Wildcats Eliminated from State Race by 22 to 8 Loss to Mason Punchers

The Crowell High School football team, coached by Thayne Amnett and Gordon Erwin, lost to Mason at Coleman by the score of 22 to 8 last Friday night in the regional play-off game. Mason went into this contest undefeated and favored. However, the Wildcats, with a 10-1 record for the season, did themselves proud and really threw a scare into the Punchers in the third quarter.

Crowell, playing without their star halfback, Gerald Bradford, came onto the field in the second half with an 8-0 count against them. They immediately made one touchdown to tie the score and had apparently scored another. However, an official ruled that one of Crowell's linemen was too far back which nullified the touchdown. Pat Keller, Mason's star fullback, ran two more touchdowns over to leave the final count 22 to 8.

All of Crowell's players played excellent ball against the strong Mason team, but the work of Ivan Cates on defense and Jim Henry on offense should make them strong contenders for all-state honors. Mason knocked the Crowell Wildcats out of the class A play-offs Friday night, 22-8, as Pat Keller broke an 8-8 tie with 3:22 left in the third quarter on a 65-yard sprint and added the clincher early in the fourth to advance to the quarterfinals.

Mason now meets Talco, a 35-6 winner over Edgewood in Sulphur Springs Friday night.

Crowell was behind 8-0 at intermission, but fought back to even the score with 9:37 to go in the third. The Wildcats came right back to seemingly take the lead on a called-back touchdown by Jim Henry.

But the Wildcats were assessed a five-yard backfield-in-motion penalty to keep the game knotted up.

The amazing Keller, however, brought the Punchers out of their doldrums on an electrifying 66-yd. sprint after taking the ball on downs from the downcast 'Cats.

Keller scored all of Mason's touchdowns and ran over two conversion tries for all the Punchers' points. He had 265 yards rushing on 22 carries for the night.

The Wildcats were playing without the services of halfback Gerald Bradford, but made a close contest of it as fast-stepping Jim Henry kept Crowell in dangerous position most of the last half. Bradford reportedly suffered a leg injury in practice this week.

It was the Wildcats' quarterback, Ivan Cates, who scored Crowell's only touchdown. Henry set it up on a 19-yard scamper to the Mason 2 only two plays before Cates sneaked over from the one-foot line. Henry got the two points around end.

The game was a see-saw battle with both teams doing everything possible to continue down the play-off trail. Had the Wildcats' touchdown in the third been good, the outcome could have been different. Mason had only a 9-8 edge in first downs, and punted three times to Crowell's four. Cates tried 14 passes, completing three with several dropping from receivers' clutches.

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Vernon Woman Killed in 1-Car Crash East of Margaret Sunday Afternoon

Mrs. Claude Estes, 46-year-old Vernon woman, was found fatally injured near her crashed car about 2 p. m. Sunday on Farm Road 98, about 9 1/2 miles east of Crowell on the Margaret-Rayland road.

Highway Patrolman Bob Stinnett said the crash of the woman's car, a 1953 Chevrolet sedan, is believed to have occurred after she lost control of the vehicle on the farm road. After talking to witnesses, he estimated the time of the accident at about 1:15 p. m., indicating Mrs. Estes had been lying at the accident scene for about 45 minutes before discovery.




