## Down Town Bible Class

Twenty-eight men were present for the Sunday morning meeting of the Down Town Bible Class. Rev. Kenneth Bingham brought the message, and he and his family provided special music for the meeting.

In February and March of 1962 the engineering firm of Homer A. Hunter Associates of Dallas made a careful study of the water system of Crowell, and Mayor Henry Black has released the results of their study. Their report follows:

"We have made a study of your water system with regard to storage, transmission and well supply. Our study has been conducted to determine what immediate steps must be taken in order to provide adequate water supply for the present time.

"We find the lack of an abundant water supply to be the most critical water problem facing the City at the present time. The City's present source of water supply is from an alluvial area north of Margaret. This deposit of alluvium covers an area of about 4.2 square miles.

"Over a period of years, a large amount of data pertaining to the area from which the City obtains its water supply has been collected. In May 1936, the Texas State Board of Water Engineers published a report on the wells in

## Gilliland School Appoints Board of Equalization

The election law to appoint a Board of Equalization in Gilliland Common School District No. 3 was passed Aug. 3. The total votes were 52-49 for 3 against.

The school gymnasium was built in 1940. The High School students are transferred to the Monday High School each year since 1948. Gilliland now has 3 teachers: Mr. and Mrs. Glen Murray and A. B. Martin Jr., is principal. He has taught at the Gilliland School for 10 years. He has worked faithfully with the board to get this bill passed to save the grade school at Gilliland.

The school has no indebtedness. The state pays two teachers and one is paid out of local funds. Thirty students attend the school each year.

## 12 at Fire Dept. Meeting Thursday

Chief Martin Jones reported that twelve members attended the meeting of the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department last Thursday night.

Foard County including those in the area north of Margaret. In 1910 and 1941 the Works Progress Administration sponsored by the Texas State Board of Water Engineers in cooperation with the Federal Geological Survey and the City of Crowell made an extensive investigation of the area north of Margaret. The results of this investigation were published by the Texas State Board of Water Engineers in May 1941. In August 1956 the Texas Board of Water Engineers published Bulletin 5614. This Bulletin is a historical record of the water level in wells located in Foard and Wilbarger Counties, including those in the area north of Margaret. In 1944, the City drilled production wells in the present well field area north of Margaret. Since 1944, other production wells and numerous test holes have been drilled by the City in the area north and east of Margaret.

"We have personally observed the drilling of five (5) test holes by the City on 30 March 1962. From these test holes, it was possible to log the type of formation, thickness of water bearing material, and the thickness of water saturated material. We observed that the depth to the Permian rocks or 'red bed' and the thickness of formation in these five (5) holes was essentially the same as was reported in the 1941 publication by the Texas State Board of Water Engineers. It was determined that the thickness of water saturated material is now less than that found in 1940 and 1941. The continued decline in static water level in the well field area further substantiates the data published in Bulletin 5614 by the Texas Board of Water Engineers in August 1956.

"All of the published historical data that has been collected and our investigation that was conducted in February and March of this year shows clearly that the well field area is being dewatered. That is, water is being pumped from the formation at a faster rate than nature can recharge it. As a result of the study made by the Texas State Board of Water Engineers in 1940 and 1941, it was estimated at that time that the area north of Margaret would have a safe yield of approximately fifty-one million (51,000,000) gallons per year. In 1961, the City pumped seventy-two (72,000,000) million gallons from the area. This amount alone is about forty (40) per cent greater than the estimated safe yield. In addition to the water pumped by the City, the land owners and irrigation farmers have pumped an unknown quantity. In the eighteen (18) years that the City has obtained its water from these wells, the static water level has been lowered approximately ten (10) feet, and all available information indicates that the water level will continue to decline until the area is practically dewatered. This does not mean that no water can be obtained, but it does mean that it will not be possible to get a quantity of water greater than the natural recharge. A dewatered formation can best be compared with an empty storage tank from which only that amount of water can be taken that flows into it.

"At the present time, the City has no choice but to attempt to satisfy its water requirements from the well field. However steps should be taken immediately to investigate studies and investigations as to how, when and where the City may obtain an additional water supply in the near future. An additional source of supply could involve considerable expense to the City, and the problem should have very careful and thorough study.

"We are more than aware that this report is not a message of cheer and good tidings. We have endeavored to state the problem as the facts dictate without being alarmists. It is a major problem that can be solved by men of courage and strong convictions."

Mayor Black and the Council added "The members of the City Council have no alternative except to rely on the information compiled by the engineers and by the supply of water furnished by the wells at the present time."

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**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1962. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16** proposing an amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board (250,000,000.00), providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so the same will hereafter read as follows:

Section 49-b. By virtue of prior amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas, performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall be appointed by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the term to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be fixed by law, but shall not exceed the amount set by the Legislature; and such shall be made in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) in bonds or obligations that shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest shall be issued in such denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such increments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weight of interest on such bonds or obligations shall be determined by said Board; and such shall be commonly used and understood in the market, and the bonds or obligations shall be sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four (4) percent (4%) of the face value of the bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser, or pur-

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses hereof authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of the Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and sold by said Board are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose and shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as other lands of said Board, and shall be subject to the provisions of the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, at such times, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such terms and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, to Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1962, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which were not sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recreation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of said bonds; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due on or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be credited to said Veterans' Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 31, 1962; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 31, 1962, any moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside for the retirement of such bonds and to pay interest thereon; and when there are sufficient moneys to retire all of such

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1962. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an amendment to Section 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered, if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide for law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and this Amendment shall be published in the State Gazette and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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**Refund Claims  
September 30**

Farmers and ranchmen are reminded that claims for the Federal Tax refund must be submitted before September 30, says Burkett, County Agent.

