### Highway Patrol Investigates Five Wrecks in August

The Highway Patrol investigated five rural accidents in Foard County during the month of August, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowd, Patrol Supervisor of this area. These wrecks accounted for persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,000.

The rural traffic accident summary for Foard County from January through August of 1962 shows a total of 13 crashes. As a result of these crashes, there were persons killed and eight persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$9,695.

The veteran patrol supervisor said, "With fall and winter approaching, now is the time to have vehicles checked in preparation for the cold winter ahead." The Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways. All vehicles registered in this state are required to be inspected once a year, he added.

The new motor vehicle inspection year began Sept. 1. However, only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker. The sergeant pointed out, "This new sticker is a dry-erase decal which we believe will be regardless of weather conditions."

The rejuvenated Wildcats, Crowell High School's football team, playing in its own classification at Memphis last Friday night, defeated the Memphis Cyclones 46 to 0 in a one-sided non-conference game.

Dale Doyal, fullback, and Larry Henry, halfback, scored three touchdowns each to trounce the larger Memphis boys. However, the running of these boys, along with halfback Bob Borchardt, could not have been possible without the superior blocking of the Crowell line, led by guard Paul Bax Ekern and tackle Jon Lee Black.

The Wildcats ran for 250 yards to 20 for Memphis.

Crowell completed only two passes of six attempted for 27 yards. Memphis completed six of 12 for 72 yards. The Wildcats led in first downs 17 to 9.

Each team lost the ball three times on fumbles. In fact, Crowell cashed in on Memphis' three mistakes to drive for three quick touchdowns. Paul Bax Ekern fell on a loose ball about the middle of the field on the third play of the game. The 53 yards to pay dirt was eaten up on seven ground plays with most of the ball-carrying chores going to fullback Dale Doyal. He scored from one yard out and also made the extra two points. The next touchdown came after Crowell tackle Jimmy Hudgens recovered a Memphis fumble on their 17-yard line. Quarterback Dan Mike Bird tossed a pass to Larry Henry for the score. Bob Borchardt ran the extra points over. Larry Henry pounced on a Cyclone fumble on their 25. Borchardt picked up 12, Henry three, and Doyal 10 for the TD. The extra point try was no good to leave the score 22 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

Doyal also scored the next touchdown from eight yards out. Henry ran the extra points over to make it 30 to 0 at halftime. Borchardt set up the next touchdown on a 20-yard scamper. Henry made the score from ten yards out. Henry also ran the extra points over to make it 38 to 0 in the third period.

The most sensational play of the game gave Crowell its last touchdown when Henry gathered in a punt on his own ten-yard line and following good blocking, went down the right sideline for 90 yards and a score. Borchardt carried over the extra points to make the final count 46 to 0.

Crowell stars were a "dime a dozen," but special mention should be given linemen Ekern and Black, along with the three Wildcat horses that carried the mail, Doyal, Henry and Borchardt. Memphis was crippled for this game but a couple of their linemen looked fairly good: Jackie Bridges, end, and guard Rex Grisham.

**Play at Matador Friday**  
The Wildcats have their work cut out for them this Friday night when they travel to Matador. The Bullfighters won district and bi-district last year and are undefeated this season. They have most of last year's team back, led by one of the best senior quarterbacks in West Texas, Gary Lancaster. The Cats will be home next week playing their old rivals, the Quannah Indians.

## Allen Cogdell Died in Paducah Hospital Saturday

### Funeral Services Held in Paducah Sunday Afternoon

William Allen Cogdell, 52-year-old Paducah postal clerk, died Saturday in a Paducah hospital following a brief illness. Mr. Cogdell had worked in the postal service for 32 years.

He suffered an apparent heart attack last week.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church of Paducah with Rev. Robert Beck, pastor, and Rev. Ivan Adams, pastor of the First Christian Church, officiating. Burial was in Garden of Memories Cemetery in Paducah.

Mr. Cogdell, a native of Crowell and the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Cogdell, was born July 10, 1910. He was a veteran of World War II and served in France and Germany with the U. S. Army. He married the former Miss Mildred Stallings of Paducah on Oct. 31, 1936, in Hollis, Okla.

Survivors include his widow; two sons, Bob and Roger, both of the home; two daughters, Miss Maxine Cogdell, also of the home, and Mrs. James Bennett, Oklahoma City, Okla.; three brothers, Weldon Cogdell of Houston, Ralph Cogdell of Floydada; and John Cogdell of Crowell; three sisters, Mrs. Mildred Neal, Carlsbad, N. M.; Mrs. James Brothers, Shamrock; and Miss Nancy Cogdell, Wichita, Kansas; and one grandchild.

