Mr. Henry was converted in early life and joined the Methodist Church and became an active worker in the church. He served as Sunday School superintendent in the Crowell Methodist Church for over 40 years and had been a member of the official board for a long period of years. He was chairman of the building committee when the present church building was erected in 1920.

During his almost fifty years' residence in Crowell he was an outstanding leader in all the worthwhile activities of the commurity, in addition to his faithfulness to the church. He helped organize the Crowell Rotary Club and served as its first president in 1928-1929. He was a past president of the Texas Hardware

Dealers' Association. Mr. Henry was well known and highly respected throughout the state, as well as in this community and adjoining communities. He was a friend to all persons with whom he came in contact.

He is survived by his wife; two brothers, T. O. Henry of Los Angeles, Calif., and Cliff Henry of Quanah; four sisters, Mrs. Milton Adkins of Thalia, Mrs. Mattie Waggoner of Carrollton, Mrs. Hester Wright of Dallas and Mrs.






