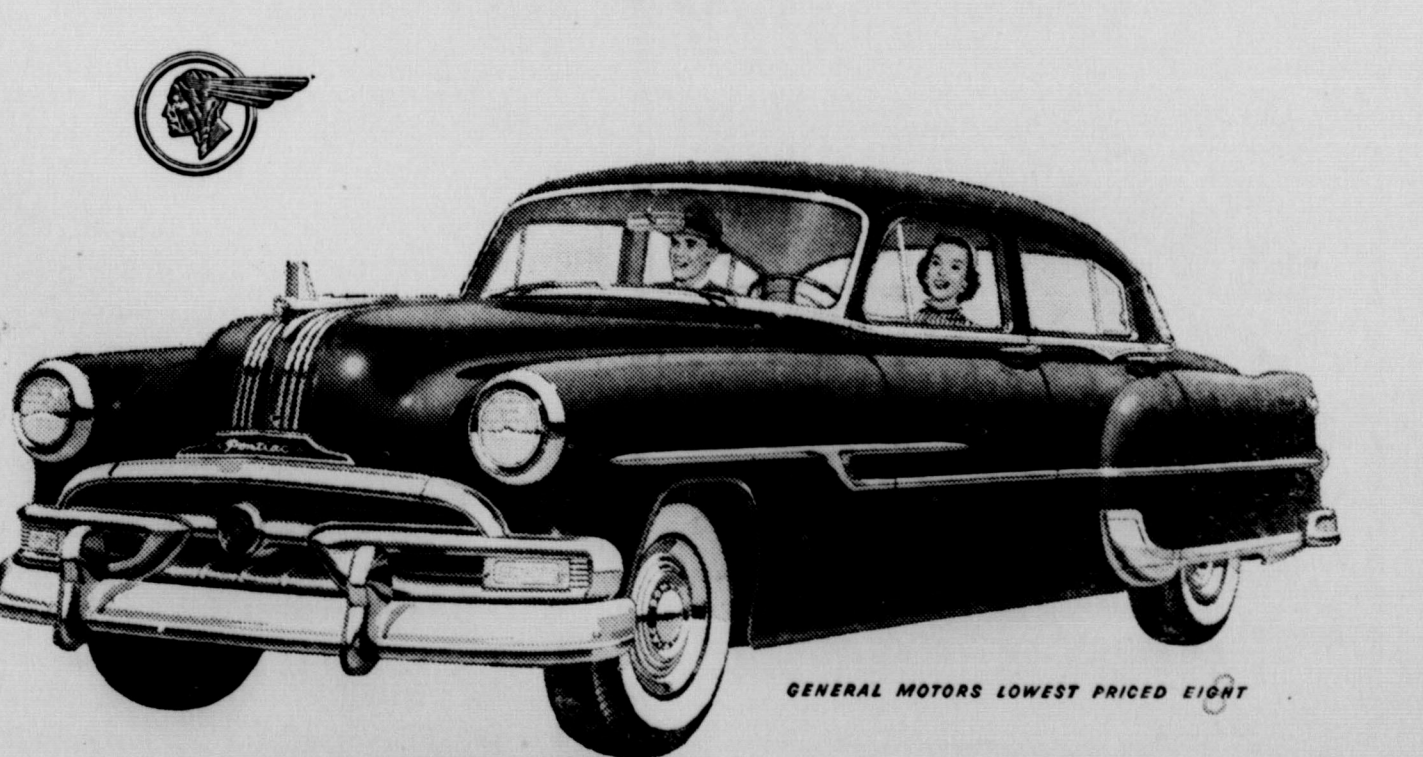

Duck Prospects Look More Favorable

Thanks to recent rains a fair good distribution of duck and geese flights over Texas appears likely, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The main movement of ducks and geese is naturally toward Gulf Coast areas, the Executive Secretary said, but the filling of reservoirs and tanks, and general restoration of water areas will help scatter the concentration and thus provide more sport for Texans.

The Executive Secretary reports from the north indicate that the bulk of the waterfowl are tarrying in their northern feeding areas because of comparatively mild weather. He says hunters in the Canadian states have complained about much blue bird weather.

Reports from the Gulf show that the recent rains have a long dry spell and brought water to the Coastal Plains where the Gulf marshes are stripped of their growth.
