Mrs. Buck, who had been in failing health for some time, died the Foard County Hospital Friday.

Mary C. Cotner was born April 18, 1872, in Springfield, Mo. She was married to A. Y. Norman in 1891, at Savoy, Texas. Her children were born to this union. The family moved to Cottle County in 1908, and from there to Crowell in 1922. Mr. Norman died July 12, 1932, at the age of 63. Following Mr. Norman's death, she was married to C. C. Buck in Farmersville Jan. 1936, and Mr. Buck died several years later. Mrs. Buck was not preceded in death by one son, James Thomas Norman, Nov. 1953, and an infant child, Gary Norman.

Mrs. Buck was loved and highly respected by a great host of friends, many of whom had known her during her long residence in this section. For a long period of years, she was a member of the First Baptist Church of Crowell.

Soil Conservation District Urges Farmers to Use Stubble Mulch Tillage

As many farmers in the district are now preparing their land for spring planting, it is a good time to think of stubble mulch tillage. For the next two months we may expect high winds with quite a bit of soil movement on clean tilled ground, especially so in the sandier portion of the district. Emergency tillage with chisels or lister, to roughen the ground surface, is a common practice in blowing areas to control wind erosion. However, it is a temporary measure and if repeated on many fields it only serves to further deplete soil mois-

Collectors Report 1954 Tax Payments Being Very Good

Tax collections for 1954 for the county and state, the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District and City of Crowell have been good, according to figures released by the collectors.

Amount of taxes collected for County and State was \$85,908.58 from \$92,323.41 charged on the rolls. The percentage of payments was approximately 94.

Poll Taxes Paid
There were 541 poll tax receipts issued from the sheriff and tax assessor-collector's office, it was revealed by R. R. Magee, office deputy. Mr. Magee says this is about one-half the usual amount.

School Tax Collections
Total amount of taxes assessed for the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District was \$86,325.18 and the amount collected up to Jan. 31, 1955, was \$80,494.38. Percentage collected was 93.24, according to L. A. Andrews, secretary.

City Collections
The City of Crowell collected \$17,504.63 from an assessment of \$20,732.15. Mrs. Fern McKown, secretary, reported. This leaves a balance of \$2,809.50 to be collected. The percentage of collections was 86.4.

Penalty and interest will be charged on all taxes not paid by January 31, 1955.

Taxpayers had the privilege of saving 3 per cent by paying their taxes in October, 2 per cent by paying in November and 1 per cent in December, 1954.

News from the Congress

by Congressman Frank Ikard

This week Everett Hutchinson of Austin was sworn in as a new Commissioner of the Interstate Commerce Commission. Before his appointment, he practiced law in Austin. The new commissioner had formerly been with the Texas Railroad Commission and an assistant Attorney General. I have known him since we were in law school together and knew him to be a very fine and capable man.

Many people in our part of the country have been watching with a great deal of interest the proposed change in the Soil Conservation Service whereby it would be broken down on a state level. I am hopeful that no change will be made and that the service will continue to be administered as it is now.

The first major piece of legislation that will be considered by this session of Congress will be the President's request for a four-year extension of the Draft Act. The international situation being what it is, there is little question but what this extension is required; however, I think it is important that in extending it, we do not adopt some system that would give the military too much control over the rearing and training of our young people. One of the things that has contributed a great deal to our country's development into the really great nation that it is, is the fact that the country has, through the years been controlled by a civilian population rather than the military. I certainly hope nothing is ever done to upset this control in the hands of our civilians.

