

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



Austin - Insurance firms of types are feeling the effect of the public's reaction over the ailure of U.S. Trust & Guaranty Co. There appears to be a public wariness of insurance salesmen at the moment.

Steps are being taken to reell the public on the insurance usiness. One such move was an offer on the part of 28 legal reerve companies to "take over" he life insurance policies of deunct concerns. Thus they would protect policy holders from loss their life insurance.

To date no policy holder in any legal reserve life insurance company in Texas has suffered any loss. Nevertheless the companies are feeling the pinch of

the adverse publicity. J. Ralph Wood, president of the Southwestern Life Insurance Co., was one of the 28 executives who presented the "guarantee" proposal to the insurance commission. "We want to protect the good name of Texas insurance companies," Wood stated, "and also protect the innocent life in-surance policy holders."

J. Byron Saunders, chairman of the insurance commission, said "I am happy to learn of the project. It is a most laudable step. It will help relieve much public anxiety and concern."

Farm employers should file their returns on time in order to avoid the penalty which may be charged

For the first time this year, self employed farmers who net \$400 or gross \$800 or more annually are subject to reporting

Because of the possibility of retirement benefits and insurance features of the plan, farm and ranch operators should study the procedure for reporting. Each person will need a social security number before making report for benefits and paying the tax.

Information on various phases of tax reporting, says Bates, may be obtained either from county extension agents or the Social Security and Internal Revenue offices. 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

In 1950, there were 8.7 million such families, just 19 per cent of all families. In 1955, there were 15.7 million families in this income bracket, and they represent 32 per cent of all fam-

Kiplinger editors point out that this expansion of "middle in-comes" is largely responsible for the boom in sales of autos, houses and appliances.

Correspondingly, the number of low-income families is shrinking. Families with incomes of less than five thousand dollars have decreased by 5.2 million, a drop of 15 per cent. There is still poverty, but it is diminishing progressively.





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
