BASEBALL FIELD BEING IMPROVED

Many loads of soil and grass have been hauled and placed on the Little League baseball field, and work is now proceeding on the pitch, according to President Agent Mike Bird. "W. F. Lister, Freddie Riehmeyer, Al Taylor, T. R. Cates, Grady Vess and Charlie Branch have been doing yeoman service," stated Bird. "Dutch Hollenbaugh, assistant fire chief, is ready to mow down the field, and Clinton Cain loaned us a chisel and an orange tractor to pull the dirt." "Twenty-five new reflectors have been purchased from the local hardware store," said Bird. "They will be installed at the local school, and we will soon turn on the lights at night and call for more volunteer workers to help with the field, paint the fence and other little jobs." "About 55 Little Leaguers registered last Saturday, according to President Marion Crowell. "This is only about half of our Little Leaguers," said Mr. Crowell. "The boys will be sent to the various schools so everyone can register and play Little League."

Savings Bonds Sales in Foard County During 60 Total \$32,174

An increase of 4 per cent in savings bonds sales in Foard County during the first two months of 1960, according to George Self, chairman of the Foard County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales for the first two months of this year amounted to \$32,174, or 19.4 per cent of the 1960 goal. Total bond purchases in Foard County for January and February were \$32,174, which represents 29.2 per cent of the 1960 county goal. "We are most encouraged by the increase in savings bonds sales," said Mr. Self. "More and more people are purchasing Series E and H bonds because they realize that in the long run, they are making a direct contribution to the economic stability of this nation and the security of their own families." The Savings Bonds being purchased now earn an active 3 and three-quarters per cent interest, compounded semi-annually when held to maturity.

Paul Manning Resigns as Minister of the St. Christian Church

Paul Manning, minister of the St. Christian Church in Crowell, Texas, has resigned effective September, 1958, has submitted his resignation effective September 1. He has accepted a position as a Christian Church minister in Rucklin, Kansas. Dr. and Mrs. Manning and their five children will move to Rucklin later part of April to make their home.

Changes in Cotton Law Should be Studied by Foard Farmers

There is an important change in legislation that should be called to the attention of all farmers with cotton allotments, Bob Cooper of Thalia, said this week. Under a new law, passed at the last session of Congress, if cotton is not regarded as planted under provisions of the Soil Bank Act or the Great Plains program, Cooper says a farm must plant 75 per cent of the allotted acres or acreage must be released, at the county ASC office; otherwise the allotment on the farm will be reduced in 1961. A farmer who releases his allotment acres can maintain the cotton allotment history on his farm, provided cotton is planted one out of three years. Mr. Cooper said, "If you don't plan to use all or part of your 1960 cotton allotment acres, go to your county ASC office and release them before it is too late to get history credit on your farm. Cotton growers who would like to have their cotton acreage increased must apply for additional acres, on the form provided, if they want to get their share of the released acres. They should, also, assist their ASC committee by encouraging non-growers to release unwanted cotton acres. Apply now for the acres you actually want and will plant. Your request will furnish your county committee with justification necessary to obtain released acres from counties with 'excess acres.' There were around a half million 'available' cotton allotment acres that were not utilized in 1959. Final dates for release and reapportionment of released acres has been set for each county. If you don't know what these dates are, it will pay you to find out and act before it is too late."

Participates in College 'Faculty Day' at SWJC

An unusual campus activity, Faculty Honor Day, was conducted last week at Southwest Junior College near Fort Worth where Wayne Nickie Chatfield is a freshman engineering student. On this day, all faculty members take a one-day vacation, leaving the college under complete student leadership. Each faculty member chooses a student representative to assume his particular daily duties. Classes were taught by different students. Elected by the student body to fill administrative offices were Jim Haehn as president of the college, Wayne Chatfield as dean of the college, Don Schneider as business manager, Pat Phillips as dean of women, and Ronald Larson as dean of men. Conducted in an "all business" manner, the event brings better understanding between staff and students. The end of the day brought signs of relief from the alternate faculty and an eagerness to be "back in" activities by the regular teachers.

