Foard County Goal for Red Cross Fund Drive Set at \$1,335 for 1955; Campaign to Get Underway March 1

March 1 inaugurates another annual drive for funds to help the local Red Cross Chapter and the National Chapter to take care of the people of the world, J. M. Crowell, County Red Cross chairman, announced Monday.

"Only a few short years ago, we went through the ravages and destruction of a tornado and experienced first hand just how the American Red Cross works and how the people of the world are benefited through such a worthy organization," Mr. Crowell stated in making announcement of the coming campaign.

In making the announcement, Mr. Crowell listed seven good reasons, one for each day of the week, for supporting the Red Cross and then asks the question, "Could you say no to these questions?" The questions follow:

1. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to have blood immediately available should you need it today?
2. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to have the children of your county given a chance to learn to swim?
3. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to know that through the Red Cross, people are trained in first aid and that first aid stations dot the cross-roads of your state?
4. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to know that Red Cross services are available to the members of the armed forces serving anywhere around the world?
5. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to know that the Red Cross makes available to residents of your county training in home care of the sick?
6. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to know that your children have an opportunity to serve through the American Junior Red Cross?
7. Is it worth a penny a day to you and your family to know that the Red Cross is ready and willing to assist those stricken by disaster when they cannot help themselves?

The county chairman makes the following appeal:

"Please consider these reasons and when the worker calls on you, give and give generously. The county goal this year is \$1,335.00 and we failed last year to make our quota the first day. This has been done in the years past and other counties are using Foard County as an example to follow in having a fast-moving fund raising campaign, so let's regain our position as one of the first in the nation to reach the goal set for our county."

"Community goals are: Crowell, \$735.00; Vivian, \$55.00; Good Creek and Claytonville, \$55.00; Black, \$30.00; Four Corners, \$70.00; Margaret, \$100.00; Rayland, \$110.00; Thalia, \$110.00; Foard City, \$70.00."

The Post Offices at Margaret and Foard City will be discontinued on March 31, according to information received from the Post Office Department and released Monday by Alva Spencer, postmaster at Crowell.

Patrons of these offices after that date will receive their mail on rural routes out of the Crowell office, Mr. Spencer stated.

The Foard City route will be consolidated with Route 1, Crowell, and some of the patrons of Route 1 will be transferred to Route 2, Crowell, and Highway 70 will be the dividing line.

Gus Neil is carrier for Route 1 out of Crowell and his route will be increased to 67 miles. The mileage of Route 2, carried by H. E. Thomson, will be increased to 74 miles.

Grady McLain, carrier for Route 1, Foard City, for many years, will be transferred to Knox City.

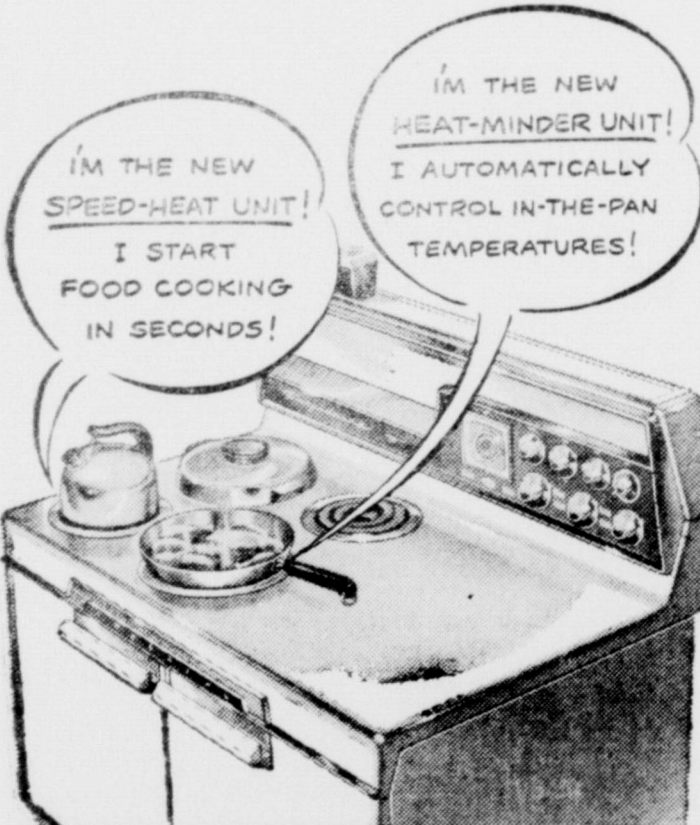
These young boys are gathered together from various states —

