## Extension Made on FHA Emergency Loan Program

The Farmers Home Administration Emergency loan program has been extended in Texas for the 1956 crop year, according to Walter T. McKay, the agency's state director.

McKay stated that authorization for the extension was given by Secretary of Agriculture Benson in keeping with the Department of Agriculture's policy of continuing emergency assistance measures where necessary.

Under the extension of the program, loans will be made through December 31, 1956. Loans may be made in all counties in the state except in the 57 west Texas counties designated on Sept. 15, 1955, for the Great Plains Special Credit Program.

During the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1955, emergency loans totaling more than \$25 million were made to Texas farmers and ranchers. Considering the prolonged drought conditions, collections on these loans are very good, McKay stated.

Emergency loans are made in areas where the Secretary of Agriculture finds that there is a need for credit that is not available from other sources. The need may be due to the damage done by a natural disaster, such as drought, flood or hurricane, or to economic reasons.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, a farmer or rancher must be unable to obtain the credit he needs from any other source. In addition, he must be engaged primarily in farming, have suitable farming experience and reasonable prospects for success in the farming operations he plans to carry on with the loan.

Emergency loans are made to finance normal operations. Loan funds can be used to purchase feed, seed, fertilizer, farm and home supplies, and replacement machinery and livestock.

Repayments are scheduled according to the borrower's ability to repay. Ordinarily, loans secured by liens on chattel property are repaid in one to five years. Loans for crop production are due when the crop is harvested.

Applications for emergency loans are made at the county offices of the Farmers Home Administration. The local county Farmers Home Administration committee determines the eligibility of applicants for these emergency loans.

There are still a few copies of the bulletin "Christmas Time at Home" in my office. This bulletin is full of wonderful Christmas recipes and I'll be glad to give you a copy if you will call or come by my office.

I also have the bulletin, "Let's Eat Turkey," which I will be happy to give or send to you. It has directions for cooking your turkey as well as recipes for using the left-overs.

Our recipe this week is: **Colorful Cranberry Punch**  
Summer 1-quart cranberries in 1 1/2 quart water until all skins pop. Strain, add juice of 12 lemons. Make a sugar syrup of 2 cups sugar and 2 cups water. Combine with the cranberry mixture and add enough water to make about 1 gallon of punch.

## Reenlistments Being Accepted Now for Operation Gyroscope

Reenlistments for assignment to Europe under the Army's unit rotation plan "Operation Gyroscope" are being accepted at the U. S. Army Recruiting Station, ground floor of the City Hall in Childrens.

Applicants must be qualified in certain grades and military occupational specialties. They will be assigned direct to Fort Sill, Okla., for duty with the 552d or 553d Field Artillery Battalions.

These units will replace similar units in Europe next June and July.

Operation Gyroscope, which replaces the old individual replacement system, allows persons to complete normal tours, overseas and stateside, with the same unit.

Former service personnel who are interested in this special assignment are urged to contact the nearest Army recruiting station for complete details.

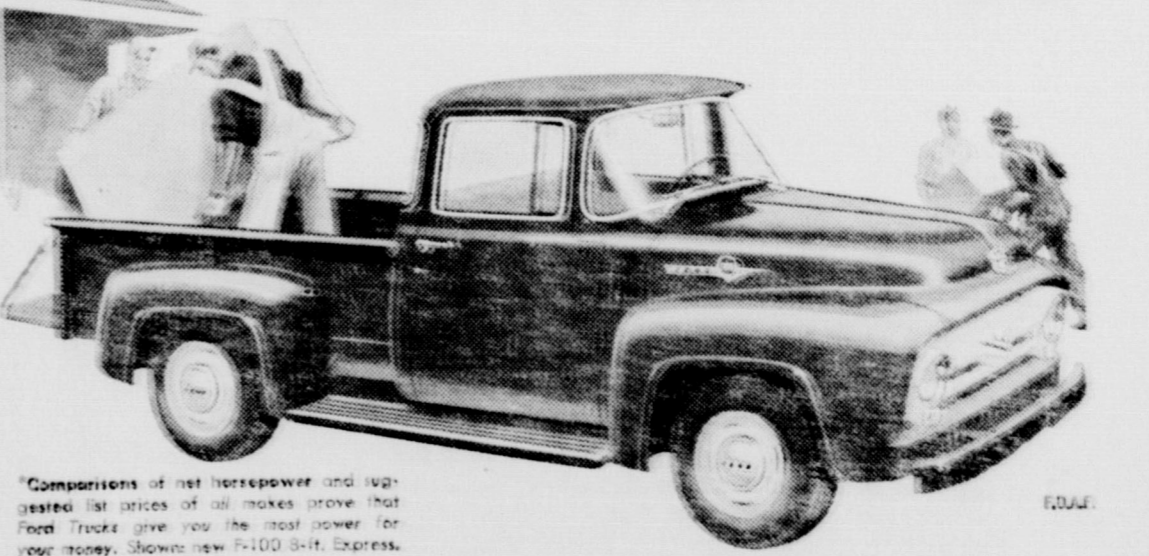

# State Capitol NEWS

Austin—One of the most startling events of the past week was the admission by Bascom Giles that he—and he alone—was responsible for the administration of the Veterans Land program.

