



This building was completed in the Spring of 1957 after it was destroyed by a storm. The insurance that was collected at that time was sufficient to erect the building back and replace most of the equipment.






The monthly report showed a total of \$8,184.78 paid in fines for game violations. Court costs amounted to \$483 on the total of 258 arrests made by the ward-

Night hunting was next high on the list of violations. There were 36 arrests for headlighting.

Fishermen without licenses also came in for 34 arrests, while 27 paid fines for hunting without li-

The director warned again about fishing without licenses.

"With the advent of warmer weather and more fishing, everyone should be careful about having his license," he said. "A li-cense is required of all fishermen between 16 and 65 who fish outside of their home county, or fish with any kind of winding device anywhere, either in their home county or on the coast.

"Licenses can be obtained from so many sources there should be no difficulty in getting them."
