

# 2 Shots Can Help In Polio Season

While complete vaccination against paralytic polio calls for three Salk shots spaced over an eight-month period, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today urged all persons under 40 to get at least two shots before the oncoming polio season.

Recent surveys have shown that two shots of the vaccine can provide substantial protection for at least one pollo season National Foundation official

A study of the 1956 polio pic-ture by the U.S. Public Health Service revealed that paralyt polio among those patients with one or more shots was 75 to 80 per cent less than among the un-

Normally, the first and second shots are given two to six weeks apart with the third, or booster shot, given seven months after the second.

The Salk vaccine stimulates production of polio-fighting anti-bodies in the blood stream. The first shot takes effect seven to ten days after injection, prepar-ing the bloodstream for the production of antibodies. The second shot brings an increase in antibodies. The third creates sharp rise in antibodies that provides long-lasting protection

If the body is infected by the polio virus, the antibodies pre-vent it from reaching nerve cells where the real damage occurs,

thus preventing paralysis. However, medical authorities warn that an individual who may be immune personally and comes in contact with the virus may pass the infection on to an
