Stop and think. What are you going to do when you get a job in the business of your employer? What are you going to do when you are not loyal to him? You cannot hold a position successfully if you disobey.

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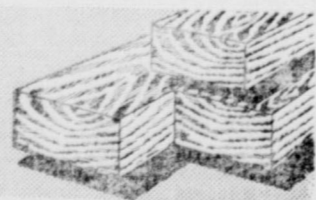
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the "boss" and "run him down" behind his back. You cannot become qualified to obey an employer if you don't have experience in cooperating with your parents.

Supt. Grady Graves and Mrs. Graves returned from the AASA National Convention last Sunday where they had the privilege of attending some outstanding programs on education.

Mr. Graves gives the following high points of their trip: (1) Their day's visit in New York City the most important point of interest being the U. N. building that was built at a cost of \$68,000,000; (2) over 19,000 registered administrators with some of their wives attending the meetings at Atlantic City in the largest auditorium in the world that seats 41,000; (3) some of the outstanding programs were (a) talk, "America's Stake in Asia," by Carlos P. Greder, past president of National Association of Manufacturers; (c) "The World We Want," New York Herald Tribune Forum, composed of 33 students from 32 foreign nations who are attending part of their senior year in American high schools; (d) Charles Collingwood, news correspondent of the Columbia Broadcasting System; and (e) Fred Waring and His Pennsylvanians in the Broadway hit, "Hear, Hear," and (4) trip back home by way of Philadelphia and Washington. The most important point of interest in Washington were the Capitol, Mount Vernon, Arlington Cemetery, U. S. Treasury and the Smithsonian Institute.
