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

The Second Infantry Division, currently stationed at Fort Lewis, Washington, is becoming a part of the Army's "Operation Gyroscope," which assigns a home and an overseas base to specified divisions with routine rotation between those bases.

Only men without prior military service are being enlisted for the present vacancies in the

Second Infantry Division. Enlistment must be for the Regular Army and for a period of at least three years. This gives the individual time to receive the full benefits of training, and stabilized assignment both in the United States and on "overseas"

Men volunteering for the Second Division must enter the service by January 21. Accepted individuals will receive eight weeks of training activities before joining the unit at Fort Lewis. Further details on enlistment with the Second Division may be obtained at the recruiting station in Childress.




