News From the Congress

It has become more and more evident during the past several years that there is a drastic need for a complete reorganization of the Department of Defense. When our country was founded, there was no real problem about the organization of the military. At first we had only a War Department and then shortly thereafter a Department of the Navy. The Navy conducted war at sea, and the Army's mission was land war. This simple arrangement worked fine for 150 years until the advent of the airplane which brought a third dimension to warfare. At first the Air Arm was simply integrated into the two conventional service departments; however, shortly after Pearl Harbor, we realized that the Air Force should be placed on equal footing with the Army and Navy, and World War II taught us that no longer are wars fought by a single branch of the service but can only be effectively carried on through close coordination of the forces on the sea, land, and air. The necessary integration or coordination of the armed services was recognized in 1947 when the Department of Defense was given the task of bringing all the service forces together and unifying them. Again in 1949 and 1953 Congress made efforts to bring about greater unification. The lack of proper coordination was highlighted immediately following the launching of the first Russian sputnik last Fall, and there has been wide discussion of the substantial sums of money that could be saved if certain phases of our procurement were handled on a consolidated or unified basis.

Last Thursday the President sent his plan of further reorganization of the Defense Department to the Congress. There are many good features about it, and its main purpose would be to increase the authority of the Secretary of Defense and the Joint Chiefs of

Staff by clothing them with the power to bring about real unification of our Armed Services. Of course, the plan is too involved to discuss in detail here. One phase of it that is apt to draw considerable opposition is that under the President's proposal, all of the funds that were appropriated to the military, which is roughly about two-thirds of what our national government spends each year, would be appropriated to the Secretary of Defense. This would give to the Secretary unprecedented power over our economy, and many feel that this is entirely too much authority to be vested in one man.

No man can say, "I am good, and know I am saved." Not even Christ can pass a soul into glory over the Will of God. One preacher advised over TV not to read the Old Testament as we had no need of it. He probably had been reading the revised version of the New Testament. What preacher can, or will, preach The Father (Creator of All Things); Son, (Life on this earth); and Holy Ghost (Everlasting Spirit of the hereafter). Christ asks us to live it; but we do not. How long, Oh Lord, must this Nation of infidelity remain in opposition to Thee?

Farm Housing Program Expanded

An expanded farm housing loan program, designed to speed up farm building construction improvement, as well as act as an additional anti-recession measure, was announced this week by Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director, according to F. O. Smith, the agency's local county supervisor.

Now an owner of a farm in agriculture, production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities for sale or home use may qualify for the 4 per cent long-term housing loan provided that he meets other standard eligibility requirements.

Formerly, an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.

Loans may be made to build, improve, or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings, and to provide water for farmstead and household use. Mr. Smith said that in addition to financing major construction, the loan funds can help meet many other needs for farm and farm home modernization such as adding bathrooms, utility rooms, better kitchens, and many other improvements to the home as well as to farm service buildings. While tenants and farm laborers are not eligible, the owner may borrow to do the construction work or make improvements for them.

The loans are made to farm owners who need credit to finance building improvements or repairs, but find that adequate credit is not available through banks or other regular credit channels. The interest rate is 4 per cent and loans may be amortized over periods up to 33 years.

Eligibility for loan assistance determined by the three-county Farmers Home Administration committee, and applications are now being accepted at the FHA county office.