RAIN FALLS HERE LAST THURSDAY

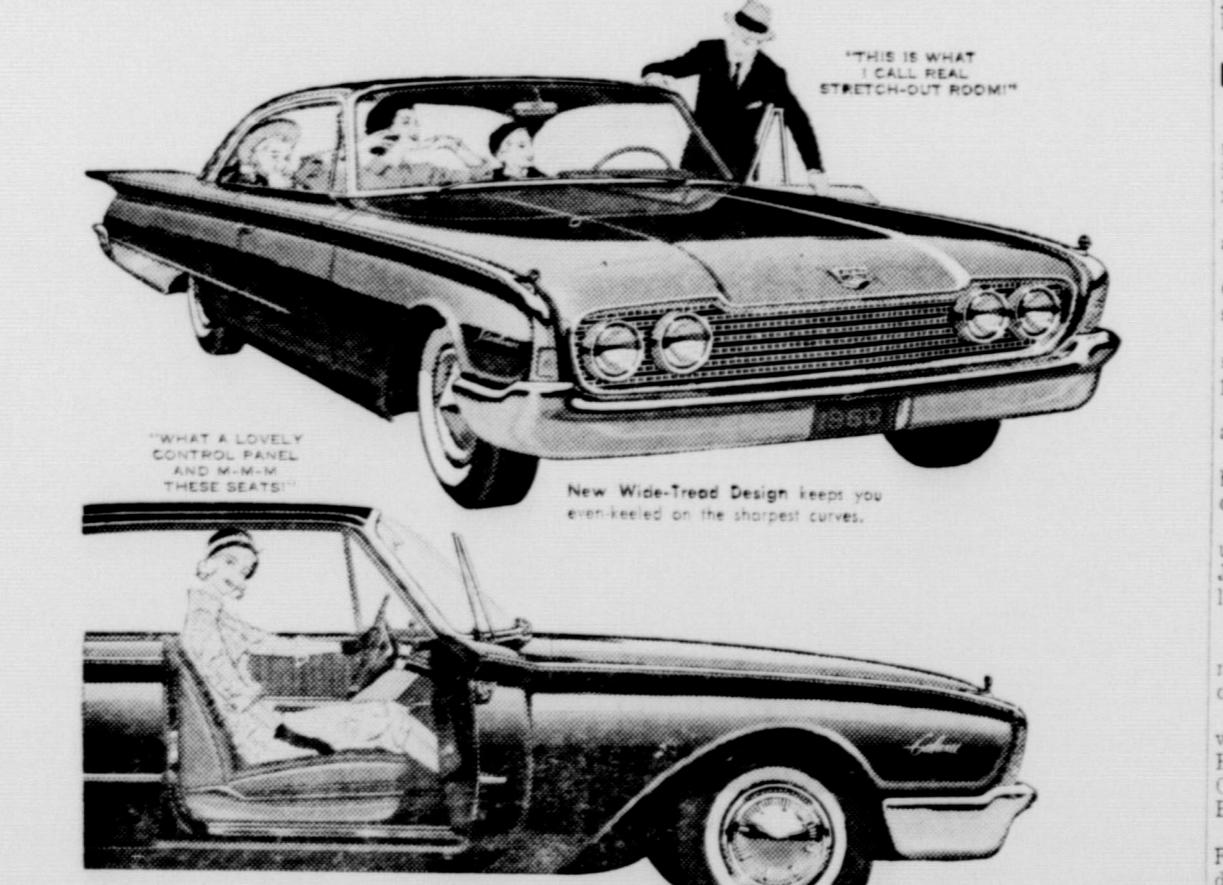

Home Demonstration Notes

 Thinking of doing some painting, papering, or refurbishing this spring? If so, choose colors for a reason—to get the special effects that you may want and, at the same time, provide a comfortable, pleasant background for every-day living.
 Decide how you want the room to look. Will it be light, gay, restful or dramatic? Do you want it to be predominantly warm or cool?
 A good color plan has few colors, usually no more than two or three, in different values and intensities. The best color schemes grow from a dark color, a light color and a bright color. Black, white and gray are not considered colors, but are often used to give a needed accent of light or dark.
 Choose your favorite color or if you do not need to consider the color or colors of furnishings which you must keep. Or select a picture or print which has your chosen colors and plan your scheme from that.
 Good proportion of the different colors is important. This means that your color scheme will be definitely dark or light and that either warm or cool colors will predominate.
 Proportions of 60 per cent of area for one color, 30 per cent for a second color and 10 per cent for accent, insure good proportion.
 When you place the colors in a room, choose the color for the largest areas first—floor covering, walls and large upholstered pieces. In most cases, these should be your most livable colors, or colors that are greyed in intensity. Next, choose colors for small upholstery and the window treatment. This treatment may be a blend of the room colors, or match or contrast with the walls. Lastly, choose your colors for accessories and small areas—pillows, lamps, ash trays, etc. Usually, this accent color is the brightest color.

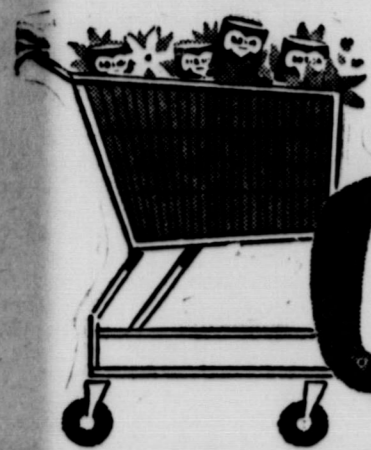

Polo Scores a Big Hit with Truscott Man

Harold L. Barry, one of the nation's top professional polo players, is probably one of Truscott's greatest claims to fame.

Barry has won polo honors galore—almost too numerous to mention—during his 25 years in the game. More than 500 trophies which "fill" his home and the home which "fill" his home and the home which "fill" his home.

Barry carries 10 ponies for personal use during tournaments. He said a fresh horse is required by a player for each of the six 7 1/2-minute periods of contest.