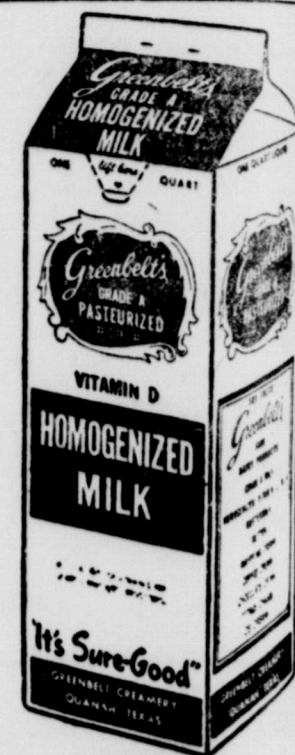

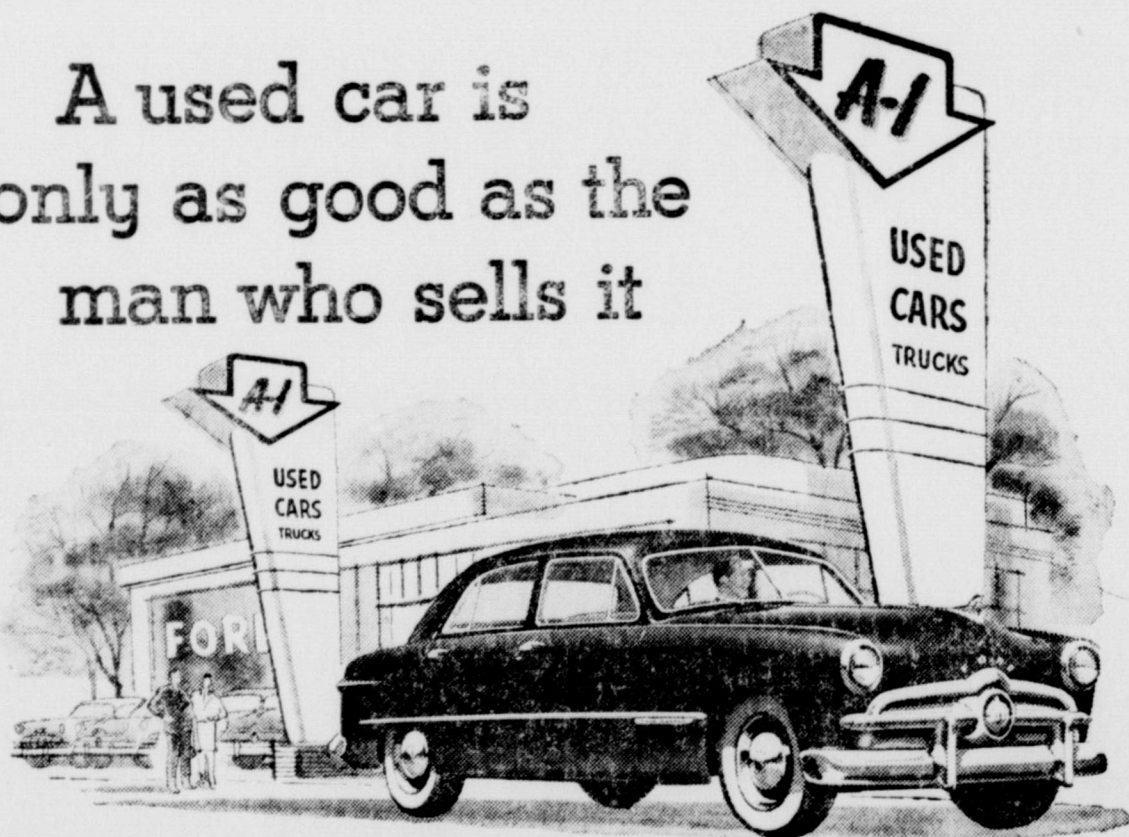

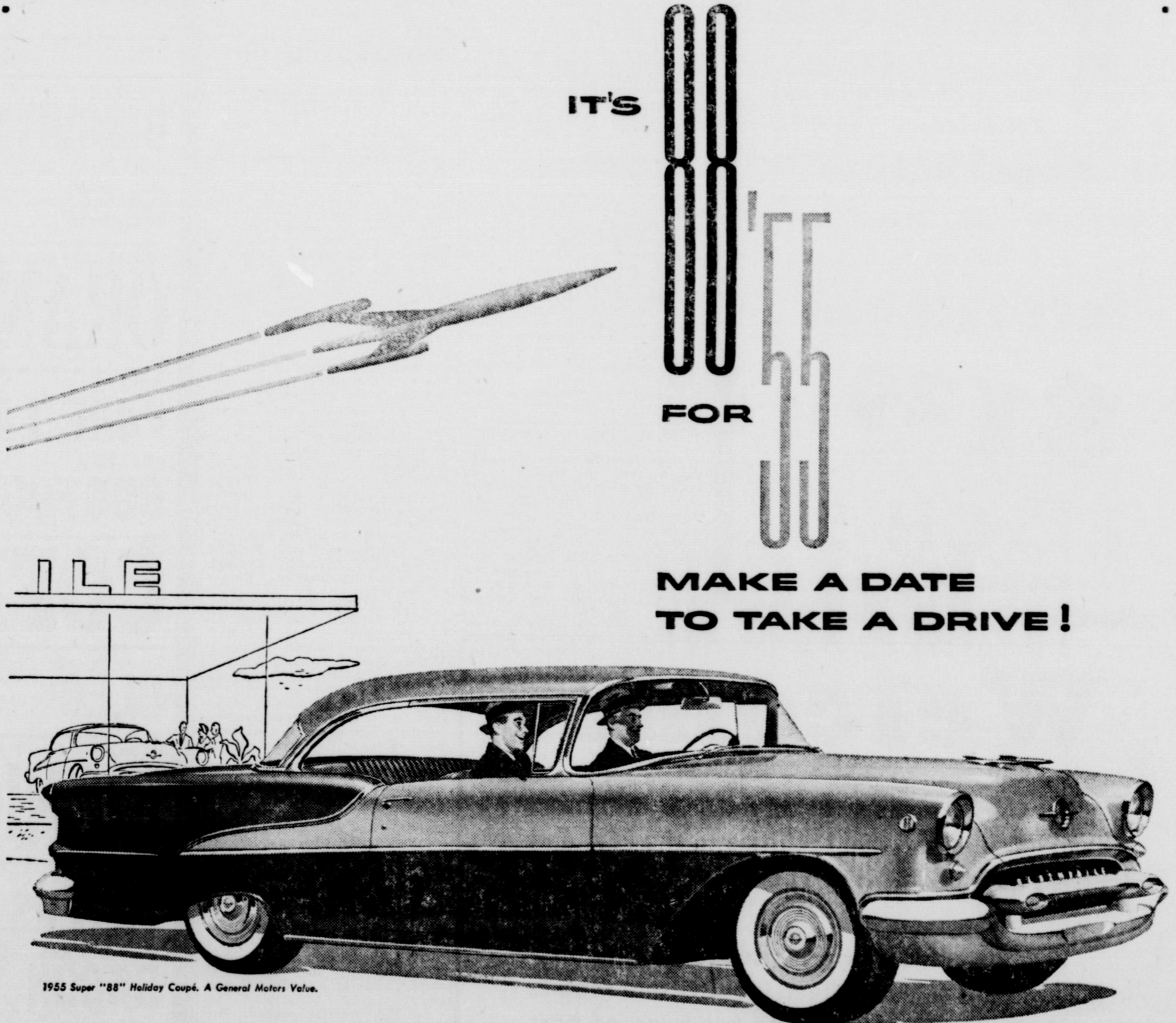

We do not yet know what that announcement will contain; but right now, the Salk polio vaccine appears to be a bright ray of promise shining through all the dark clouds of despair, anxiety and suffering. But even if the vaccine is effective, there are many polio patients who will continue to require expensive treatment and many more will be stricken before enough vaccine can be produced and administered to bring polio under control.

"It has been a long hard fight, but let's hope that victory will soon be ours. Never before in the history of mankind have so many people cooperated, giving of their time, funds and scientific knowledge in an attempt to conquer a disease of humanity. With this kind of team-work and the blessing of God, our country will be freed from the ravages of polio."
