Nut Sponge Cake 1./2 lb. shelled nuts (peanuts, walnuts, black walnuts, Brazil nuts, almonds, hazelmuts or pecans), 6 tablespoons all-purpose flour, 1 teaspoon cream of tarter, 10 eggs, 1 and 1/4 cups sugar, teaspoon vanilla extract. Pre-heat oven at 375 degrees F. Line bottom of a 10-inch tube pan with waxed paper. Grease the paper. Grind the nuts in a food grinder, using medium blade. This requires about 15 minutes with electric mixer. Add vanilla flavoring. The yolk mixture should be light in color, thick and very smooth. Bake 50 minutes in 375 degrees F oven or initia she text degrees F. oven or until cake test-er comes out dry when tested in center of cake. Invert cake on wire rack. Cool about 1 to 2 hours. Nuts must be weighed. A cup measurement will not work.