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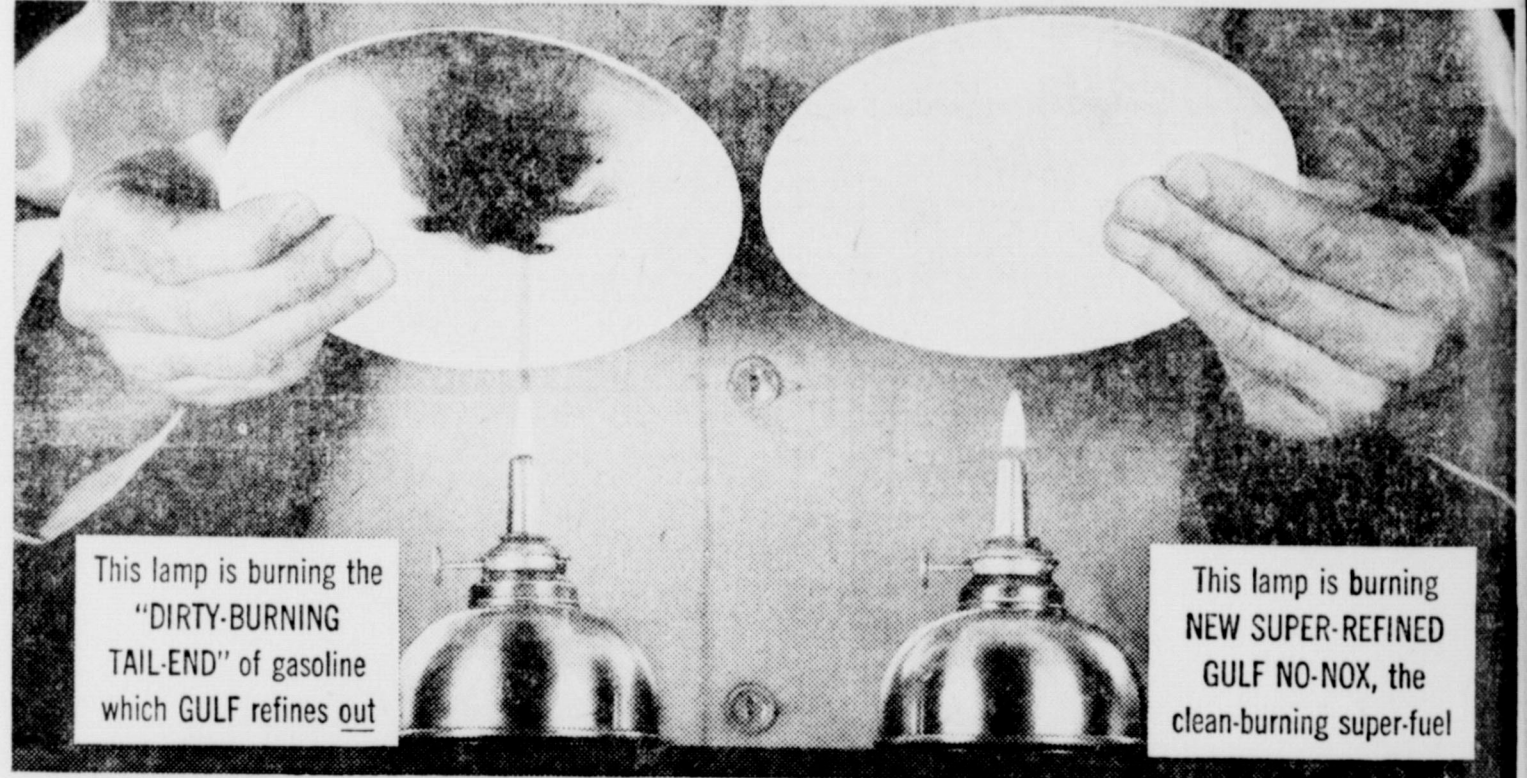

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SOCIAL SECURITY CHANGE

The earnings test for retired people who are employed has been made the same as the test for self-employed retired people by the recent change in the social security law, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls District Office. After Jan. 1, 1955, a retired person's earnings will be judged on a yearly basis, whether he is employed or self-employed, and whether his work is under social security or not. Under the old law, employed people who were receiving their retirement benefits had their earnings judged on a monthly basis. The new amount which may be earned under the law without loss of social security payments, is \$1,200 in a year. For further information, a representative from the Wichita Falls District office will be in Quanah on Feb. 23, at the county court room in the court house, from 10 a. m. until 12 noon.

Trim membrane from liver, sprinkle with seasonings. Roll each slice with a sausage link in center; fasten with a wooden pick. Brown slowly in lard, pour off drippings. Add tomato sauce. Cover, simmer 30 to 45 minutes or until tender. 6 servings.

A. Stovall, County Clerk, and the following absent: NONE, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings, passed the following order: There came on to be considered the petition of M. L. Hughton, Roy C. Steele and 148 other persons asking that an election be ordered upon the question of issuing bonds of Foard County, Texas, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, operating macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof in said County.

At Schoolhouse, in Thalia, Texas, in Election Precinct No. 7, with Jack Welch as Presiding Judge.
At Schoolhouse, in Foard City, Texas, in Election Precinct No. 8, with Jack Welch as Presiding Judge.
At Lockett Gin, in Rayland, Texas, in Election Precinct No. 11, with Tom Lawson as Presiding Judge.
