\$115,000 Loan Granted for Thalia Water Project

Members of the board of directors of the Thalia Water Supply Corporation met in the Vernon Farmers Home Administration office Wednesday morning of last week and signed papers covering a loan of \$115,000 granted by the Farmers Home Administration.

The ceremonies in Vernon marked the end of negotiations between Thalia citizens and FHA that began last fall and sets the stage for construction of a water system that will serve about 104 connections, counting rural homesteads, business establishments, churches and schools, according to L. J. Cappelman, state FHA director, who, with F. O. Smith, Vernon FHA supervisor, represented the agency in the meeting last week.

The Thalia Water Supply Corporation, using the FHA loan plus \$3,870 contributed by Thalia residents, will drill a well three and one-half miles north of Thalia on the S. M. Tole farm as the first move in the construction of the system.

A storage reservoir for the purpose of chlorination will be constructed at the well site and an elevated water tower will be erected at Thalia.

Construction is expected to begin in about 10 days, the corporation officials announced.

"Loans of this type enable rural communities to improve the standard of living for its residents through installation of bath and toilet facilities, washers, dryers, various household appliances, as well as fire protection facilities," Mr. Cappelman said.

The FHA direct loan is to be repaid over a period of 40 years with 4 1/2 per cent interest.

Walter Ramsey is president of the Thalia Water Supply Corporation board of directors and Cecil Carpenter is secretary and treasurer. Other members are Oran Ford, R. H. Cooper and Wayne Gamble.

Those winning district were Cecilia Drabek in Danforth Awards Program, Lynda Mechell in Achievement, Junior Mechell in Texas Electric, Junior was second high individual and will be awarded \$30.00.

Jean Burkett was winner in Home Economics and Gena Adcock was first in the District Dress Revue.

Joe David Drabek won second in Beef Production and Sharon Golden won second in the Citizen-Awards Program.

There were over 100 records submitted in district competition in the 1962 Texas 4-H Awards program. The Foard County winners are to be commended for their accomplishments.

New 40,000-Bushel Elevator Now Being Constructed at Thalia

A new 40,000-bushel grain elevator is now under construction in Thalia. Owners of the elevator are B. A. Whitman, Bob Cooper and Floyd Webb. The new grain storage facility for Thalia will consist of four 10,000-bushel steel tanks. Last Friday, Jim Henry, contractor, was pouring the concrete for the unloading pit, and steel foundation work was being done.

The elevator is located on the south side of U. S. 70 in the west part of Thalia.

One hundred per cent participation is being sought in an area-wide administration of the Sabin oral vaccine against polio Sunday, September 16.

In Foard County, the vaccine will be given in the Community Center on that day.

This protection against the dread disease is provided by consuming a lump of sugar on which three drops of the Sabin vaccine have been placed. Young babies will be given the drops directly on the tongue.

The two local doctors, Martin Kracliek and Walter Stapp, are sponsoring the campaign in Foard County, and are urging that all persons from three months to 103 years take the vaccine, including all those who already have received the Salk shots.

A later date probably will be set for those persons out-of-town or otherwise unable to participate on Sept. 16.

The vaccine will be given away free but the local doctors—who are buying the vaccine—invite donations of about 25 cents per person to help defray the purchase cost. Any excess will be given to the Foard County Hospital.

It is pointed out that older age groups very rarely contract poliomyelitis but are frequently carriers of the disease.

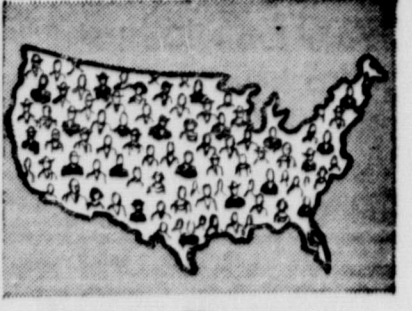

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1962.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State respecting the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of the cost, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**Wheat Quota
Vote August 30**

Wheat farmers will vote in a
referendum August 30 to decide
if marketing quotas will apply
for the 1963 crop, according to
C. H. Bates, farm management
specialist, Texas A&M College.

Approval of marketing quotas
would mean, (1) in commercial
wheat states all farmers with more
than 15 acres of wheat will be
subject to quota penalties on their
"excess," except those who com-
ply with the feed wheat provision.
The penalty rate would be 45
per cent of the parity price as of
May 1, 1963; (2) growers who
comply with their wheat allotments
will be eligible for price support
at the level announced, of not
less than \$1.82 per bushel on a
national basis.

Disapproval of marketing quo-
tas would mean (1) marketing
quotas and penalties will not be
in effect for the 1963 wheat crop;
(2) acreage allotments will be
used to determine eligibility for
price support; (3) the wheat price
support rate will be at 50 per cent
of parity, or about \$1.21 per bush-
el national average.

Those who can vote are the
farmers in the 39 commercial
wheat states who will harvest more
than 15 acres of 1963 wheat as
grain but those taking part in the
1962 "feed wheat" program are
not eligible to vote.

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

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 8, providing that school taxes therefor voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is within Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall such taxes be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by such change without further election in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and voted, but unissued bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 8-b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 8-b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following:

"Section 8-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessary vote of a majority of the necessary voters, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, assigned or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State in Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from the courts of the State of Texas to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the conditions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial power; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be prosecuted in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effected except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trial de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trial de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
