



#### The Highway Patrol investigated only one accident which 3,882 Traffic Law **Violators Stopped** by Highway Patrol

Patrolmen of the Wichita Falls District of the Texas Highway Patrol contacted a total of 3882 traffic law violators during the month of December, 1956. Captain K. B. Hallmark Jr., commanding officer, reported that 1178 of these were arrested while 2704 were warned for violation of the state traffic laws.

Speed was the leading cause of arrest, with passing violations second and driving while intoxicated ranking third.
