Almost 90 per cent of the people in Duval are "Mexicans," so called even though their families may have lived on this land since the days of the Conquistadores. Most of

them are desperately poor. Many are illiterate. Many speak no Eng-lish at all. Perhaps half the population of Perhaps half the population of

Perhaps half the population of this little county town, 4,397 at the last official census, live in miserable "jacales," unpainted huts built with scrap lumber. The town, officially a city, is typically Mexican, with a mis-sion-style church and a central plaza with a band stand.
