204 Persons Predicted to Die Violently **During Holidays**

Austin-Two hundred and four persons are slated to meet vio-ent deaths in Texas during the 11-day Christmas-New Year's hol-

That was the grim prediction issued this week by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, based on the estimates of his chief

statistician, N. K. Woerner.

According to Woerner, the 11-day period (from 12:01 a. m., Dec. 23 to 11:59 p. m. Jan. 2) will bring 112 motorcides; 39 homicides and suicides; and 53 other accidental deaths, such as fires, drownings, etc.

Last year the DPS statistician predicted that 108 persons would die in Texas traffic accidents during the holidays, which also span-ned 11 days. The final count was exactly 108.