A total of 1,182 doses of the oral vaccine were administered by a group of volunteer workers. Those who registered the people were Munson Welch, Mrs. L. E. Archer, Mrs. Bob Abston, Mrs. Loraine Carter and Mrs. Allene Williams. Ken Ferguson and Stephen Kralicke accepted the donations, and the vaccine was administered by Mrs. M. M. Kralicke and Mrs. Roberta Barker. Jack Spikes mixed the vaccine with distilled water. The Foard County Hospital furnished the small cups containing the sugar cubes.

The oral vaccine administered Sunday includes over 66 per cent of Crowell residents.

The vaccine was flown from a Wichita Falls drug firm to Crowell by the Civil Air Patrol unit of Children. Members of the team flying the serum here were Messrs. Jones, Bellah and Dodson.

The type I oral vaccine will be administered again Sunday afternoon, September 23, at the Community Center from 1 to 5 p. m. for anyone who was unable to receive their's last Sunday.

(Editor's note: Henry Black, our principal, spent two months this past summer touring places of interest in Europe. The following is a brief summary of the high points of his trip.)

It is difficult to give a brief review of my trip to Europe, for I saw so much and visited so many places, but it was a wonderful

experience for a country town boy. I flew on a Royal Dutch DC-8 jet plane from Houston to Montreal and then on to Amsterdam, and after a few days in Holland I continued my flight to London and later to Paris. From then on, I traveled by train with the exception of a trip up the Rhine River by boat and a one-day bus ride. I visited ten European countries: Holland, England, France, Germany, Austria, Belgium, Italy, Switzerland, Spain, and Portugal, each of which had much to interest me.

I was greatly impressed by the prosperity and beauty of all of the countries. Needless to say, all tourists receive a royal welcome, but more especially the Americans. The Europeans believe that all Texans drive a Cadillac and have a dozen oil wells.

I spent the major part of my trip in Italy, which I found to be the most interesting country in Europe. I especially like Rome; Paris is magnificent and gay; London is terrific—too big for me; Amsterdam is very quaint; Munich compares with the capitols in interest; Vienna, a city of music, is incomparable; Venice is the most unusual; Pompeii is historical; Sorrento, on the blue Mediterranean, is a charming beach resort; Barcelona is a great seaport; Madrid is one of the most beautiful cities; Lisbon is gray and picturesque on the hills by the sea; Innsbruck, Austria, with its snow capped mountains, is a marvelous picture; Luzern, with its mountains and lakes, is quaint and lovely, and there are others too numerous to mention.

Europe is filled with both the young and the old from America. I was greatly impressed by the number of young people who are studying in the various universities of all of the countries. I just wish that I could transport all of the Crowell students to Europe for a year of study and fun.

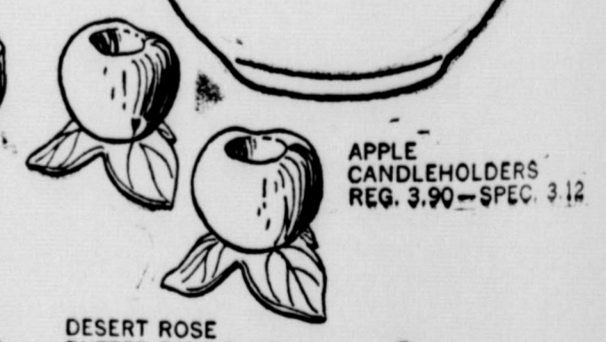

## Robert F. Davis Working on NTSU Research Project

Movement of water and minerals through onion roots is being studied in Denton for clues to an ancient biological problem: how do living cells "choose" the materials that pass through their walls?

The National Science Foundation has just awarded \$4,400 to North Texas State University for the research project, directed by Dr. James R. Lott of the biology department. The graduate research assistant for the project is Robert F. Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Foster Davis of Crowell. He is studying toward the master's degree in biology.

Some 24 centuries ago Aristotle described the movement of material in and out of cells as a passive one. In this view, a cell has no more choice than a blotter has in soaking up ink.

In recent decades, however, physiologists have found evidence that a cell membrane selects what shall pass and not pass. In doing so it spends energy, and this is called an active process.

Disagreement exists today as to whether the active or the passive transport is predominant and more important. Dr. Lott's research problem is to measure the relative amounts of passive and active transport in plant tissue.

He will work with onion roots because they can be grown rapidly in a liquid solution and because their relatively simple structure is easier to study than that of animal organs such as the kidney and intestines.

The movement of water and minerals will be measured in a potometer apparatus built by Dr. Lott.

Here the lower portion of a root is placed in a test tube solution, with the upper end in a potometer—a thin glass tube etched with a measuring scale for observation through a microscope. The potometer measures the amount and rate of water taken up by the root.

