Picking Up Game Off Highways Can Be Illegal

Only under very limited conitions is it legal to stop and pick p game animals that have been down by an auto, warns E. Sprott, director of law enorcement, Texas Game and Fish

The same laws that govern hunting game with firearms must taken into consideration under all conditions," explained the di-ector. "If it's illegal to have a particular species of game animal possession, it doesn't make any fference whether you ran wn accidentally with an auto r shot it. You are still violating law if you have one in posses-

"It's best not to take any hances," said the director. "If ou accidentally hit a deer on the road, play it safe and notify he nearest game warden or peace fficer. Don't pick it up. Just move

clear of the road.' Under no condition is it legal run down intentionally a game nimal with an auto.

When a warden is notified, he will pick the animal up and give it to charity. This is the only way to dispose of an illegal kill.

"Remember," suggested the diector, "that laws governing posssion when hunting and fishing ld true even when picking up game that has been accidentally run down with a vehicle, or when accepting fish as gifts.'

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
