Prospective Polio Vaccine Program Being Organized by Health Officer

Full cooperation of the Foard County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was offered this week in support of the prospective polio vaccine program now being organized by Martin Kralieck, M. D., Foard County Health Officer.

The 1954 vaccine trials involved 1,830,000 school children of whom 440,000 received vaccine in studies sponsored by the National Foundation. The March of Dimes organization has contracted for \$9,000,000 worth of the vaccine to be used this spring if the vaccine is licensed. This commitment has assured an immediate supply of vaccine and has helped keep pharmaceutical houses toiled up for full production while waiting for the evaluation report. It also will make possible vaccine for distribution to physicians through usual channels.

AN EDITORIAL

The election for the bonds to buy right-of-way for the Crowell-Seymour highway and the Gilliland road presents a challenge to the voters of Foard County. If we defeat it, there is likelihood that the State will not offer us this opportunity again. If we approve it, it will mean more highways to Crowell, and will undoubtedly benefit the whole county in years to come. After observing the large amount of traffic on Highway 287 in the Quanah-Vernon vicinity, we feel sure that much of that traffic will be diverted by way of Crowell and Seymour for a shorter and less-heavily-traveled route to Fort Worth and Dallas.

When the \$50,000 the county will spend for the purchase of right-of-way for the roads is compared to the much greater amount the State will spend in building and maintaining the roads, it is evident that Foard County is getting the big end of the bargain. If we do not get the roads, the State's money will go to build roads for someone else in another part of the State. The State Highway Department evidently thinks the roads are needed, or the offer to build them would never have been made.

Voting the bonds on the 19th will not cost as much in the end as refusing to go along with projects that are so potential of future benefits all down the years. And thousands will continue to reap these advantages, long years after the bonds have been paid off and forgotten.

TEXAS PUBLIC SCHOOL WEEK

This is Texas Public School Week, March 7 through 12. Most people concede that the schools are not so bad as extreme critics say. They are not so good as extreme apologists say. Great pressure is being exerted to take control from local communities and centralize it in Washington. Federal aid is served as bait.

Free and responsible education depends on local control. The best education is that which develops personal character, teaches how to think objectively, and stresses love of country and unselfish service.

The Crowell Schools stress the three R's although they have been given new names. Reading and writing is now called Language

Arts since it cannot be taught without spelling, grammar, listening and observing. Arithmetic in the elementary school still receives a whole hour.

Another hour per day is spent on social studies, including history, geography, civics and American government.

Our students should grow up with an understanding of politics. They must be able to judge men, candidates and issues. They should understand what makes America a great nation.

Our children should be socially capable. They should not expect the government to take care of them. They should have a social conscience and should be willing to assume responsibilities of supporting the Red Cross, the polo foundation and other organizations to help unfortunate people in general.

The Crowell Schools try to keep up with as much of the new as is practical while continuing to stress the fundamental subjects.

OUTSTANDING VOCATIONAL ADVISOR SPEAKS AT ASSEMBLY

The CHS students had the pleasure of hearing an outstanding lecture given by Verla Teeter last Wednesday, March 2, in the high school auditorium.

Mr. Teeter is one of the most outstanding vocational advisors in this area, and he presented one of the best lectures of the year to the students. His education includes graduation from Parsons College Academy, Fairfield, Iowa, with a PhD degree, an MA degree from the University of Iowa, and attending Columbia University in New York City. His experience is so vast that only a few of his positions can be mentioned: He has been a personnel service representative for Douglas Aircraft Co., guidance specialist in Chicago, recreational advisor in Los Angeles, director of Municipal Ju-

venile Court in Tulsa, Okla., and superintendent of three different schools: Richland and Packwood, Iowa, and McAlister, Okla.

Mr. Teeter lectured the students on their vocational decisions in the future. He stated that you get out of school what you put into it, and industrial offers depend upon your records in grades, citizenship, and character, rather than a mere diploma. We don't appreciate the choice we have in America of our vocation. The world doesn't owe anyone a living, but it offers the opportunity for an honest and decent one. There are three prerequisites in a vocation which are the ability to speak, write, and read well.

You can decide which vocation you will be happier in by taking an interesting inventory of yourself. Choose a vocation which fits in with your interests, your intelligence, and your natural ability. The objective of your future is to be happy, and being successful in your work will add to your happiness.