Samples will be analyzed to determine the amount of mineral salts taken up. One of the test solutions will contain rubidium 86, a radioactive substance that can be tracked closely with a scintillation counter which measures the beta rays it gives off. Another potometer will also be wired to a meter to detect changes in the electrical conductivity of the solution drawn up by the roots. This

gives a further check of changes in the salt content of the solution.

This process will be repeated, this time using a poisonous solution with the same mineral content as the water solution. The poison will alter the root tissue's ability to select or transport material, in effect changing it to a passive carrier of the solution. Comparison of the before-and-after effects will enable Dr. Lott to determine what amount of the movement through the roots is active and what amount is passive.

## Some Widows May Be Eligible for Increase in Social Security Checks

Some widows in the Wichita Falls area, each at least 62 years old, may be eligible for a \$1 to \$10 increase in their monthly social security checks, according to Erton F. Tate, district manager, Wichita Falls Social Security office.

These are women who worked under social security before or after their husbands died, he said, and who are now receiving social security benefits based on their own work rather than widows' benefits based on their husbands' work.

A change in the social security law, enacted last year, raised widows' benefits by ten per cent. Tate

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said. For some women, this may be higher than their present retirement benefit.

Since social security's rules show these women only as persons and not as widows, is no ready way to determine these women are, Tate said, women themselves must visit social security office to apply their increased benefits.

One clue as to whether a man is eligible for higher benefits as a widow than as a retired person is the amount of her social security check. Tate said. If the amount she receives retirement benefit is more than \$100 a month, she will receive higher benefits as a widow, he explained.

In no case would the increase to which these widows were entitled be more than \$10 a month, he said.

If a woman has any questions as to whether or not she is entitled to this increase, she should contact her social security office.

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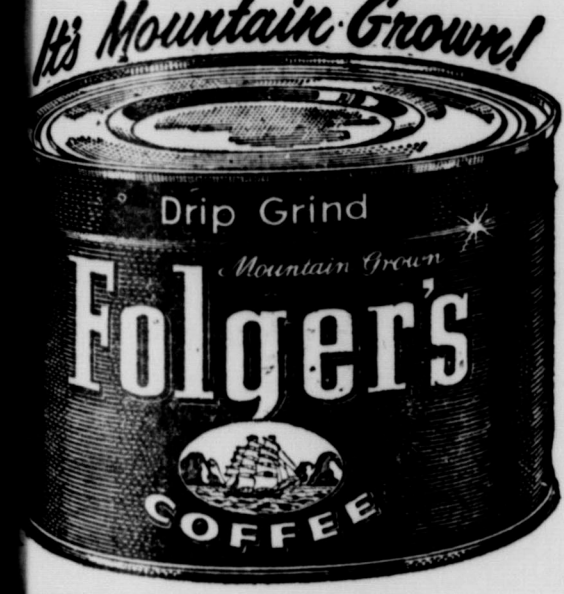

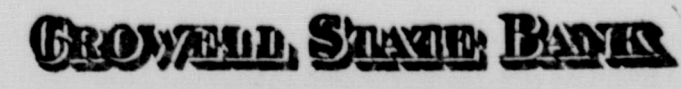

Austin, Tex.—A campaign to pass the water conservation amendment on which Texans will vote this November (No. 4 on the ballot) got underway at a meeting of the Statewide Water Conservation Committee in Austin. Committee is composed of just about everybody who is interested in water conservation and development.

Proposed amendment would permit the State Water Development Board to acquire storage space in reservoirs built either by local or Federal agencies and conserve storm and flood waters for beneficial uses.

Gov. Price Daniel addressed the meeting and thanked the committee for its "dedicated efforts" in promoting Texas' water program.

John Vandertulip, the State Water Commission's chief engineer, reported on the broad plan for meeting the State's water needs in 1980. Marvin Nichols of Fort Worth, chairman of the Development Board, discussed the lending program through which water projects have been financed. And Joe Carter, chairman of the Water Commission, explained the proposed amendment in detail and emphasized the need for its approval.

The statewide committee urged its members to back the amendment and approved the Water Commission's proposed budget. It also commended Governor Daniel for his "courageous, bold and dynamic leadership" in bringing about "the greatest and most comprehensive water resources conservation and development program in the history of Texas."

TRAFFIC SAFETY WEEK—Governor Daniel expressed "deep concern over the dangerous upward trend in traffic deaths among Texas high school and college students," as he proclaimed September 17-21 as fifth annual Texas School Traffic Safety Week.

He noted, however, that the 25 Texas traffic deaths in the 3-day Labor Day holiday were the second lowest toll since 1951.

EXPORTS—Texans can start thinking of themselves as exporters in big style.

Nobody had counted it up before, but now the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research finds that Texas is exporting to foreign countries \$837,000,000 worth of manufactured products, \$446,000,000 of agricultural products and \$31,000,000 of other products, mainly sulphur, salt, tale and fishery products.

