In 1961, the City pumped seventy-two (72,000,000) million gallons from the area. This amount alone is about forty (40) per cent greater than the estimated safe yield. In addition to the water pumped by the City, the ers have pumped an unknown quantity. In the eighteen (18) years that the City has obtained its water from these wells, the static water level has been lowerered approximately ten (10) feet, and all available information indicates that the water level will continue to decline until the area is practically dewatered. NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a require-ment for voting and so as to author-ize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Porces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the onent branches thereof, or in the illitary service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which e or she resided at the time of enering such service so long as he r she is a member of the Armed orces; and provided further, that efore offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so.