You should learn to be likable, control yourself, and to broaden your interests. If you take the intelligence, personality or other tests, take them seriously because they can help you. Some sailors and soldiers bragged about not trying on tests and later failed to secure the positions they desired.

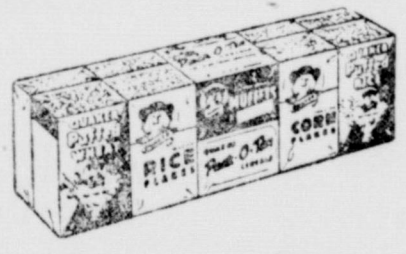

Shepperd Busy
A report from the Attorney General's office reveals that since the beginning of the veterans' land investigation in October of last year, John Ben Shepperd's office has been a beehive of activity.
Shepperd estimates he and his assistants have traveled over 18,000 miles and have put in over 41,000 man-hours of time on the veterans land investigation.
Shepperd has met with grand juries almost daily.
Thus far, the Bexar and DeWitt Co. grand juries have returned a total of 188 indictments against eight persons involved in veterans' land sales.
In addition, the State has filed three criminal complaints in Travis County.
Ten civil suits have been filed against 25 separate promoters. The total recovery sought by Shepperd in these 10 suits is \$1,604,000.
Attorney General Shepperd plans to meet with 13 different grand juries during the month of March. He forecasts that this month will see the returning of "hundreds of criminal indictments against most of the persons involved."
Shepperd has added a complete new division to his department to process veterans' land civil and criminal cases. It is headed by Cecil E. Burney of Corpus Christi, an ex-prosecutor and former president of the State Bar of Texas.

News from the Congress
by Congressman Frank Ikard
America is truly a nation on wheels, and if we are to maintain our rapid economic and social growth and development, it is essential that these wheels keep rolling. If there is any doubt about this, we only have to look at a few facts and figures. Nine million, 700 thousand people in this country are employed in the highway transportation industries. That is one out of every seven employed persons in the United States. 85 per cent of the workers in this country living over ten miles from their jobs depend on passenger cars for their transportation. We have approximately 700,000 people in Texas employed in the highway transportation industries. Motor vehicle registrations in the country have increased over 3,000,000 vehicles or 5.7 per cent in 1953 over 1952. In Texas, motor vehicle registrations increased over 200,000 in the same 1-year period or about a 6.5 per cent increase. Our highway system through the years has certainly not kept up with the tremendous strides we have made in motor transportation and the increased usage of automobiles. A few minutes on any highway in the country will convince anyone of this.

Last year the President appointed an Advisory Committee headed by General Lucius D. Clay to study the highway situation. General Clay's report was submitted a short time ago. As a result of this report, the Federal road program is apt to become one of the questions that is discussed most heatedly during this session of Congress. There is not space enough here to discuss fully the Clay report; however, it provides fairly generally for the continuing of the regular Federal aid program to highways at the rate of about \$623,000,000 a year and additional expenditures of \$25,000,000,000 during the next ten years on a so-called "interstate" highway system. There are many points of the Clay report with which I cannot agree. In fact, my points of disagreement are too numerous to be set out here; however, even those of us who do not agree with the report should admit that the advisory committee has served a good purpose in that it has focused public attention on the inadequacies of our highway system, and even though the plan outlined in the report has at this time practically no chance of being adopted, it has created the public interest that is necessary before our traffic and highway problems can be solved.

plant from which it comes are clues to its food value. In general, the greener the vegetable, the richer it is in minerals and vitamins. The dark green leaves may carry several times as much of some nutrients as green stalks.

The fresher the green vegetable, the better. Flavor and crispness, and perhaps some food value, too, are lost when vegetables wilt or are stored.

If vegetables must be held for 2 or 3 days before using, refrigerate them. Keep them moist in the vegetable crisper, covered container, or in a plastic bag. Be careful not to bruise leafy vegetables in storing. Store peas and beans in the pod, if possible, to

keep them fresh. For best quality, use vegetables quickly. Use on the pan to speed the cooking until the vegetable is tender, but still slightly crisp. Cooking makes the vegetable change color and usually causes a loss in food value.