The refund is on the four cents diesel fuel used by operators of their farms during the period July 1, 1962, to June 30, says Burkett. He explains that this refund has no connection with the claim for refunds sent to the State Comptroller's office. The gasoline used on an operator's farm by custom contractors is also eligible for the refund, points out Burkett, but fuel used in highway travel is not.

The special postcard form, 2240, is the proper one to use to submit fuel claims, says Burkett, and they have been mailed to operators who reported in 1962. New farmers and those who have not received the Form 2240, may obtain them from the office of the

county extension agent or the area offices of Internal Revenue Service.

Burkett reminds that claims are subject to audit, just as other reports submitted to the Internal Revenue Service, and records should be kept to support refund claims. He emphasizes that the deadline for reporting claims is September 30.

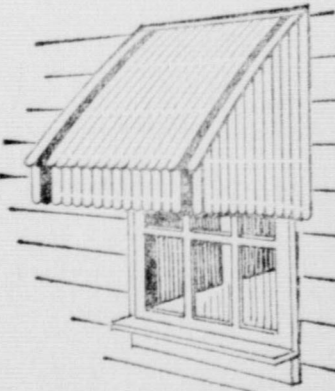
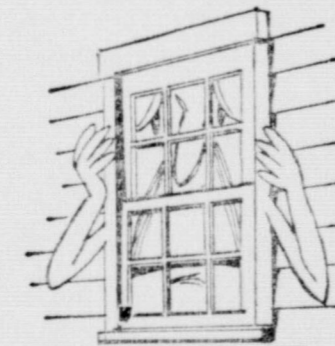

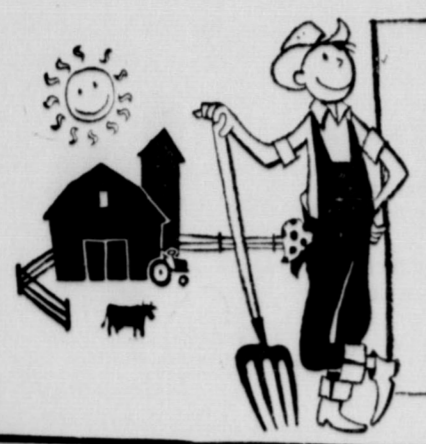
**Hootenanny Slated in Quanah Saturday**

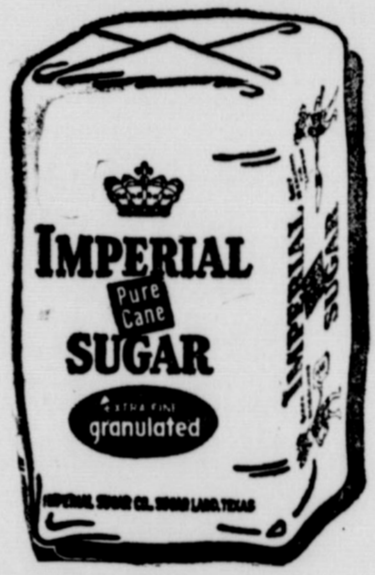

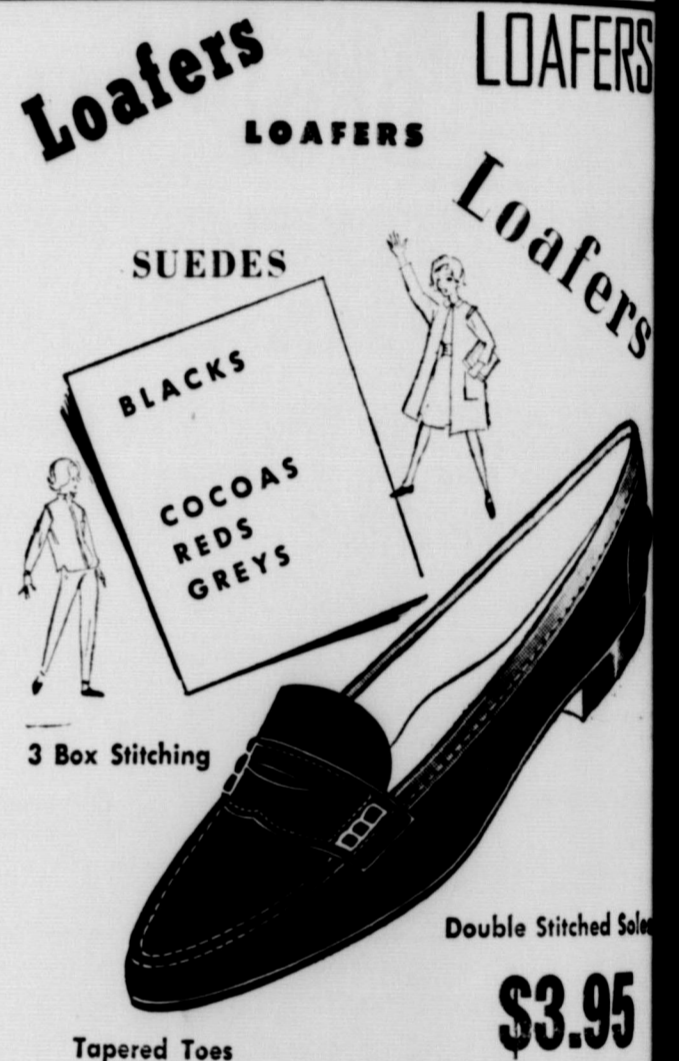
