"Without question we are in the midst of one of the biggest disaster years in our history," Mr. Harriman said. "The Christmas week floods on the Pacific Coast have placed a new and unexpected strain on our resources. But the human needs caused by this disaster are being met as were the requirements of the 41,-066 families affected in the Eastern States floods.

The 1956 campaign coincides with the 75th anniversary of the founding of the Red Cross in this country by Clara Barton. Red Cross leadership in the alleviation of suffering and the pursuit of world peace has grown stead-

Cecil Carroll, fund drive chairman for Foard County, expressed hopes that Foard County would meet its quota early in the campaign, in token of appreciation for the wonderful assistance given the people of Crowell after the tornado in 1942. Foard County's quota this year is \$1,395.00.

"During the past 75 years the American people, through their Red Cross, have assisted their neighbors in about 6,000 disaster relief operations," Mr. Carroll stated. "They have also made possible health and welfare services to untold thousands of servicemen in four wars; have financed the collection of millions of pints of blood for military and civilian use; and have helped raise the health standards of milions of Americans through Red safety and nursing services

ARC budget is \$36,358,800 for the traditional services to members of the armed forces and their families here and abroad,