Barry, who was featured Sports Illustrated magazine August of 1959, keeps his home in Florida during the winter months. He returns them to Truscott the last of April for the until July when competition for the National Open.

When asked how profitable polo is, Barry's only comment was "It's been good to me" (Ed. Note: The above was written by Ray Gambill, a writer for the Wichita Falls Times and the article appeared in Sunday edition of that newspaper.)

Family Plays Sport

Barry is rated a "nine goal" player by the U. S. Polo Association which rates participants according to overall ability. Ultimate rating is "10-goal."

"The association rates players on their ability, not on how many goals they score," explained Barry, who plays a defensive position on his team.

Barry's lofty rating puts him among the top seven active polo players in the 800-player polo association. There are two active 10-goal players and five 9-goal players.

The burly Texan, who lives about two miles southwest of Truscott, comes from a polo playing family that includes three brothers, two of whom are still active in the sport. The brothers, Bill, Roy and Claude, developed an interest in the game while youths training horses in Crowell.

Horsemanship Important Bill and Roy, both of San Antonio and older than Barry, are seven-goal players. A nephew, Roy Jr., 20, San Antonio, is a five-goal player. A neighbor of Barry's, Wayne Brown, 27, has been playing two years.

Barry, a rancher and pony raiser off the polo field, is affectionately called "Chico" by polo players. He weighs well over 200 pounds and many times rides mounts lighter than some jockies.

The Texas rancher, who plays No. 4 position on the Detroit team, is noted for his excellent horsemanship and play-making ability.

A resident of this area practically all his life, Barry believes horsemanship is the most important part of being a top-notch polo player.

"About anybody can learn to hit the ball," Barry draws.

During his long career in the game, Barry has "lost a few teeth" and received one broken arm. Barry credits this to strict refereeing and quality of his competitors.

Barry's team plays in Florida's Sun League during the winter months. In the summer, the team plays in northern states.

Sunday, Barry played in Florida in a tournament that pitted the best players in Texas against top players of the Sunshine State. Barry's teammates included Cecil Smith, 10-goal player from San Antonio.
