# **Nearly Inch Over Average for Month**

Rainfall thus far in June in Crowell is almost an inch over the normal rainfall for the entire month. Total for the month thus far is 3.79 inches, and the normal for the month is 2.9 inches. Last Wednesday night, 2 inches of rain was recorded here; .4 inch Saturday night and .3 inch Sunday night, as measured by the

government gauge. The remainder of the wheat, oats and barley crops of the county are still uncut, with fields too wet to support combines. The rains have undoubtedly affected the test weight, but other than that, very little damage to the uncut grain is reported. With several days of dry weather, combines can finish