Giles admitted not once, but four times, during the past week—in two criminal and two civil trials in Crystal City and Austin—that he was solely responsible for the program—under the original policy set up by Board members Beauford Jester, Price Daniel and Giles, in 1949.

Gov. Allan Shivers and Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd had staunchly contended that such was the case, but Giles was silent on this point until this week.

Giles pleaded guilty to two indictments in Crystal City. He drew sentences of six years in prison on each. He did not contest the civil trials for money allegedly paid him as bribes.

A total of \$53,000 in cash already has been paid back to the state by Giles.

Still pending against him are 10 criminal indictments and civil recovery suits totaling \$171,427.

**Cheatham Named DA**  
Wiley Cheatham of Cuero, whose aggressive prosecution of veterans' land scandals made him nationally famous, has won a double promotion.

Gov. Shivers promoted Cheatham from county attorney to district attorney, effective Jan. 1. Then Shepperd named him assistant attorney general to serve until Jan. 1. In the latter post he heads the criminal division handling prosecution of veterans' land scandals.

Cheatham's appointment as district attorney brought on a flurry of complaints from Victoria, where top Democratic leaders wanted the place to go to City Attorney Weldon B. Mallette.

Said Shivers, "There have been more attempts to bring pressure to prevent the appointment of Wiley Cheatham than I have ever seen as governor."

The appointment led to resignation of State Democratic Executive Committee Gen. Houchens of Victoria; bitter denunciation of the governor by State Sen. Wm. S. Fly; and editorial criticism by the Victoria Advocate.

In announcing the appointment, Governor Shivers praised the young DeWitt county attorney for his past work. He promised cooperation of state officials in further investigations.

## Shivers May Run Again

Back in the limelight as a potential candidate for governor is Allan Shivers. He made it a point to remind newsmen that he is among the "possibles."

Gov. Shivers promised to tell his 1956 political plans "about dogwood time." This, he explains, is usually between mid-February and mid-March.

Although Shivers has been expected to step out at the end of his present term, he never has definitely said so.

Meanwhile U. S. Sen. Price Daniel holds fast to his announced intention to tell no political plans until after Jan. 1.

Added signs of life in Ralph Yarborough's law office indicate something developing there soon.

The Austin attorney has brought newsmen Lyman Jones back from California to work in the 1954 candidate's office.

## Short Snorts

## a quick statewide check.

Texas cut its Safe-Driving Day death toll from the usual 7 to 2; but followed through on the week end with 10 traffic deaths in two days.

The Democratic State Executive Committee held two days of closed sessions here, schooling leaders in convention procedures. There will be 100 such seminars over the state in preparation for the fight to retain control of the presidential conventions next May.

One child out of every 10 born in Texas will spend some time in a mental hospital, says the Texas Society for Mental Health.

O. B. Ellis, general manager of the Texas Prison System, advises that he and the Prison Board will ask the Legislature for \$8,000,000 at the next session, for a new five-year building program for the prison farms.

Texas' supply of Salk polio vaccine may catch up with the demand by next April, says Dr. Henry A. Hollie, health commissioner.

New certificates are being mailed to 63,000 Texas teachers, under a law passed by the last legislature. Teachers with five years or more of college work receive "professional" certificates; those with only a bachelor's degree receive "provisional" certificates. Both types are permanent certificates. Of Texas' 65,000 employed teachers, only 2,000 do not have degrees.

Garland Smith, chairman of the Texas Insurance Commission, reports that the commission needs at least 25 more examiners. At present there are 39.

Texas schools and health units received more than \$8,000,000 worth of surplus federal property the past fiscal year. So states C. Read Granberry, chairman of the board of the Texas Surplus Property Agency.

Lease bids by oil companies on 23,679 acres of school lands last week enriched the permanent

school fund \$1,552,284.

Midland Rancher J. O. Nobles has resigned from the Board of Directors of Texas Southern University—because of the distance between Midland and Houston, where the university is located.

Governor Shivers has appointed H. M. Hood of Borger as judge of new domestic relations court in Hutchinson County. Also he named W. D. Noel of Odessa to the State Liquor Control Board. The reorganized Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission has taken first steps toward securing the financing from the livestock industry upon which its operation will depend after Sept. 1, 1957.
