When your home food freezer needs defrosting, don't put the big job off. A clean box actually leads to more economical operation and longer life of the unit It's difficult to set up a regular schedule, so defrost when the sides of the box become frosted with one-half inch of ice or more, says Mrs. Mary D. Brown, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Mrs. Brown explains that ice acts as a blanket over the refrigerating coils. The heavier the coating, the longer the machinery must run to produce a zero de-gree temperature, the best temperature for keeping frozen meats, regetables or fruits.


