Big Absentee Vote Reflecting Interest

Before the Saturday, April 3, elections were over when the polls were due to close at 7 p.m., a record off-election year vote was expected to be cast in the three elections being held for local government officials.

Most interest was expected to be centered around the Bailey County Hospital District Board election. Seven candidates filed for the four positions to be filled on the board. Incumbents Mrs. J. G. Arn, Sam Damron, D. O. Burelsmith and Freddie Parkman were opposed by Ernest Locker, C. G. (Grundy) Lewis and A. R. McGuire.

The Bailey County Hospital District Board was formed approximately two and a half years ago to study the hospital situation in Muleshoe. After studying the situation legislation was introduced to allow the formation of a hospital district in the county. An election was held on May 16, 1970 to authorize \$950,000 in bonds and authorizing a hospital district to be set up. After the proposals were approved by voters, a law suit was filed contesting the election.

After local courts ruled the election legal, an appeal was made to the Court of Civil

Appeals in Amarillo. The Court of Civil appeals then ruled the election was legal.

Controversy has continued in the hospital issue and voting was expected to be very heavy in the election of officers the hospital board.

A total of 59 persons had cast absentee votes in the hospital board election before the

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Easter Egg Hunt Slated Saturday

\$31,770 Paid For Crop Loss County Farmers

With the many "ifs" present in today's agriculture outlook, more and more Bailey County farmers are turning to the stabilizing influence of crop investment insurance to make certain of a guaranteed income.

George Clark, field representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation from the district at Lubbock, says insurance safeguards now are available on Cotton and Grain Sorghum in the county to help

guarantee a cash return at harvest. Some 67 crops in the county already are protected by the All-Risk insurance with their owners underwriting \$314,937 in guaranteed agriculture

income no matter what natural hazard should destroy the crops between planting and harvest. Despite the relatively good crop year just past, losses were paid in most areas of the state due principally to early freeze and insects. In Bailey County the insured loss totalled \$31,770, according to official estimates.

"FCIC insured farmers are using their insurance not only to protect crop investment dollars, but to strengthen credit, to reduce specialization risks, to aid in long-term financing of expansion programs and to allow maximum use of operating capital.

"All these add up to the sound money management farmers need to cope with the changes and uncertainties in agriculture," George Clark says.

Texas farmers pledged more than \$3,051,000 in crop insurance protection last year to secure farm operating loans. On a national basis this total was more than \$60 million.

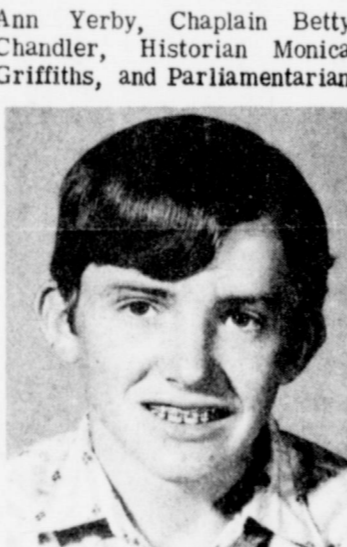

The program was enjoyed by those who attended.

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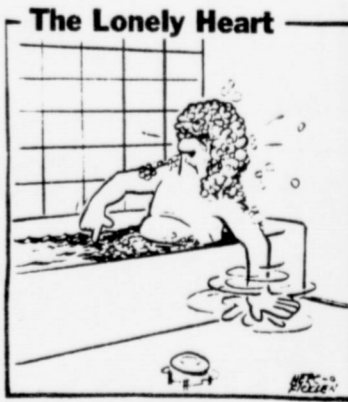


