Austin—Game and Fish Com-mission wildlife biologists overestimated the shooting eye of Texans participating in the public hunts conducted this fall to re-move surplus deer on three Wild-life Management areas.

As a result, according to the assistant director of wildlife restoration, W. S. Jennings, next year more names will have to be taken in the drawings for permits. Roughly 850 names were drawn for the hunts but the combined harvest fell short by 149 head of the total 361 antlerless deer earmarked for removal. Each person was allowed one day to try for his deer.