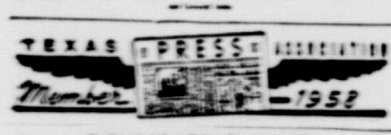

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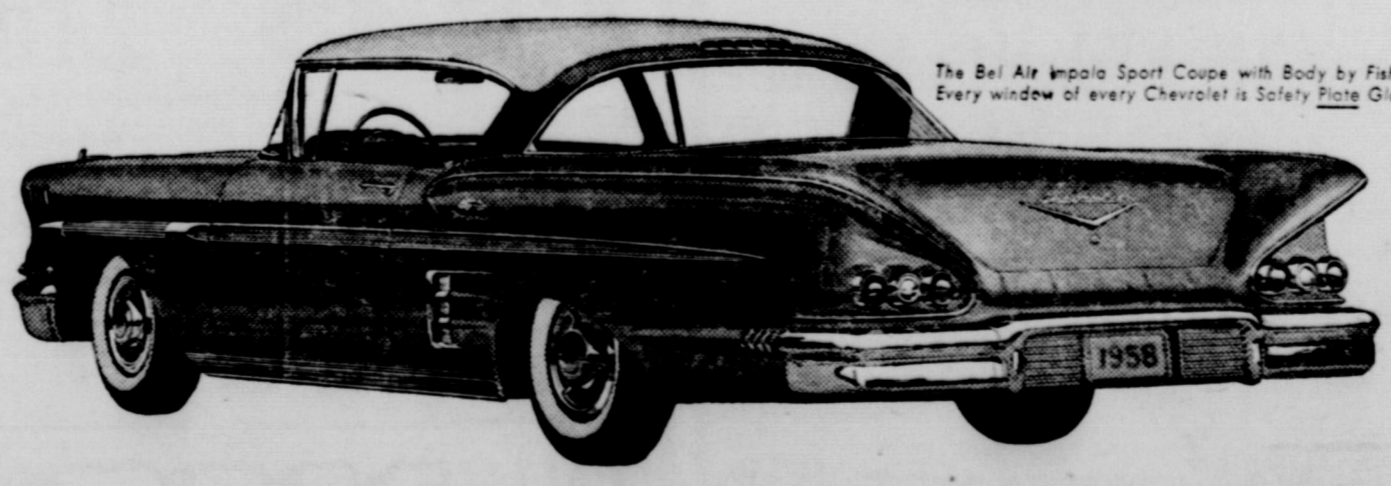

Speed-Up Expected in Land Program

Further speed-ups in the already accelerated Veterans' Land Program are anticipated when money is received from the April 1 sale of \$12½ million worth of Veterans' Land bonds.

So says Bill Allcorn, chairman of the Veterans' Land Board and Texas land commissioner.

The Board had already speeded up its buying program as funds became available on January 16 from \$12½ million worth of bonds sold in December, 1957.

The bonds sold on April 1 went at 2.89 per cent interest, well below the three per cent limit provided in the State constitution.

The Board is now sending out application forms to 300 veterans each week. Allcorn notes that money now available is expected to carry the program through May of 1959.

 GRAPHITE BLOCKS USED TO PRODUCE AIRCRAFT
 Six of the largest blocks of high-grade graphite ever made are being used at an aircraft industry plant to turn out stainless steel parts for a supersonic bomber.
 The graphite blocks, weighing two and a half tons each, are machined into precise shapes; then the steel components are fitted glove-tight into the area and are furnace-brazed at extremely high temperatures.
 Graphite, which is somewhat like pencil lead, is the only acceptable material for the brazing operation because of its stability and resistance to shock at high temperatures.
 Net value of Texas industrial production increased 930 per cent in the 14 years after 1939.

Speed Up Payment of First Benefit Check

"Speed up the payment of your first benefit check by bringing along all your copies of forms W-2, withholding statements, or other record of your 1957 earnings" is the advice given by Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Administration District Office to workers who plan to file early in 1958.

1957 earnings are required for the computation of benefits for claims filed in 1958. Employers had until January 31st to file their quarterly social security returns for their employees with the Director of Internal Revenue. Therefore, Social Security Administration records for individual employees will not reflect 1957 earnings completely for several months.

Form W-2, withholding statement, however, shows complete earnings and social security contributions for 1957. It is given to the employee in duplicate. One is for attachment to the income tax return and one is for the em-

ployee's files.

Self-employed individuals who plan to file in 1958, Mr. Tate stated, should submit a copy of their 1957 tax returns including Schedule C and SE, plus a canceled check or other evidence that the tax was paid.

The social security representative will be in Crowell on Tuesday, May 13, in the court house to give information and assistance on matters pertaining to social security.

Social Security Reports on Domestic Workers Are Due in April

Social security reports on domestic workers for the January-March quarter are due in April, Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security of-

fice announced this week.

Under the present law, most domestic employees, such as gardeners, cooks, maids, and housekeepers, are covered under social security. Employers of these and other household workers must report the cash wages paid and permit the social security tax of 4 1/2 per cent of the employee's wages. In cases where the domestic employee has earned less than \$50 cash in the quarter, the employer does not have to make any report.

Mr. Tate stressed the point that these wage reports are extremely important to the domestic employee, since old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits under social security are figured on the basis of the amount of earnings credited to a person's account.

The form used in making the

return on household employees requires only a few minutes to complete and may be obtained from the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue in Dallas.

SHOULD REDUCE TRADE BARRIERS

A study made in 1954 by the Committee for Economic Development, which is composed of 150 leading businessmen and educators, came to the conclusion that it is in the national interest of the United States to reduce our tariffs and other barriers to foreign trade on a gradual and selective basis. A committee spokesman says that this need is even more compelling now than it was then, a major reason being the Soviet economic offensive.