Petroleum exports came to \$177,000,000 and chemicals to \$247,000,000 . . . showing how the petro-chemical industry has turned Texas' sales of oil abroad from a raw to a manufactured product.

SCHOOLS—The men and women who run the schools—board members and administrators—come to Austin on September 30 for their annual conventions. They plan searching looks at the problems of schools, many of which

sum up into five letters—M-O-N-E-Y.

Overhaul of the ad valorem tax system was proposed by a series of clinics held by schoolmen earlier this year.

Problems of textbook selection and teaching Americanism will be aired.

The textbook panel will review recent criticisms, as well as prospective legislation which may be recommended by a study committee.

BLONDE HOUSE—The Texas House of Representatives is becoming a blonde.

Eleven coats of varnish, applied over the years since 1888, have been peeled off the oak woodwork in the House chamber. Earlier, workmen had done the same peeling job on paneling on the ground floor of the Capitol.

Beauty of the original wood was thus restored. So a new light blond look has taken over the Capitol.

Lower Chamber also is getting new flooring and carpets. The House gallery, where so many Texans have sat in hard chairs watching legislation move through the House, is getting new upholstered chairs to make the taxpayers more comfortable. Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont, whose Rules Committee chairmanship puts him in a general supervisory position on the work of the State Board of Control, thinks it will be finished by November 1.

OLD FOLKS—Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools, faced with a report that 3,000 of its "patients" in state mental hospitals aren't sick—but just old—will ask the Legislature to do something about it.

Reports indicate county judges are "committing" aged persons to state hospitals mainly because they and their families can't care for them.

Board suggests the State pay part of the cost of placing such persons in privately-owned nursing homes. Sons and daughters would be required to pay the balance. Problem is one of welfare, rather than psychiatry, says the Board . . . "We now have older persons crowding facilities that are supposed to be used for the mentally ill."

WHAT IT COSTS—Texans who pay taxes to the state government got an idea of what the new school and welfare programs are costing when Comptroller Robert S. Calvert added up costs for the fiscal year which ended August 31.

State aid to public schools and colleges came to \$533,541,099, up nearly \$100,000,000 over the \$431,974,434 of the previous year. Welfare spending went up from \$188,875,904 to \$212,765,629. Increased Federal aid for welfare paid most of the increase.

Highway construction and maintenance totaled \$371,870,298. This is about the same as the previous year.

In all, the state spent \$1,307,623,666, up \$115,000,000 from the previous year.

RECORD YEAR—The State Securities Board closed a record fiscal year, having registered more than \$375,000,000 in securities in that period.

Forty-one permits to sell \$35-

958,648 in securities were issued in August, Commissioner William M. King has reported.

The Board, now five years old, has registered in excess of \$1,000,000,000 in securities.

BATTLE LOOMS—Changes in criminal court procedure being proposed for the next legislature by a State Bar committee are in for rough sledding.

Dist. Judge A. R. Stout of Waxahachie has announced his intention to carry his protests to the Legislature if the State Bar's proposals are introduced in January.

Judge Stout asserts that defense attorneys are dominating the committee's proposed court changes. He further stated that the Legislature would do better to adopt recommendations previously made by a committee on law enforcement.

SCHOOL BUS PASSING—Texas Department of Public Safety says it will crack down this year on motorists who illegally pass a school bus stopped to take on or discharge children.

State law requires the driver of any vehicle to stop upon approaching from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children.

**Top Flight Entertainers Due at Prison Rodeo on October Sundays**

A star-studded cast of the nation's topflight entertainment and sports personalities will make personal appearances at the 31st annual Texas Prison Rodeo to be held in Huntsville in the prison's \$1 million stadium each Sunday in October.

On October 7, the star attraction will be Rex Allen, better known as "Mr. Cowboy," and his famous horse, Koko. The celebrities to be featured on Oct. 14 include Anita Bryant, recording artist, who rose to fame with Bob Hope; and Ann Marston, a nationally-famous archer.

For the October 21 show, the star will be none other than Willie Mars, stellar baseball mainstay of the National League's San Francisco Giants.

For the final showing of the rodeo on Oct. 28, Dan Blocker, who portrays the role of "Hoss" Cartwright in the weekly Bonanza television series, will be in Huntsville to round out a stellar two-hour show, beginning at 2 p. m.

Aside from the stars, there will be tough inmate riders contesting tougher prison-produced rodeo events. These include the mad scramble, bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, Brahma bull riding, wild horse race and the famous closing chariot race.

Prison musical groups will also be on hand to entertain the crowds expected at this year's prison rodeo. One of the groups is the Gorie Girls, featuring Candy Barr, former Dallas night club entertainer.
