

for the Crowell-Seymour highway and the Gilliland road presents a challenge to the voters of Foard County. If we defeat it, there is likelihood that the State will not offer us this opportunity again. If we approve it, it will mean more highways to Crowell, and will undoubtedly benefit the whole county in years to come. After observing the large amount of traffic on Highway 287 in the Quanah-Vernon vicinity, we feel sure that much of that traffic will be diverted by way of Crowell and Seymour for a shorter and less-heavily-traveled route to Fort Worth and Dallas.

When the \$50,000 the county will spend for the purchase of right-of-way for the roads is compared to the much greater amount the State will spend in building and maintaining the roads, it is evident that Foard County is getting the big end of the bargain. If we do not get the roads, the State's money will go to build roads for someone else in another part of the State. The State Highway Department evidently thinks the roads are needed, or the offer to build them would never have been made.

Voting the bonds on the 19th will not cost as much in the end as refusing to go along with projects that are so potential of future benefits all down the years. And thousands will continue to reap these advantages, long years after the bonds have been paid off and forgotten.
