Dr. Stapp, a native of Burnet, received his B. S. degree from Baylor University in Waco and his M. D. degree from Southwestern Medical School in Dallas. 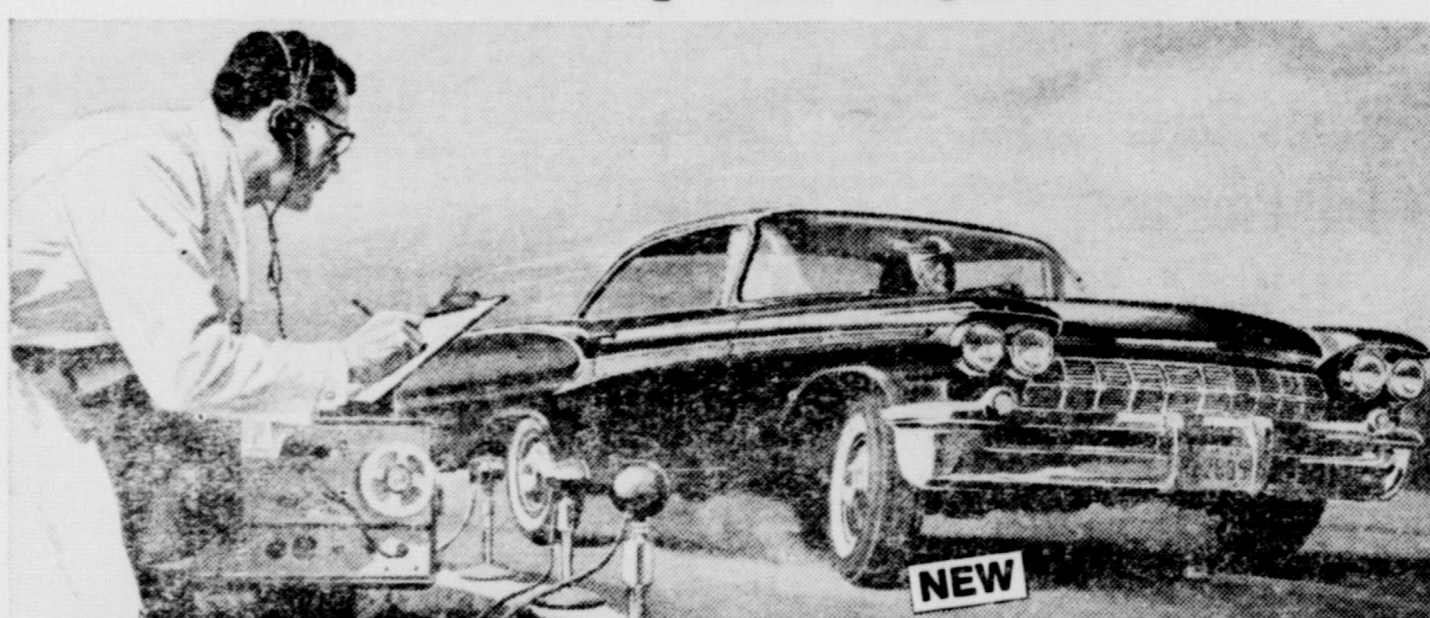

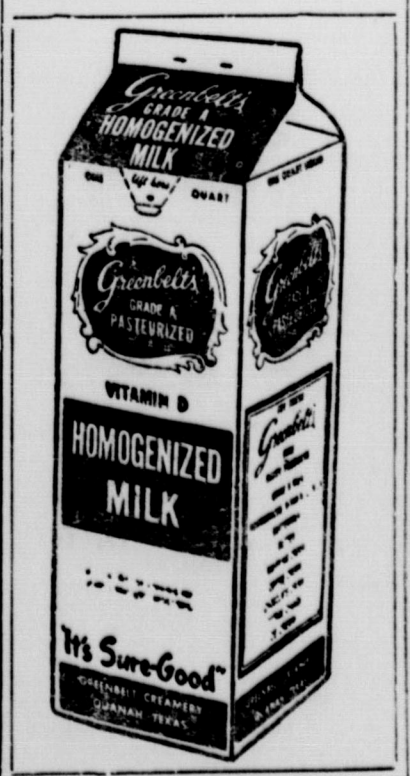

Tax valuations for the City of Crowell are up \$102,929 over last year.

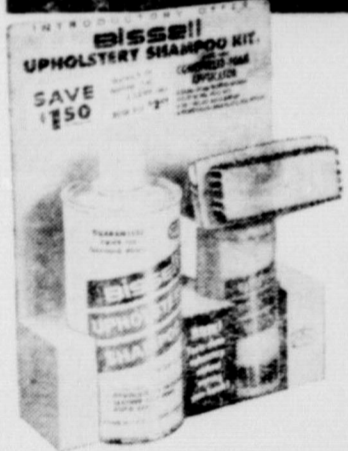
